		<p><b>Name:</b> Boy on a Dolphin</p> <p><b>Text on plaque:</b> Many stories come down from antiquity of children having dolphins for playmates and sailors being helped to shore by dolphins.</p> <p><b>Base dimensions:</b> 4' x 1 ½'</p> <p><b>Height:</b> 3'</p> <p><b>Weight:</b> 800 lbs</p>
		<p><b>Name:</b> Centaur</p> <p><b>Text on plaque:</b> One of a jolly race of creatures, half man, half horse, who lived in the forest of ancient Greece and were very hard to catch.</p> <p><b>Base dimensions:</b> 6'3" x 3'3"</p> <p><b>Height:</b> 4 ½'</p> <p><b>Weight:</b> 3 tons</p>

		<p><b>Name:</b> Cyclops</p> <p><b>Text on plaque:</b> One of the race of giant one-eyed men who herded sheep for a living. They were finally done in by Hercules after a fierce struggle.</p> <p><b>Base dimensions:</b> 1'4" x 6'2"</p> <p><b>Height:</b> 2 ½'</p> <p><b>Weight:</b> ½ ton</p>
		<p><b>Name:</b> The Harpies</p> <p><b>Text on plaque:</b> These bird women were the embodiment of conscience and tore at the hearts of evil-doers.</p> <p><b>Base dimensions:</b> 4' x 4'</p> <p><b>Height:</b> 3'</p> <p><b>Weight:</b> 1 ½ tons</p>

		<p><b>Name:</b> The Hydra</p> <p><b>Text on plaque:</b> A monstrous dragon with nine heads originally – however if one head was cut off, two heads grew in its place. 		<p><b>Name:</b> Mermaid</p> <p><b>Text on plaque:</b> A sea nymph having the body of a woman and the tail of a fish. Here she holds a merbaby and a young dolphin.</p> <p><b>Base dimensions:</b> 1 ½' x 6'</p> <p><b>Height:</b> 2 ½'</p> <p><b>Weight:</b> ½ ton</p>
		<p><b>Name:</b> The Minotaur</p> <p><b>Text on plaque:</b> Half bull, half man, he guarded the maze for the king of Crete until vanquished by the Greek prince Theseus.</p> <p><b>Base dimensions:</b> 4' x 4'</p> <p><b>Height:</b> 3'</p> <p><b>Weight:</b> 1 ½ tons</p>

		<p><b>Name:</b> Orpheus</p> <p><b>Text on plaque:</b> He charmed the creatures of the forest with his wonderful playing of the lyre and his heavenly singing.</p> <p><b>Base dimensions:</b> 4'6" x 3'</p> <p><b>Height:</b> 6'</p> <p><b>Weight:</b> 2 tons</p>

		<p><b>Name:</b> Sea Horse</p> <p><b>Text on plaque:</b> These creatures appeared on the surface of the Mediterranean as whitecaps. In large groups they could stir up quite a storm if the wind was right.</p> <p><b>Base dimensions:</b> 4' x 1'8"</p> <p><b>Height:</b> 3'</p> <p><b>Weight:</b> 800 lbs</p>
		<p><b>Name:</b> The Sphinx</p> <p><b>Text on plaque:</b> A strange creature with claws of a bird and the body and tail of a lion. This woman would devour passing travelers if they could not answer her riddle right away</p> <p><b>Base dimensions:</b> 4' x 3'</p> <p><b>Height:</b> 4'</p> <p><b>Weight:</b> 1 ½ tons</p>


