RE: IE10.6 - Delivering Improved Accessibility: Bike Share Toronto's Modernized Rate Structure Update (Ward All)

Dear Deputy Mayor and IEC Chair McKelvie and members of IEC,

Bike Share Toronto continues to be successful at moving more Toronto residents sustainably, affordably and efficiently; as well as dispelling the trope that noone bikes in the winter. Cycle Toronto is pleased that our advocacy efforts have contributed to the development of low fare passes for those living on low incomes, as well as the ability to access the annual memberships without having to pay in a lump sum.

As a valuable city-run program created to help move more people via active modes of transportation, **Bike Share Toronto should not be viewed as a revenue generating stream but rather as a public service that must ensure equitable access to all Torontonians,** regardless of their income or where they reside.

We are writing in support of initiatives outlined in IE10.6 and would like to reiterate our calls asking City Council to direct the Toronto Parking Authority to make Bike Share Toronto more accessible by:

- Providing the option to pay the annual memberships in monthly installments:
 - The option to pay in monthly installments will make a big difference between \$35 (the new option to pay in three installments) and \$8.75 (the monthly cost for the annual membership) for people who earn minimum wage or less.
- Expanding the 100 special Ontario Disability Support Program (ODSP) passes (which are distributed by the YMCA) to all those on ODSP interested in the program.
 - People living on ODSP represent some of our most vulnerable citizens who shouldn't have to choose between buying food or taking transit.
- Outlining how Bike Share will be promoting the special programs: \$5 annual membership to TTC fare pass holders and TCHC rent geared to income), as well as the seniors pass (65+ years) pilot.

- These programs are an excellent opportunity for people only if they are aware of these special discount programs.
- Reducing or waiving the .10 E-bike per minute charge to annual members who reside in Etobicoke, North York and Scarborough.
- These areas of Toronto deserve the same equitable access to Bike Share Stations as the city centre.

The City of Toronto must revisit their cost recovery model for the Toronto Parking Authority in conjunction with their on and off-street parking with the objective of ensuring that the cost of Bike Share is priced equitably, and within the city's current economic context.

This includes keeping Bike Share Toronto very affordable and accessible If Toronto is serious about prioritizing public health, climate action, and transportation equity, making public transportation more accessible, affordable and convenient must be prioritized for Torontonians across all wards.
