The Toronto Field Naturalists are concerned about the proposed work by Metrolinx in Toronto Ravines. City of Toronto ravines are precious pockets of wildlife and ecological beauty in our city. They are also meaningful community spaces where children learn about nature and residents can find respite.

Toronto City Council should insist that Metrolinx rethink its approach to Small's Creek and Williamson Ravines, especially the unnecessary clear-cutting of long-established native trees, to prepare for a possible fourth track on the Lakeshore East Corridor. Of course Toronto needs improved public transit to continue to build our city for future generations. But public transit projects in urban areas also need to accommodate rare, community-integrated green space — particularly as we all grapple with the worsening climate crisis.

The City of Toronto has clear and strong policies on protecting our environment and biodiversity. The City should work with Metrolinx and the Toronto Region Conservation Authority, to come to a community-informed alternative to the destruction of Small's Creek and ESA Williamson's Ravine and offer our vision for enhancing its ecological and social value for generations to come.
