In **Toronto**

Is home to more than 500,000 newcomers.

- top immigrant destination in Canada
- 200+ different ethnic origins, 140+ languages spoken
- 51.2% residents are foreign-born
- 27.5% of those born in CA have at least one parent foreign-born
- 40%+ are visible minorities




Immigrants Bring Education and Skills

- disproportionate COVID-19 impact
- policy shifts, differing objectives





COVID-19 Impact

- Direct impact on newcomers:
 - higher rates of infection
 - greater vaccine hesitancy
 - more job loss, precarious working conditions
- Sharp drop in new Permanent Resident arrivals
- After record numbers in 2019, sharp drop in new refugee claimants
- As borders re-open and travel restrictions ease, potential for significant increase in refugee claimant arrivals above 2019 level
