

Item CC34.7: Group Submission on 847-855 Kingston Road




Figure 1. Glen Stewart Ravine North Slope along Kingston Rd. The development at 847-855 Kingston Rd (circled) is precedent setting. Any changes to the OP and zoning for this site would apply to the two other sites along the ravine's northern slope.

847–855 Kingston Rd anchors the north slope of the Glen Stewart Ravine from Beech Avenue to Glen Manor Drive. Currently, unobtrusive bungalows constitute the majority of buildings along this stretch (Figure 1). Rezoning to permit heights beyond the 4-storey Neighbourhood's maximum here is likely to trigger similar applications on the two remaining parcels, eliminating the ravine's naturalized full north edge, destabilising the slope, and threatening the ravine's mature tree canopy and ecological integrity, and the City's climate strategy. We therefore **ask Council to reject any settlement unless it achieves the following:**

- The required 10 m setback from top of stable slope per TRCA policies
- Maintains existing neighbourhood zoning designations in order to discourage overdevelopment of this site.

This is a question of whether Glen Stewart Ravine will survive as a public, protected ecological and climate asset for future generations.

It's imperative that Council reject a settlement whereby the developer undermines ravine strategies in exchange for density greater than otherwise generally permitted (prevailing context). Our asks help to reduce development precedents that pose risks to the remaining ravine adjacent parcels along Kingston Rd and other ravines across the city.

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Executive Summary

This brief represents the unified position of residents and community stakeholders in the City of Toronto, regarding the overdevelopment of Glen Stewart Ravine. The personal letters and notes in the Appendices are emotional, passionate, and well-reasoned, representing the community perspective.

The benefits of ravines are being tallied up all over the City. And there are million-billion dollar investments being made to re-establish them in other parts of the City. To harm a functional ravine, whose economic value in the city far exceeds 99 condo units, is shameful and short-sighted.

The Glen Stewart Ravine is an irreplaceable city asset—a natural sanctuary, gathering place, and ecological lifeline for residents of all ages. This site is unique because the ravine's shelf is narrow and the slope is steep, leading to a spring-fed creek. This ravine is an Environmentally Significant Area (ESA) within Toronto's Natural Heritage System. The applicant first sought approval to build a 7-storey mixed-use building on lands zoned Residential R (d 1.0) (x7) in 2015. The revised proposal in 2022 was an 11-storey 99 unit mixed used condo. If granted, this development would set a precedent across the city and for the two remaining north-slope parcels, exposing the entire ravine edge to mid-rise development and compromising slope stability, mature tree canopy, and ecological integrity.

To ensure the Glen Stewart Ravine's protection, we request that council **reject any settlement** which does not have the following:

- The required 10 m setback from top of stable slope per TRCA policies
- Maintains existing neighbourhood zoning designations in order to discourage overdevelopment of this site.

As an alternate, our group advocates for the **Public acquisition of 847-855 Kingston Rd** (buffer-land objective, Ravine Strategy 2017).

Our Input and Commitment: As the Protect Our Ravine Initiative, we work on behalf of thousands of community members who have lent their voices to protect this space. We offer Toronto's expansive lived experience with the ravine, community stewardship, and research-backed evidence to support Council in upholding the City's environmental and planning policies.

Since April 2025 we have solicited opinions of community members in face-to-face encounters and social media outreach. We present here the community's vision, the overwhelming volume of support (1100+ letters to Councillor's offices, 2750+ petition signatures, and 580+ Council Item Agenda communications), and clear recommendations for preserving the ravine's integrity for today's residents and generations to come, and the future climate stability of the City of Toronto.

In this document we present the community's reactions to the proposed development with further documentation in <u>Appendix 1: Media Mentions</u>, <u>Appendix 2: Letters to Council for Agenda Item CC34.7</u>, <u>Appendix 3a: Summary of Community Voices</u>, and <u>Appendix 3b: Community Notes</u>.

