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Shelter System Data

Nightly shelter system occupancy

Following a reduction in system capacity in the early months of pandemic response, SSHA has since significantly increased number of individuals provided with shelter service each night.



Daily unmatched callers on Central Intake service queue

In late 2020, SSHA began tracking callers to its Central Intake referral service who could not be matched to a shelter space. Unmatched callers have reached all time highs in July 2023.



Families on Central Intake placement list

In January 2022, SSHA reintroduced its family placement list. Where the unmatched callers metric tracks singles, the family placement list indicates the number of families waiting to access shelter. In August, 2023 the list has reached record levels.

City of Toronto Actions taken

- Continued to scale our temporary response since the borders reopened
- Most recently expanded capacity by 250 beds through Red Cross
- Contributed to COHB expansion for up to 1,350 households
- Activated the City's Refugee Capacity Plan to facilitate coordination
- Enhanced the DonateTO website
- Intensified intergovernmental advocacy and regional engagement
- Supported local churches providing space
- Identified solutions for immediate action by the federal government

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Options identified for Federal Response

Options	Potential Capacity	Estimated Cost
Hotel spaces available outside Toronto	Hotel options are available outside of Toronto. These could be stood up by regional partners or the Federal Government.	Approximately 500 spaces at estimated 3 month cost of \$6M
Increase the Canada Ontario Housing Benefit (COHB)	An investment from the Federal Government would provide support towards permanent housing to another 675 households in Toronto.	\$6.67M
Mobile Health Unit tents	The Federal Government to secure all-season Mobile Health Units to create capacity for up to 200 spaces.	Cost estimates for operating costs for 3 months at \$2.5-3M and initial setup of \$4-5M
Reception Centre	Federal Government to establish a 24/7 reception centre as a welcoming space to offer centralized services for newly arrived refugee claimants. Canadian Red Cross and Toronto-based representatives from the Ontario Coalition of Agencies Serving Refugee Claimants have been identified to support operations.	Annual costs TBD
Purchase of hotel or retrofitting a building	Shelter and/or housing for refugee claimants in Toronto or GTHA	TBD
