

Endangered Species Reserve Fund - 2022 Budget

SUMMARY

The Endangered Species Reserve Fund (ESRF) supports conservation and education projects to benefit endangered species in Canada and around the world. The 2022 Endangered Species Reserve Fund Budget is attached for approval.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The Chief Executive Officer recommends that:

1. The Board of Management of the Toronto Zoo approve the Endangered Species Reserve Fund Projects listed in Appendix I with net expenditures of \$150,000.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

Based on anticipated revenue and interest income of \$8,036 listed in Appendix I, the ESRF balance would decrease by \$141,964 on a net basis for 2022, versus the prior year.

DECISION HISTORY

As part of its conservation mission to connect people, animals, and conservation science to fight extinction, the Toronto Zoo undertakes many conservation and research projects. These projects take place locally, nationally, and internationally for the benefit of threatened and endangered species, promoting species survival, reproduction, and habitat preservation.

The Zoo's Endangered Species Reserve Fund (ESRF) was established for the purpose of fulfilling this mission and increasing investment for these activities. Funds have historically been collected through fundraising on site and accumulated interest from the Fund balance. Bequests are on deposit in the ESRF from previous years. Approval by the Board is required for all disbursements from the ESRF.

COMMENTS

The fund balance as of 2021-12-31 was \$803,615 and is influenced by the timing of expenditures, interest income and revenue from various donations. The current balance of the fund and projection of income for 2022 will result in a projected fund balance of \$661,651 by year-end 2022 (including earned interest). A summary of the 2022 projects is attached for your review (Appendix I).

The establishment of the Toronto Zoo Wildlife Conservancy (Wildlife Conservancy) in 2019 has increased the amount of funds available to support conservation initiatives. The Wildlife Conservancy recently made a 10-year, \$500,000 commitment for orangutan and gorilla conservation, which brings the total investment in conservation initiatives from both organizations to \$200,000 annually. Over the next 5 to 7 years the Zoo's ESRF will be drawn down and a new model established with funding being provided through the Wildlife Conservancy and through migration of current operations-critical projects into the Zoo base budget.