1. Site & Precedent Context

Site Overview: 847–855 Kingston Road is at the southwestern corner of Kingston Road and Beech Avenue; backs onto Glen Stewart Ravine. It is zoned Residential (R(d 1.0) (x7)), with a height limit of 14 metres and density of 1x lot area. The site is currently single-storey detached homes, one-storey commercial office, and a one-and-a-half-storey office with surface parking. The site overlaps and is adjacent to ESA lands and the Natural Heritage System, and falls under the Ravine and Natural Feature Protection By-law. The developer seeks to build an 11-storey (38.2m incl. penthouse) mixed-use building requiring rezoning to Mixed Use Areas and Official Plan amendments.

The Ravine at this site is described as having a narrow shelf and steep slope from which 13 mature trees will be removed to accommodate the developers proposal. Additionally, there is a mature tree canopy (one of the last remaining Carolinian forests), reported coyote dens, over 800 species, a freshwater creek, and well-used public trails on each side of the proposed development.

Policy Alignment Analysis: The proposal is not consistent with the Official Plan (Sections 2.3.1, 3.1, 3.4, and 4.5).

- Official Plan 3.4 (Natural Environment): Requires minimum development setbacks from ESAs and conveyance of hazard lands.
- Official Plan 4.1 (Neighbourhoods): Mid-rise or mixed-use forms are incompatible with Neighbourhood-designated ravine edges.
- Ravine Strategy 2017 (Investment Action 10): Calls for bringing buffer lands into public ownership.
- TRCA Living City Policies: Establish a 10-m setback from the long-term stable top of slope for all development near valley lands.

Cumulative Precedent Risk: The three parcels along the north slope are all subject to similar zoning and environmental context. A decision to rezone or redevelop 847–855 Kingston Road would set a powerful precedent, exposing the entire north slope to redevelopment. This would irreversibly damage the Glen Stewart Ravine and undermine citywide ravine protection policy. Rezoning here will be cited as justification for the adjacent two parcels, leading to continuous mid-rise frontage along the ESA and loss of the ravine's cooling, biodiversity, and slope-stability functions.

2. Community Evidence & Impact

Lived Connection to the Ravine: Residents don't just see the Glen Stewart Ravine as open space – it is woven into daily life: routes for family walks, bird watching, and impromptu gathering spots. This intimate relationship fuels every submission, from handwritten letters to formal petitions, and the over 580 Council Agenda Item submissions.

"I use the ravine every day as a member of this community. I absolutely oppose to any developer changing this precious green space. This is a dangerous precedent to set for other developers. We voted you in to protect our beautiful community and the green spaces they include."

Depth of Community Engagement: Far beyond a handful of comments, this campaign has mobilized broad participation. Over 1100 letters have been sent to Council members, and in the last four days over 580 letters sent to Council regarding a potential settlement, demonstrating sustained commitment.

Volume as a Measure of Priority: Volume itself is a powerful datum. The sheer number of letters and petition signatures (detailed in Appendix 2 through 5) represents a proportional stake: for every signature, one voice insisting that this ravine remain protected.

A. Glen Stewart Ravine: Community Value

A vital part of our urban ecosystem

The ravine is a vital urban ecosystem, used by residents for recreation, education, and health.

"I am writing to express my strong opposition to the proposed rezoning of the area adjacent to the ravine. Given the significant environmental impact, proceeding with this plan would be irresponsible, shortsighted, and ethically unjustifiable.

As a medical physician, I can attest that access to green spaces has been clinically proven to enhance physical, mental, and emotional well-being. Beyond individual health, such spaces contribute to stronger community ties, greater social well-being, and even reductions in crime rates.

For these reasons, I urge you to reconsider this proposal in the best interest of both the environment and the community."

