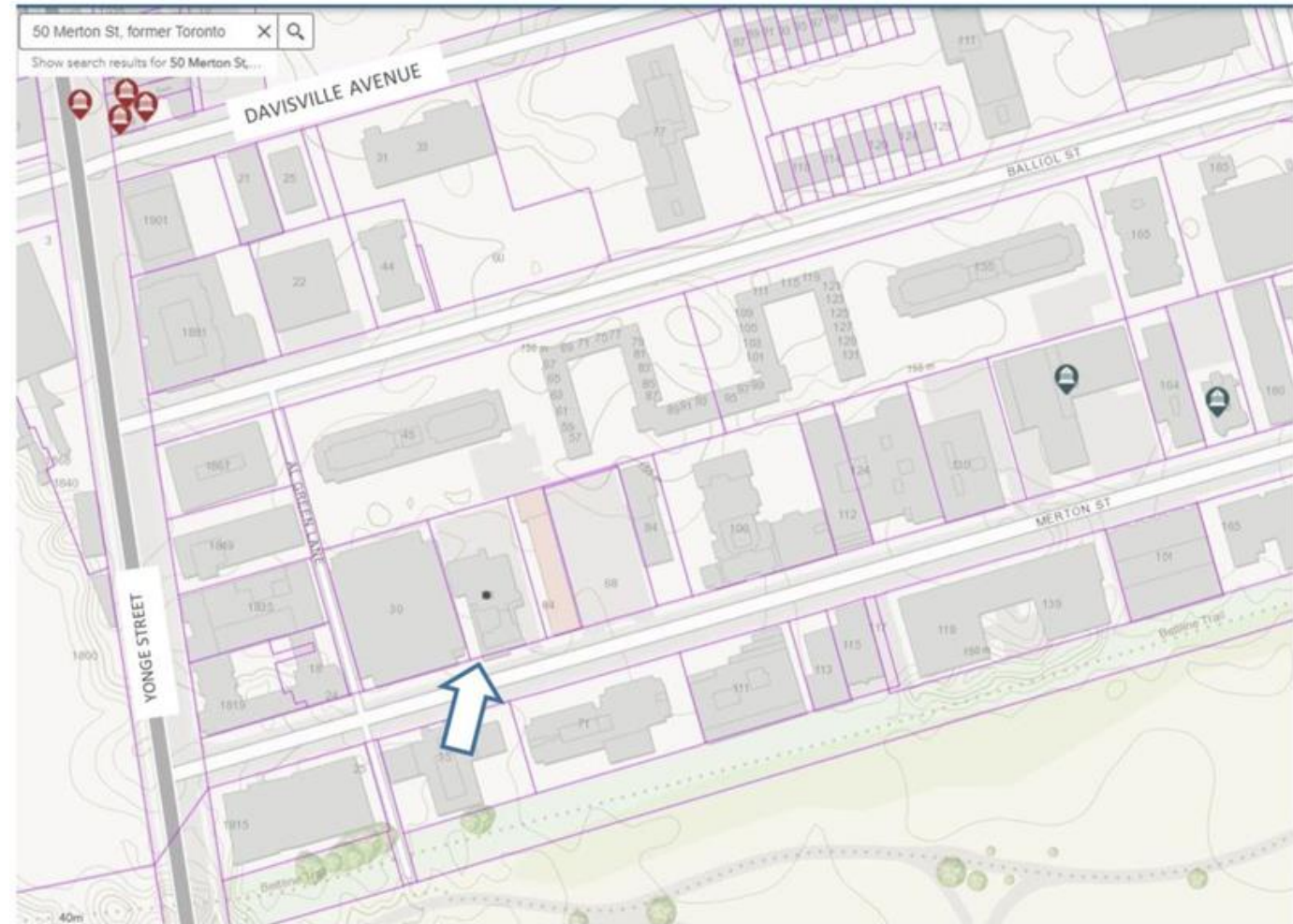

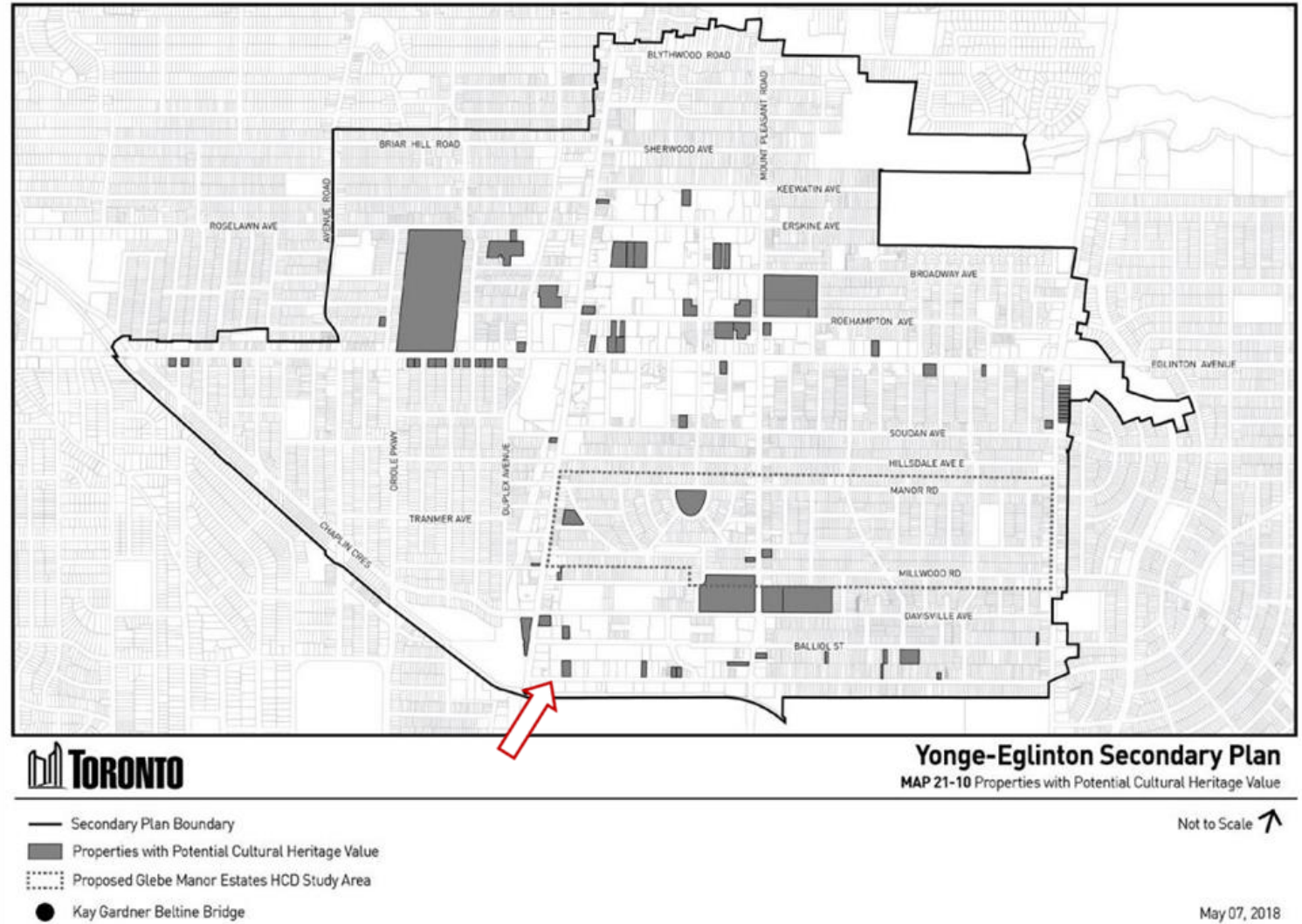
