Dear Members of the Planning and Housing Committee,

I am writing on behalf of Northcrest Developments, as the Senior Vice President of Development, to firmly express our support for the City-led Downsview Area Secondary Plan. As the major landowner within the plan's boundaries, we see the exponential potential that this project stands to unlock – addressing the critical need for increased housing options within close access to services, employment opportunities, and green spaces.

We have been working alongside City of Toronto staff over the past several years on this project. I can say that this stands as a testament to the much-needed commitment to collaborative urban development. It represents one of the most notable examples of cooperation on a development application of this scale and prospective impact - a plan that closely aligns with the very goals that the City itself and City Council are tirelessly working to achieve. A further testament to its collaborative nature is that the plan is founded on years of engagement with more than 300 stakeholder groups and 6,000 individuals.* The collective efforts reflected in this plan underscore a vital commitment to collaborative urban development, setting a major precedent for cooperation on projects of this magnitude in our city.

The result is a proposed series of new neighborhoods, set to deliver homes for 115,000 new residents, including the construction of 63,000 units – right across the housing spectrum – and creating employment for 52,000 workers. All of this will be connected to the reimagined two-kilometre former runway, converted into a landmark pedestrian boulevard. In doing so, the Plan will not only play an important role in achieving the City's housing targets; it will also deliver a mix of housing options to meet a spectrum of needs, including housing for people of all ages, backgrounds, and household sizes. This range of housing will respond to the needs of a diverse and evolving city. This effort stands as one of the most significant city-building efforts in Toronto's recent history.

But this project is about much more than housing; our plan reflects a thoughtful commitment to complete communities - with a series of vibrant new neighborhoods connected with 40 hectares (100 acres) of new parks, trails, and open space. This is three times the required parks and open spaces, underscoring the major commitment this plan upholds to much-needed green spaces in our city and green infrastructure to help improve resiliency and minimize future repair costs.

^{*} As part of this submission, we have prepared an Engagement Report detailing our activities and findings, which is appended for your reference.

Of equal importance, this plan makes the needed and added investment in social infrastructure and local enterprise, including 2+ community centres, 24-38 daycares, up to 14 elementary schools, one Secondary school, one District library and potential revisions to the existing Downsview Branch, and 11,625 sq.m. (125,000 sq.ft) of community spaces, catering thoughtfully to the needs of the future community, creating environments where people can and want to play, learn, work, and call home. To that end, it makes the big steps to attract new employers, boost the existing small business community, and create thousands of new jobs for local and shared prosperity. Furthermore, by repurposing 3.7 million square feet of existing space for institutional and employment needs, making it a significant employment hub. All of this is planned in such a way to minimize local disruptions and maximize benefits for the area and city at large.

The planning by City staff has also very thoughtfully taken existing transportation and infrastructure into deep consideration, focusing on fostering connectivity through pedestrian-friendly designs and efficient transit options, while advancing equity and accessibility in urban planning practices. With three subway stations and one GO station, the plan will yield significant benefits while helping address the region's outstanding challenges in connectivity and infrastructure readiness for future growth.


All of these combined addresses the unique and pressing needs of our city's northwest. Furthermore, this Plan is located squarely within one of Toronto's Neighbourhood Improvement Areas (NIA) and surrounded by four (4) other NIAs. As evidenced in the Downsview Framework Plan, Northcrest shares the City's commitment to creating new and major opportunities in the community that will lift the area at large and foster shared prosperity. For this very reason, we were thrilled that the Community Development Plan (CDP) was approved just last week by your colleagues in the Economic and Community Development Committee and hope that with the approval of this Downsview Area Secondary Plan, that the CDP can be enabled to become a reality.

Northcrest is unwavering in its commitment to the full realization of the Downsview Area Secondary Plan. With your approval, we look forward to building upon our collaborative partnership with City of Toronto Staff to improve the lives and livelihoods of tens of thousands of Torontonians.

Introduction to Northcrest's Engagement in Downsview

For us at Northcrest, community engagement is the bedrock of planning for thriving complete communities at Downsview. From the outset, we've approached engagement with a firm belief that thoughtfully-planned new neighbourhoods create positive impact for both new and existing communities; that a comprehensive plan for 370 acres of land requires meaningful collaboration with the Indigenous Rights-Holders, African, Caribbean and Black communities, the City of Toronto, and Downsview communities and city-wide stakeholders; and that engagement needs to be responsive to evolving community and public policy priorities as well as our responsibility as stewards of these lands. We are committed to continuing these efforts over the coming years as the project evolves.

We are very proud to share this report, which provides a snapshot of all Northcrest's engagement activities since 2020:

- 1. **Over 120 engagement activities** that were either led by Northcrest for the Taxiway District Plan, co-led with Canada Lands as part of id8 Framework, or in support of the City of Toronto-led consultations as part of Update Downsview;
- 2. Outreach to **over 80,000 people and hundreds of organizations** through direct mail, the id8 e-newsletter, email, phone calls, site activation events, via social media.
- 3. Feedback from **nearly 6,000 voices** at townhalls, focus groups, sharing circles, community-led focussed discussions, open houses, surveys, and other engagement formats held synchronously in-person, virtually, in a hybrid format, as well asynchronously over web-platforms, mail, and telephone.
- 4. Working with over 184 local, indigenous, and equity deserving artists as part of XOXO Downsview, Toronto's Year of Public Art, and more.

To reduce barriers to participation, all engagement materials have been available by request in the six most commonly spoken languages in Downsview – with pronounced efforts made to reach the surrounding Italian, Hispanic, and Filipino communities. Additionally, special accommodations for individuals with specific needs have been readily provided upon request.

Given that Northcrest's engagement began two years before the Update Downsview and the Community Development Plan processes started, we promptly acted on feedback received from the community. Furthermore, the alignment of the community's priorities with Northcrest's vision and early work on workforce development and the support of arts and culture, enabled us to begin work on the Workforce Development

and Social Procurement actions from the outset through our Site Activation and Programming, and by hosting the first Downsview Workforce Development Forum, in November of 2023.

In conjunction with this work, we are thrilled to be the first developer to have signed onto the City Of Toronto's pilot Community Benefits Plan, for the Downsview Airport Lands.

We are thankful for all the participants in our engagement processes for providing valuable insights that have informed, and will continue to inform, our work moving forward. We are particularly grateful for the open and continuous dialogue with our First Nations partners, for discussions with African, Caribbean and Black voices in and around Downsview, for feedback coming directly from the youth-led peer engagement, and for all the local residents, businesses, and organizations that tirelessly continue to show up and work with us. We have heard loud and clear about the importance of respectful integration, the need for both affordable housing and commercial spaces, access to community services and facilities, well-connected parks, resilient city-nature, improved mobility, and local employment and workforce development. We are committed to continuing listening, learning, and moving forward together to achieving the 30+ year vision at Downsview.





In the engagement chart, Northcrest's door knocking efforts and activation events are counted separately as they were an awareness campaign and didn't include direct feedback gathering.

In the engagement map, you'll find the central Study Area map, covering the Secondary Plan area spanning 800 acres along with the adjacent Downsview lands. The first ring depicts the total engagement area, extending 2KM beyond the Study Area and encompassing 64,000 households. We sent five separate cards to these households to seek feedback and invite participation in the process.