"I walk through the ravine several times a week. It was one of the reasons my family chose to move to our neighbourhood. I see people of every age using the ravine for every purpose you can imagine: kids play in the stream and amongst the fallen tree trunks, folks exercise - sprinting up the stairs or leisurely strolling the path, unhoused and under-resourced neighbours find shade and a cool breeze in the summer, teens walk through on lunch breaks from Notre Dame and Malvern...through my cancer treatment and recovery, it was my place of refuge and solace. It reminds us all that we have infringed on these natural spaces - still full of wildlife - not the other way around. We cannot further encroach on this sacred space that serves so many and makes Toronto - and the East End in particular - a truly unique urban environment. Thank you for taking this issue seriously and advocating on the behalf of so many community members who rely on this ravine and those like it."

"My daughter is a regular visitor to the ravine with Toronto Nature School. We love the ravine and want to see it protected. Our ravines are a unique part of our city and a valuable piece of nature in the concrete jungle. Please don't permit a development so close to the ravine."

Biodiversity

Observed wildlife includes bats, deer, coyotes, raccoons, rabbits, squirrels, opossums and diverse birdlife. Removal of 13 mature trees (7 in the ravine) and injury to additional trees will irreversibly harm habitat.

"Please support our community in protecting the Glen Steward Ravine. This action will not only preserve the land, but also an important ecosystem that houses a wide variety of native plant species, birds, ground water and old growth trees. Once these spaces are encroached upon there is no going back. We all rely on the environmental benefits of these increasingly shrinking natural landscapes. Please do not let our neighbourhood be another community that values land development over preservation. When we take care of the land, the land takes care of us."

"As a Steward of Glen Stewart Ravine I've seen how beautiful—and how vulnerable—it is. Habitat loss, erosion risk, bird flight paths, coyotes, foxes... This condo is just too big and too close to such a gem in our city."

An Integral Part of Climate Strategy

The ravine plays a key role in moderating local temperatures, managing stormwater, and supporting rare species within Toronto's ESAs. The **City of Toronto Ravine Strategy (2017)** prioritizes protection and public ownership of ESAs and buffer areas as "quick wins" for climate resilience and ecological integrity.

Mature urban forests are irreplaceable supports for ecosystem—carbon capture, stormwater absorption, temperature moderation—that cannot be matched by saplings or fragmented canopy.

"We need to get our priorities in check. There will be serious consequences to degrading the ecosystem of this space that the residents of the beaches will pay for. We are in a climate emergency, we have to stop thinking about personal interest and protect what we have while we can."

"On a personal note, Glen Stewart Ravine holds deep significance for me and for so many others in this community. It's not just a beautiful green space—it's a refuge. I walk there regularly, and every time I do, I'm reminded of how rare and precious this connection to nature is in a city as large and fast-growing as Toronto. The ravine is where our children learn to value the natural world, where neighbours connect, and where biodiversity thrives amidst the urban landscape. It plays an essential ecological role in flood mitigation, air quality, and cooling the city during increasingly hot summers. Protecting the ravine is not just about preserving beauty—it's about safeguarding the health, identity, and resilience of our city for future generations."

July 14, 15:13 - Air Quality Health Index (AQHI)

On July 14 there was an Air Quality warning for the City of Toronto. The remarkable images below demonstrate the potential that the Glen Stewart Ravine has to improve the air we

breathe in the city. Ravine destruction has significant health impacts for Toronto residents.




Figure 2.1 AQHI for the eastern part of Toronto. The downtown core has an AQHI of 11, while the Glen Stewart Ravine is 7.

B. Community Vision for the Glen Stewart Ravine

Health, Well-Being & Resilience: Trees and natural corridors mitigate heat, improve air quality, and buffer stormwater—critical for public health and climate adaptation. Cool trails that invite daily exercise and stress relief.

Intergenerational Stewardship: The Ravine nurtures our shared sense of place—where families stroll, seniors find solace, and children learn to cherish nature. Grandparents, parents, and children alike write to safeguard this legacy—not merely for today's voters, but for every future resident.

Equitable Access: We believe in intergenerational responsibility: every resident, regardless of age or background, deserves access to healthy green space. This ravine is a public good, freely accessible to all socio-economic groups in Beaches–East York; its protection advances inclusion more than any rezoning can.

