# **CONSTRUCTION IN TORONTO**

# Toronto is the busiest city in North America for construction (250+ cranes in the sky)

- Construction-related road closures are the biggest contributor to Toronto's congestion.
- Unprecedented growth and development with a high volume of construction related to:
  - City-led (growth & state of good repair) 47%
  - Utility work (upgrading and replacing aging infrastructure) 38%
  - Transit expansion 8%
  - Development work (housing) 5%
  - TTC (Easier Access Program) 2%



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# **CONSTRUCTION IN TORONTO [2]**

- Important to note the duration of projects on the right-of-way
- The following details proportionately who is occupying the right-of-way annually in terms of time:
  - Transit expansion 42%
  - Development work (housing) 33%
  - City-led  **15%**
  - TTC (Easier Access Program) 8%
  - Utility work 2%



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# Accessibility around City, TTC and Metrolinx led construction projects

## **Updates to the City's Work Zone Standards**

- This year focused on developing new standards to advise on accessibility in work zones
- Creation of new road occupation reporting system, RODARS Central
- Updated TS1.00 specification that provides more clearly defined requirements for accessibility around work zones
- Updated specification GN134SS Pedestrian and Cyclist Safety and Accessibility considerations
- Also includes penalties for non-compliance
- New standards already going into new contracts

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## **Enforcement Supported by New Standards**

- Working with Engineering Construction Services, Toronto Water, TTC and Metrolinx to improve upon regular construction inspection and enforcement of the contract requirements to ensure accessibility at the work zones
- \$5000 fine for every 12-hour period that AODA requirements are not met.
- This will be enforced by the contract management team





# Accessibility around Utility and Development Work

## **Work Zone Inspections for Compliance**

- Beginning, During and Completion
- Bringing Lived Experience Experts on board to support inspection process
- New pedestrian accessibility checklist for construction work zones
- New contract specification GN134SS



## **Introducing Fees for Non-Compliance**

- Construction Congestion Management Fees and Levy being brought through the 2025 budget process
- Opportunity to introduce fees for non-compliance



#### **Use of Technology for Communications and Wayfinding**

- Creation of new Road Occupation and Disruption Activating Reporting System called RODARS Central
- Integration of Improved wayfinding abilities that utilizes QR codes
- New graphical layout of pedestrian and Cyclist impacts with mitigation measures

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### **Use of Technology for Communications and Wayfinding [2]**

- Seeking technology solutions for enhanced wayfinding such as Blind Square
- Consulting assignments to seek out better use of technology to enhance pedestrian accessibility



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# Timelines for Improvement Setting Expectations

### **Timelines**

- Specifications going into contracts that are being tendered now for 2025 construction
- New fees for non-compliance going into 2025 budget process to take effect from the spring of 2025
- Consultant being brought on-board to support with inspection support spring of 2025 for summer construction season
- Noticeable difference anticipated in the 2025 construction season



### **Immediate Actions**

- Working to improve ability for residents to report work zone accessibility issues through 311
- City Staff being trained on new accessibility guidelines through internal training
- Work zone team is staffing up to be able to respond to resident complaints regarding accessibility issues around private construction
- Still challenging to deal with immediate issues but, staff are striving to continually improve
