Attachment 2 – Summary of Public Questionnaire Results

In November, 2021, a public questionnaire was launched to obtain feedback and opinions on targeted questions about outstanding Council directives. 720 responses to the questionnaire were received, with 619 reaching the end. This questionnaire was available for a month and hosted on the City's website. It was promoted through corporate social media and mailing lists. The survey respondents were not chosen by a sampling method, and the results listed below are not controlled or weighted. The feedback and opinions of those who answered the questionnaire may not necessarily be representative of the opinions of the general population of Toronto.

 - 37% Yes
 - 63% No

 - 16% Disagree

Snow and Ice Removal

- 4. Are you concerned with timely snow and ice removal on private property in Toronto, including multi-unit residential towers, and non-residential properties?
 - 74% Concerned
 - 11% Neutral
 - 15% Not concerned

Right of Entry
