



Record numbers of drug-related deaths in Toronto in 2021




Suspected drug-related and confirmed opioid toxicity deaths in Toronto

We are facing a drug poisoning crisis



 Toronto is facing a drug poisoning crisis, with at least 511 preventable deaths in 2021.

The drug poisoning crisis continues to worsen during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Unregulated drug supply is increasingly dangerous.

Situation remains urgent



Worsening crisis

- increasingly toxic unregulated drug supply
- drug criminalization

Actions taken; Partnerships strengthened

- more are needed
- progress made, but crisis continues

Updating Toronto's Drug Strategy

Ongoing federal partnership is needed



Federal Government

 National decriminalization for the possession of all drugs for personal use

 Support immediate scale up of prevention, harm reduction and treatment services

Continued funding and additional support for safer supply options

Opportunity for more provincial support



Provincial Government

- Scale up prevention, harm reduction, and treatment services, including safe inhalation
- Support more safer supply options, and more consumption and treatment services
- Long-term funding for drug checking
- Fund a Substance Use Crisis Centre and systems-level approaches to crisis

Toronto continues to take action



Medical Officer of Health

- Continue working with Health Canada on decriminalization
- Conduct community consultations throughout 2022 to inform a refreshed Toronto Drug Strategy
