








This location map is for information purposes only; the exact boundaries of the property are not shown. The arrow marks the location of the site.

His Grace, Archleshop Pocock expressed those words at the opening of St. Joseph's Motherhouse, Morrow Park, Toronto on April 30, 1981. The opening of this new building marked a crowning achievement in the long history of the Congregation of St. Joseph which was founded at Lie Prysen-Velay, France in 1651. was founded at Le Pry-en-Veloy, France in 1631.
Since their establishment in Toronto two hundred
years later, the work of the Order has become renovemal throughout Guneda.
In the just, the Sisters of St. Joseph maintained
two principal residences for members of their conf-

gregation in Toronto - one at the old Motherhouse is mid-town Toronto, and the other for the elder Sistem at St. Joseph's on-the-Lake in Scarborough, outside Toronto. The establishment of a centralized house, which would act as a residence, an administrative building for the Order in Canada, a house of training, a hospital for the infirm, and a high school is expected to improve the administration of the grade











1965 aerial photograph; location of 3377 Bayview Avenue indicated by the arrow.




