





Toronto Island - Tomorrow

- Fully electric ferries (2 by 2026-2027)
- Enhanced visitor experience and amenities at the ferry terminal and Island to support four season access
- Island-wide wayfinding signage
- Diverse food, beverage and rental offerings
- Indigenous ceremony and gathering spaces
- Flood mitigation improvements including 3.5 km of improved shoreline habitat
- Management plans in-place to protect the ESAs and wetlands
- A 5 km cultural narrative trail to share all the Island stories
- Recognizes & protects the 2SLGBTQ+ significance of Hanlan's **Point Beach**
- An on-Island transportation system
- A 'Welcome Centre' at Centre Island

Master Plan Funding and Implementation


The 2024-2033 Capital Budget and Plan for PFR includes an overall investment of approximately \$142 M for initiatives related to the Toronto Island Park, Ferry Terminal, and Ferry Fleet Replacement.

This includes:

\$ 29.8 M State of good repair

\$ 112 M Service Improvements.









Next Steps and Progress Updates

Staff recommend five-year progress updates including specific decision points about advancing the recommendations as scope, timelines, and costs are clarified.


