




PB8.12 Origins of the Former City of Toronto's Heritage Inventory (1973-1998)

- In 1972, the former City of Toronto requested that the Toronto Historical Board work to preserve buildings in Toronto of architectural merit.
- In 1973, the Board, with the financial assistance from the federal and provincial governments, undertook a survey of the 1850 city. The survey area was bounded by Bathurst Street, Bloor Street, the Don River, and Lake Ontario.
- On June 20, 1973, the City adopted its first list of 490 entries onto the City of Toronto's Inventory of Heritage Properties.
- By 1977, the Register had expanded to 1,200 properties with 120 properties of these having been designated.



Former City of Toronto Heritage Inventory – June 20, 1973

- The Toronto Historical Board's survey of historical properties focused on area the 1850 city boundaries (Bathurst Street, Bloor Street, the Don River, and Lake Ontario)
- 490 properties adopted by Council on June 20, 1973














No. 574-75. A BY-LAW

To designate the Dead House in St. Michael's Cemetery at the rear of number 1408A Yonge Street of architectural value and of historic interest.

[Passed December 10, 1975.]







Scarborough's Civic Centre opened with a Royal visit and considerable fanfare on June 29, 1973.


This modern facility was built to house the municipal offices of the Borough of Scarborough and the offices of the Scarborough Board of Education.
