# **PRESIDENT & CEO'S EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

There was magic at the end of 2023, both literally and metaphorically.

The year went out with a roar as our co-presentation of Champions of Magic entertained full houses in the post Christmas to New Year's week. Just prior to that, we had a very strong presentation of the Muppets Christmas Carol with a live orchestra. These shows, along with busy rentals filling all the downtown halls and several uptown spaces, brought in a muchappreciated upswing in revenue at the end of the year. This, combined with strong fiscal management and restraint in spending in the last two quarters, pushed the end of year projections out of the red and solidly into a surplus position.

I'm always incredibly grateful for the hardworking team at TO Live, who worked throughout most of the traditional holiday period to bring the joy of live performance to Toronto audiences. Thank you as well to the artists and audiences who support us through their enthusiasm for the arts and its vital impact on our communities.

We are excited to start a new year together, and looking forward to our 2024 programming and the inspiring developments on the St. Lawrence Centre redevelopment project.

# PROGRAMMING

The 2023 year saw a very busy conclusion with a broad range of activities on stage and in the community.

### **TO Live Presents**

- The annual <u>Fall For Dance North Festival</u>, on which TO Live has partnered since its inception, again included two Signature Programs in Meridian Hall, and the premiere screening, and accompanying panel discussion, of the opening episode of the CBC docuseries *Swan Song* in celebration of recently retired NBOC Artistic Director, Karen Kain.
- The <u>New York Philharmonic String Quartet</u> played to the strengths of the George Weston Recital Hall with a program of Mozart, Schubert and contemporary composer Joel Thompson.
- The following evening, <u>Patti LuPone</u> gave us an unforgettable performance of her autobiographical concert *Don't Monkey with Broadway* also in Meridian Hall (Nov 17).
- <u>collectif9</u>, is a chamber music ensemble from Montreal who seek to reinvent the way that audiences experience classical music. Their staging of music from the Middle Ages to the current day with choreographic accompaniment was no exception. A local cello duo, VC2, opened the program at the Meridian Arts Centre (November 23). A special <u>school</u> <u>performance</u> was well attended the following morning, arranged by our Communities and Outreach Department.
- The final concert for the year in the George Weston Recital Hall featured legendary guitarist John Scofield, in trio formation. A packed house leant into every note of this memorable concert.
- Downtown in the Jane Mallett at the St Lawrence Centre, in a double-bill with <u>Digging</u> <u>Roots and Lacey Hill</u>, audiences experienced the energy, power and beauty of these acclaimed Indigenous artists.
- The combination of film and live orchestra continues to be a popular phenomenon, and TO Live's presentation with Glatz Concerts, of films from the James Bond franchise, <u>Skyfall</u> and <u>Casino Royale</u> in November, followed by <u>The Muppet Christmas Carol</u> in the lead up to the holidays in December, were no exception. The latter in particular brought delight to audiences spanning generations and an extra performance was scheduled to meet demand.
- The holiday mood continued, when the <u>*Champions of Magic*</u> co-presented with Starvox Entertainment, brought cheering audiences to their feet. The TO Live Housekeeping staff deserve special thanks for making sure every sign of the mountains of confetti was removed after each show ensuring that each audience was surprised and amazed afresh.



### **Making Space**

Continuing TO Live's narrative as a meaningful and active contributor to Toronto's cultural life through provision of space, residencies, and other support:

- TO Live provided space and some financial support for:
  - Tanveer Alam, Candace Kumar, and Lady C, three of the 2023 *explorations* artists.
  - SaMel Tanz, a dance collective to whom we have provided support over multiple residencies, Rumi Jeraj (Garage rehearsals), Yvonne Ng, and SummerWorks festival.

#### Rentals

Highlights included:

- An evening with <u>Jane Goodall</u>, inspirational ethologist and conservationist;
- Persian singer songwriter Shahram Shabpareh;
- Comedy continued to have a strong presence including the Emmy nominated <u>Nimesh</u> <u>Patel</u>, and Egyptian American, *Ramy Youssef*;
- Canadian Stage was in residence in the Bluma Appel with seasons of Akram Khan's <u>Jungle</u> <u>Book Reimagined</u>, Kidd Pivot's <u>Assembly Hall</u>, and <u>The Lehman Trilogy</u>;
- <u>Menopause the Musical 2</u>, ran through the second half of November, and Starvox Entertainment closed out the year with <u>Potted Potter</u> also in the Bluma Appel;
- Other resident companies were also busy in the final quarter including: Toronto Operetta Theatre with <u>*The Merry Widow*</u>, and various concerts by Music Toronto;
- At the Meridian Arts Centre, Bravo Academy again took a month-long booking in The Studio, Harold Green presented their final production for the year, <u>Knock Knock</u>, and Amadeus Choir, Mandle Philharmonic, Sinfonia Toronto and resident company, Orchestra Toronto presented concerts as did the Toronto Symphony Orchestra.

#### **Communities and Outreach (C&O)**

- The longstanding partnership with Xenia Concerts, who present concerts for neurodiverse audiences is one of our most significant. Their Q4 concerts with the <u>Dior String Quartet</u> and <u>Pulse Music Collective</u> provided an impactful finish to their year.
- Community dance classes continued at Meridian Hall with <u>Folk-Bollywood</u>, and at the Meridian Arts Centre, where the new partnership with North York Arts is delivering on its potential to build new audiences with classes such as <u>Needle Felting</u>.
- C&O's renewed focus on school age students referenced above in relation to the school's performance with collectif9, took on a new dimension with the launch in Fall 2023, of the new <u>Summer Camp</u> initiative which will commence in 2024.



### **Corporate and Private Events**

- The <u>Corporate and Private Events</u> Department had its most successful year ever in 2023.
- The education sector has been a significant driver of this growth with new clients including Seneca College and longstanding clients such as George Brown and St Clair Colleges.
- Awareness of TO Live venues for private events has been boosted by excellent social media coverage via its various channels including <u>@toliverentals</u> and <u>podcast series</u>.

### Production

- Production continued its program of updating equipment and infrastructure in the theatre spaces, through both its own initiatives and working with the Capital Projects department.
- Significant upgrades to lighting and video equipment were either completed or initiated at Meridian Hall and Meridian Arts Centre. In addition, some of critical systems repair was undertaken at the St. Lawrence Centre to ensure that the stages systems are safe and functional for the foreseeable future.
- Through the development of new contacts at Seneca, the Production Services department
  has been able to find new candidates for the mentorship program that aims to have young
  members of BIPOC communities gain practical production management experience in
  working venues at the start of their careers. Two candidates from Seneca will be interning
  with Production in the first half of 2024.

#### **Ticket Services**

- Q4 was the busiest quarter of ticketed activity both of 2023 and since the pandemic closure in general, with Ticket Services providing box office support and customer service across over 260 events at TO Live's principal three venues and the Elgin & Winter Garden Theatre.
- The ticketed events in Q4 of 2023 saw over 184K ticketed attendees, along with over 187K new tickets booked within the quarter.
- In collaboration with the Marketing team, a new design for physical tickets was put together and the new ticket stock ordered that is now in use.
