## RE: TE4.16 1366 Yonge - Official Plan and Zoning By-law Amendment Application - Decision Report - Refusal

Dear Chair Councillor Gord Perks and Members, Toronto and Easy York Community Council

The Deer Park Residents Group (DPRG) represents residents in the area between the Beltline to the north and Woodlawn Avenue West and the properties on Jackes Avenue to the south, Avenue Road to the west and Mt. Pleasant Cemetery and the Vale of Avoca to the east.

The DPRG supports the recommendations of the report to refuse the application. This proposal for a 41 storey building that does not conform with the Official Plan or Yonge-St. Clair Secondary Plan, and does not meet the intent of the Tall Building Design Guidelines for building setbacks and stepbacks and zoning requirement for parking and loading. The site is far too small for such a building. Unfortunately, it appears that the applicant has been unwilling to make the needed changes.

The reasons for refusal reflect the issue raised in the public consultation - the extent of non compliance with height, density and massing provisions for the site, the insufficient setbacks and step backs, the impacts on adjacent property to the north, shadow and wind impacts, the lack of vehicular parking and resulting traffic impacts, and resulting construction impacts.

In addition, strong concerns have been raised by the community about the loss of the existing medical building. We also recently lost our long time hardware store in a nearby development project.