3. Key Strategies for Protecting the Ravine

A. Public Acquisition as the Only Long-Term Safeguard

Public ownership of hazard, buffer, and ESA-adjacent lands is the best way to ensure the continued health of the ravine. This is fully aligned with the City's Official Plan and Ravine Strategy. The City should take all necessary steps to bring these lands into public hands

before any development or approval is considered. This is precedent-setting for the rest of the ravine. We are not only talking about this site. What is at risk is the entire north edge of the slope of this ravine.

Request: All hazard, buffer, and ESA-adjacent lands should be transferred to public ownership, consistent with the Official Plan and Ravine Strategy's call to "bring additional lands within the ravine system...into public ownership"

"There are plenty of places to put condos, but only a finite number of ravines. Please defend this one."

B. Reducing Environmental Risks

Without public acquisition of lands, the following environment protections are crucial to mitigate risks to ravine health:

Mature canopy loss: The planned removal of mature trees and lack of robust replacement measures (only three new boulevard trees proposed) means decades-long loss of ecological function.

- Refuse any net loss net loss of tree canopy, and mature trees should be prioritized.
- All mature, native trees removed must be replaced by large-caliper, native species—no net loss of canopy or slope stability will be accepted.

Request: Maintain or enhance existing canopy. Replacement of removed trees must prioritize mature or large-caliper native trees, not just saplings, to maintain ecological function and public benefit.

Slope & soils: The site is defined by steep, sandy, and potentially unstable soils. There are unresolved concerns about whether geotechnical studies sufficiently address risks of erosion and slope failure, particularly related to deep excavation for underground parking. In the summer of 2025 a mature tree fell on the north slope, just south of the site. In response, the City has requested a geotechnical report on the stability of the ravine's slope.

"I represent a group of 130 people who care about Old Growth. Further development so close to this Old Growth will bring excess use of the area which is a rare Carolinian forest for Ontario let alone Toronto with its largely old growth trees. Old Growth is meant to be under used not over used."

4. Community Input Summary

Council Vote Letters: Over **550** letters written to City Council on the agenda item.

Petition Signatures: Over **2700** signatures collected to date, spanning the Beaches, East Toronto, and beyond.

Letters of Concern: **1100** unique letters from homeowners, renters, and frequent ravine visitors to City Councillors.

Ravine Rally, August 11, 2025: Almost 200 community members attending the Ravine Rally at the Beech entrance to the Glen Stewart Ravine.

Key Themes: Ravine protection; zoning conformity; built form concerns; economic value. (See Appendix 2 through 4 for a full listing of submissions and counts.)

5. Requested Council Outcome

Consider this precedent setting decision to be a decision about the fate of the entire north slope and with implications for ravine lands across the City. We ask that you vote "no" to any settlement that does not:

- 1) **Deny the rezoning / OP amendment request:** Maintain existing Residential zoning and Neighbourhood designation to protect ESA integrity for the long-term. For this site, no increase in height or density beyond what is currently designated.
- 2) Fallback conditions (if any development proceeds):
 - a) Require a minimum 10-m stable-top-of-slope setback; convey all lands below that line to the City/TRCA.
 - b) Maintain or enhance the mature tree canopy, with no net loss, to support slope stability and biodiversity. Require no-net-loss of mature tree canopy (replacement with large-caliper native species where removal is unavoidable).
 - c) Fund and implement appropriate and adequate environmental monitoring (pre-construction through post-occupancy), with public reporting and enforcement authority vested in the City/TRCA. The City and TRCA to implement fully funded environmental stewardship and construction-phase monitoring, with transparent public reporting, based on a specific risk assessment for this ESA.
 - Require City-funded, professional environmental monitoring for the duration of construction and post-construction, with results made public and action taken on all violations.
 - ii) Strictly enforce all environmental by-laws and regulations, with prompt response to any breaches.
 - **d)** Transparent communication: subsequent events, project milestones, developer requests, variances granted, approvals and modifications, and all site visit summaries and documents be sent to or notification given to Protect Our Ravine Initiative within 24 hours.
 - e) We urge the City to conduct or require a comprehensive independent geotechnical and hydrogeological review in light of the recent slope stability concerns due to local tree loss

