Re: PB29.3 – 241 Richmond Street West and 133 John Street - Notice of Intention to Designate a Property under Part IV, Section 29 of the Ontario Heritage Act (Ward 10)

Chair and Members of the Toronto Preservation Board,

I am writing to you to voice full support for the Designation of 133 John Street, Toronto and 241 Richmond Street West, Toronto under Part IV, Section 29 of the *Ontario Heritage Act*. The 19th century (c. 1875) house at 133 John Street and the 20th century (1936, 1940, 1948) warehouse at 241 Richmond Street West are both important heritage resources in the Entertainment District and King-Spadina neighbourhoods of Toronto and within the broader City of Toronto.


I am alarmed to hear that Tridel is pursuing demolition of 133 John Street in their proposed redevelopment of the subject site, which would see a 41-storey mixed use (primarily condominium) building constructed. Both 133 John Street and 241 Richmond Street West should be retained and restored as part of this redevelopment.

I would further like to flag to the Toronto Preservation Board that 133 John Street – historically known as 111 John Street and 131 John Street – was formerly home to Edward (Ned) Hanlan between c. 1884 and 1893. Edward (Ned) Hanlan is a significant figure in Toronto's history. Edward (Ned) Hanlan (1855-1908) was an oarsman (sculler), hotelman, and alderman. He rose to significance in the 1870s-1890s as a champion rower and held the title of World Champion Sculler between 1880 and 1884. During the late 1890s, Hanlan also served as alderman of Toronto's Ward 4. The Hanlan family are additionally the eponyms of Hanlan's Point on the Toronto Islands. Attached in Appendix A are materials elucidating Edward (Ned) Hanlan's connection to 133 John Street, Toronto.