Above: aerial view of the property at 50 Merton Street and surrounding neighbourhood

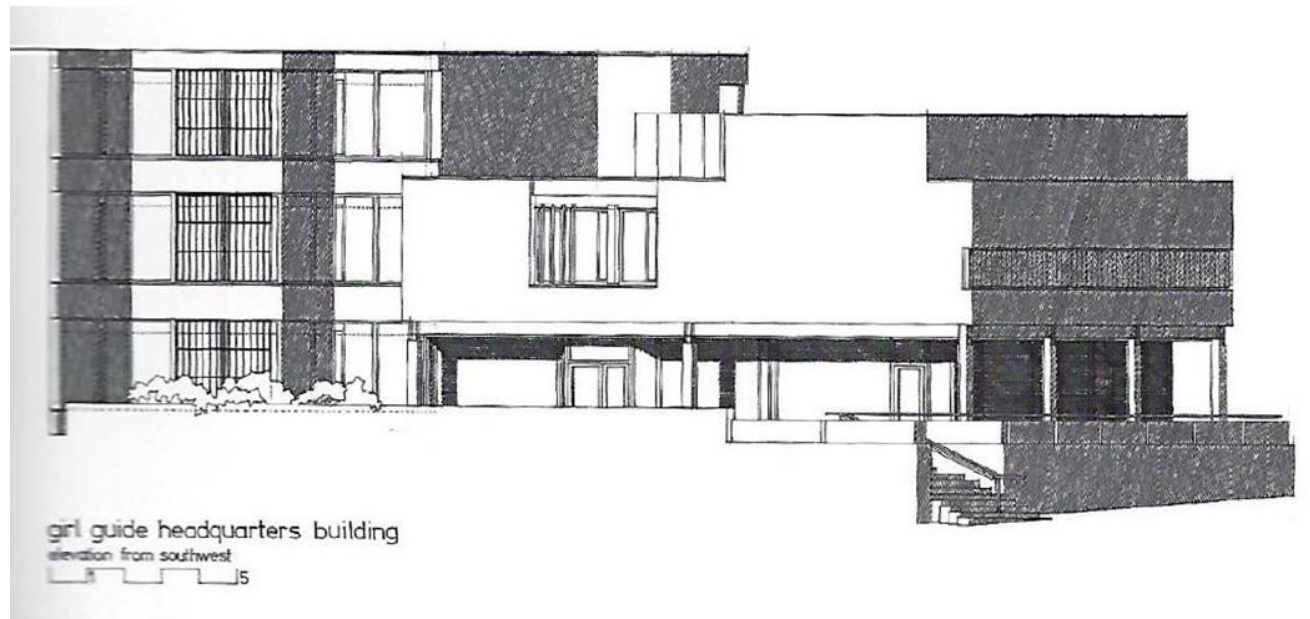
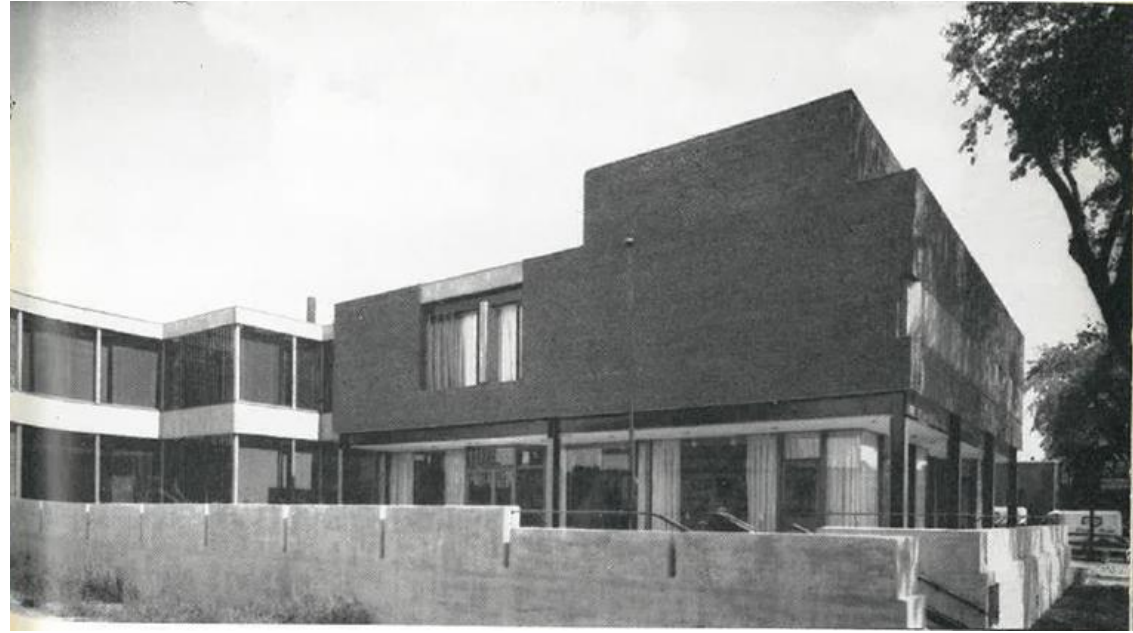
