## Comments:

I'm a citizen of Toronto, ward eleven. I've lived here for over twenty years and I have two kids attending elementary school. I'm very concerned about safe consumption sites and the proposed closures by the province. People will continue to use drugs whether or not they have access to a SCS; these closures are NOT in the interest of public health or safety. Without SCS, more people will be using drugs in public, without safe ways to dispose of needles. Most importantly, closing SCS will lead to more overdose deaths among our residents and this is unacceptable. Deaths due to overdose is a public health emergency. I'm urging the city to fund SCS past the province's March '25 closure deadline.

Toronto crime data shows that assault and robbery either declined in neighbourhoods with SCS, or had a smaller increase than neighbourhoods without SCS. Keeping them open is safe, and benefits all residents.

The city needs to ensure their operation permanently, by finding money in the budget.
