Toronto City Council is deeply saddened to learn of the passing of Anne Moore on March 25, 2021. As a dedicated nurse and philanthropist, Anne lived her life making life better for her family and fellow Canadians. Anne was an amazing Torontonians who gave back to the City of Toronto her whole life, dedicating her career to supporting countless local charities by raising hundreds of millions of dollars.

Anne's generosity and keen readiness to help others were evident throughout her life. Born in North Bay, she attended St. Joseph's Hospital School of Nursing in North Bay and went on to work as nurse in Sudbury and Vancouver. Philanthropy became a central focal point for her and she began a lifetime of philanthropic fundraising beginning as a volunteer with the Junior League in Winnipeg. Anne spent years fundraising millions for countless community arts and social services organizations so much so that she was one of Canada's first Certified Fundraising Executives. In 2004, Anne was recognized by the Association of Fundraising Professionals (AFP) with a Lifetime AFP Achievement Award, where she had helped set the ethical standards for the Association. Working up until the age of 75, Anne was passionate about giving back to the community and her genuine interest in helping others led many to look up to her as a role model.

Anne was a lifelong proud resident of Toronto's Hoggs Hollow neighbourhood which she loved and cherished. In her later years, she spent time with her family and friends and pursued her interests in live theatre, opera, and gardening at the family home in Hoggs Hollow.
