## Re: EX22.13 Open Data Requirement at All City of Toronto Standing Committees Boards and Agencies

Dear Mayor Tory and Members of Council,

This is to express the *strong support* of the Federation of North Toronto Residents Associations (FoNTRA) for the Motion put forward by Councillor Paul Ainslie, Chair, General Government and Licensing Committee, and recommended to Council by Executive Committee, as follows:

1. City Council direct the City Manager to implement mandatory open data requirements in all reports submitted to standing committees for the purposes of ensuring the City can continue to build its open data platform, and City Council request Standing Committee Chairs to monitor their agendas for compliance with this requirement.

We appreciate the Motion's reinforcement of the City's commitment to Open Government, and taking practical steps to ensure that the Open Data policy is fully implemented.


From a residents' perspective, users of open data include residents seeking information regarding local planning and building construction matters who require access to information such as Committee of Adjustment (CofA) applications and decisions (closed files), and building permits (closed files).

We note that the closed Building Permit data has recently been updated; however the closed CofA Decisions spreadsheets have not been available since 2017. Further we note that the Etobicoke and York CofA no longer posts the Decisions in the Application Information Centre; the three other planning districts continue to provide these Decisions in the AIC.

We are pleased to see the attention to this important matter.