Looking to the future

Prioritize public acquisition of all hazard, buffer, and ESA-adjacent lands along the Kingston Rd boundary in line with the Ravine Strategy's "buffer lands" objective and the Official Plan. Begin negotiations to purchase 847-855 Kingston Rd, securing continuous public control of the north-slope buffer

Conclusion

The extent and passion of the community's commitment to preserving the health of the ravine for the future are not peripheral considerations—they are the living

embodiment of local policy objectives (Natural Heritage, Healthy Neighbourhoods, Climate Resilience). Centering these voices in your votes at Council ensures outcomes that both respect technical rules and honour the people they serve.

A single rezoning at 847-855 Kingston Rd will set an irreversible precedent, inviting redevelopment across the ravine's entire north slope and other ravine adjacent sites across Toronto. Upholding the existing zoning and, ideally, securing public ownership are the only credible ways to safeguard the City's climate and the Glen Stewart Ravine for future generations.

Appendix 2: Letters to Council for Agenda Item CC34.7

Community Council collects and summarizes the communication of individuals sending personal letters to Council regarding Agenda **Item CC34.7 - 847-855 Kingston Road** (document "Multiple Communications from ### Individuals"). Many wrote personal notes that were <u>not</u> captured in the summary communication. They have been gathered here. They are addressed to and intended to be read by City Council members.

"Ensure that no market value is added to the property whether the developer intends to sell it or try to claim a higher value in case of expropriation. This is my neighbourhood, but the Ravine is also vital to all who reside or work in Toronto."

"It's not a good idea to allow development next to ravines."

"The city needs ravines, forests and trees. It is a benefit to society and it is home to so much wildlife. Help save this ravine. There are other places that can be built on - destroying what little natural spaces are left in Torontos is absurd. Ravines are critical spaces - please fight to save the Glen Stewart ravine!"

"I am very concerned about the proposed development near the Glen Stewart Ravine and want to protect this important green space"

"Our ravines are our treasures in Toronto. It is unfathomable to me that the City would permit the construction of a condominium on the edge of Glen Stewart Ravine. So many citizens work within the Stewardship program to sustain our ravines. Development of this nature runs counter to preservation."

"Pls stop the assault on our beautiful ecosystems we are incredibly privileged to be around. Where and when does the destructon stop? What does it take to realize these areas are more important than any dollar amount??"

"Please protect biodiversity in our ravine which not only supports the wellbeing of people who use the ravine but also the many wild species that call it home. A development in such close proximity to the ravine increases light pollution, degradation of the ravine slope and increases the odds of window strikes for birds. Our ravines should be off-limits for development."

"I'm deeply concerned about the plane for the Glen Stewart Ravine - we need to protect the local environment and be good stewards of the ravine in the face of climate change and mounting pressure/ overstep on the part of developers."

"Toronto's natural areas need to be protected from irresponsible development. A competent government should be able to build adequate housing without degrading Toronto's dwindling natural environments."

"Let us be more 21st century humans. Save our green space."

"There is enough land that is not being developed and is sitting lying and weight that can be used before this land. The only reason developers want to develop the ravine is because they can get a high premium for the location being right next to nature. That's unacceptable as your valuing economy over the environment once again. You can't eat money. This development could easily move to the Quarry land, which is now sitting vacant or somewhere along Girard where there are lots of empty lots. It's unnecessary to be in this location."

"I feel these three stipulations should be hard lines for the approval of any settlement and are more than reasonable accommodations to see this project go forward. My future votes will take careful account of which councillors seek to ensure these criteria are met."

