Sister Anne spent many years in the field of education both as a teacher and a principal. She brought energy and a love for sports to St. Joseph's College School and St. Joseph's Morrow Park in Toronto.

Most notably, Sister Anne founded the Toronto Furniture Bank, which was formally incorporated in 1998 and until her recent illness was a devoted volunteer in Becoming Neighbours where she accompanied immigrants and refugees.

In 2017, Sister Anne was recognized with the Governor General's Sovereign's Medal for Volunteers for her work helping transform the lives of many people living below the poverty line. Sister Anne has helped hundreds of families facing financial difficulties to obtain appliances, furniture and other basic necessities.

Whatever Sister Anne did, whether with students, staff in schools, or her work with refugees, she did it with energy, compassion and joy.
