Re: TE7.20 - 402 and 404 Sherbourne Street - Inclusion on the Heritage Register

Chair and Members of the Toronto and East York Community Council,

I am writing to you to voice support for the inclusion of 402-404 Sherbourne Street, Toronto on the City of Toronto Heritage Register.

On 17 April 2022, I nominated 402-404 Sherbourne Street for heritage status. 402-404 Sherbourne Street is an excellent example of an early Bay-and-Gable semi-detached residence constructed in c. 1874.

To the immediate north of 402-404 Sherbourne Street is an active redevelopment application proposing a 39-storey condominium tower. Area residents have also advised of other land assemblies underway to the immediate west of 402-404 Sherbourne Street on Maribeth Avenue and Homewood Avenue. I encourage a heritage survey of Homewood Avenue to be conducted as soon as possible.¹

Alongside being an excellent example of an early Bay-and-Gable semi-detached residence, 402-404 Sherbourne Street has a number of important historical associations particularly during the late 19th century. Former residents of note during this period include:

- Sir William Mulock an influential and important Canadian jurist and politician.
- Alan Cassels an influential jurist who married into the Allan family. The Allan family were early landowners and donated Allan Gardens to the City of Toronto. The family established the law firm *Cassels*.
- John Lyman the co-founder and owner of the *Northrop-Lyman Patent Medicine Company*.
- Andrew Somerville the proprietor of the *Ontario Lead Works*.
