<b>Councillor Joe Cressy,</b> found on pages 10-12 of the background report.		

The underlined portions of the staff answer to this request, are the basis of our concern:

3. City Council direct the Executive Director, Corporate Real Estate Management, to report back to the Executive Committee in first quarter of 2022, on a process for returning statutory compensation generated through Provincial and Federal expropriation of municipal lands back to the local community.

<u>Net proceeds from the sale or disposition of real estate assets, including compensation as result</u> <u>of expropriation, are to be deposited in the Land Acquisition Reserve Fund to fund future capital</u> <u>requirements</u>, as per the "Policy Governing Land Transactions Among City Agencies, Boards, Commissions and Departments and Proceeds from Sale of Surplus City- Owned Real Property" (Clause embodied in Report No. 9 of the Policy and Finance Committee, June 2002). This will provide a source of funding to solution unfunded needs, as well as create capacity for future needs and ensure that the City continue to invest strategically beyond the 10-year capital plan.

Further, as presented in the report *City-wide Real Estate - Next Phase of Implementation* that is being considered by Executive Committee in October 2021, <u>net proceeds from the sale of property will be centralized for decision-making with a City-wide perspective</u>.

We suggest that the disposition of the First Parliament Site should be distinguished from transactions subject to the default City disposition policy for the following reasons:

- This is not a disposition of surplus City land. It is an expropriation of land that was purposively assembled over many years at significant cost.
- The First Parliament lands were acquired to serve a civic and commemorative purpose. They were never intended to be revenue producing for the City.

- The value of the First Parliament Site lies in the opportunity to meet the civic and commemorative priorities identified in the First Parliament Master Plan including:
  - Recognition, through the provision of commemorative space and a dedicated interpretative centre, of both indigenous activity on the site and the post contact establishment of the First Parliament Buildings which hosted the development of the governance structure of the province.
  - Creation of a new and desperately needed public park as previously approved by the City through the 2017 rezoning of a the TPA parking lot on the First Parliament Site
  - Recognition of the commitment to Toronto Public Library for accommodation of a new regional library (arising out of the 2012 land swap that saw used TPL lands to bring the last piece of the First Parliament Site into City ownership).

We have noted with appreciation, the June 10<sup>th</sup> letter from the Deputy City Manager to Metrolinx and Infrastructure Ontario reinforcing these same priorities and expectations.

We feel it is crucial to ensure that as negotiations evolve there is clear direction from Council to ensure that sufficient proceeds from the expropriation will be available and prioritized, if needed, to achieve the site-specific City objectives for the First Parliament Site. Failure to do so risks undermining more than twenty years of advocacy and policy development on the part of the City and community members.