"The ravine is very important to our wellbeing in the neighbourhood, we walk in it daily and greatly appreciate its existence and the natural diversity that has been successfully preserved in it for years. The conditions by which the settlement is reached need to be consistent with the city's Ravine Plan and ensure that the three conditions stipulated by this petition are reached before any settlement is signed (if at all)!"

"This is an important part of the community and an ecologically sensitive habitat. Please work to ensure that it is preserved and protected on behalf of the community."

"I live at Beech Avenue and Kingston Road, in a condo above the new Stavro YMCA, and across from an entrance to the ravine. Toronto's remaining system of ravines - after so many were buried in the 20th century - is characteristic of our city's topography, its neighbourhoods... and our values!

The issues related to this proposal for development are sketched out in the attached, detailed letter. I am simply underlining my personal experience as a long-time resident of this community - this decision matters. Please get this right so that a clear signal is sent to other developers to not think they can exploit our ravine systems for profit."

"Hello! My wife and I recently moved near the Glen Stewart Ravine and are hoping to start a family in the area soon. I have to mention that we would be very concerned if there were any negative impacts to the ravine's ecosystems as a result of development on the northeast corner. Not only considering countless hours that volunteers have put into getting rid of invasive plants, erosion control, and general maintenance of the ravine, the ravine is home to many species of birds that are rarely seen in other areas of Toronto, such as the eastern screech owl, the American bittern, and the eastern wood pewee. This is a unique place in the fabric of East Toronto, with a long history, and it would be very concerning if it was overdeveloped. The need to develop housing is very real; however, I believe this one small part of Kingston Road should be preserved. There are many other sites along Kingston Road that could be turned into housing. Thank you for reading!"

"Please help to preserve our beautiful ravine running through our Beach. This is what makes the Beach such a special place to live...unique and such a part of our beloved Beach for generations. Please do not destroy it with this oversized and misplaced condo."

"Developers don't live here and don't care about the livability of our neighbourhood. The people who do live here cherish the ravine and care a lot. Vote no."

"As a lead steward with Toronto nature stewards, I stand with my colleges at Glen Stewart Ravine, for the health and well-being of their community and the critical urban biodiversity this space represents. Glen Stewart ravine is incredibly biodiverse, and home to over 800 recorded species, including Olive-sided Flycatchers, Eastern Wood Pewees, Common Grackles, Rusty Blackbirds, and the magnificent Spined Micrathena – all species at risk in Canada or Ontario. To destroy any portion of an ESA ravine in Toronto is deplorable, and sets a deeply dangerous precedent in a time of extreme environmental rollbacks. Beyond this, Glen Stewart is a gathering space for the community, and relied upon by the entire neighbourhood. We ask that this proposed project be held to the outlined standards to prevent irreparable damage to this fragile ecosystem, and maintain the strength of ESA ravines everywhere in Toronto."

"The City is currently conducting erosion studies on a different section of the ravine; the effects of erosion on the ravine are clear. The ravine, its inhabitants, and its visitors would all be negatively impacted by zoning changes to allow the condo to proceed as envisioned by Gabriele Homes.

Please do the responsible thing and uphold existing policies."

I grew up running around the ravine and now my third generation kids do the same. This morning, one of my neighbours shared a photo of a scared young deer trying to make it's way back to the Ravine in question, please do not make this any worse than it already is.

Never could I have imagined that the world would have taken the turn it has with so much disparity and increasing environmental crises. We find ourselves in one of those moments in history, where even seemingly "small" decisions, like this development, will have great consequences. First, they tell everyone in the future that we prioritized the wealth of a few over the health of the community. Short sighted returns over centuries of natural growth! Anyone visiting our community will see where our values lay. They will see that we chose poorly and they will fault us for it.

These current shareholders will move onto the next project and our beautiful neighbourhood will bear the scar forever. So I beg the city council to take one small stand in protecting our future, as we all know the developers will keep on keeping on, and we will be another notch in their belt of destroying our collective tree canopy...probably for condos no one can afford or wants to buy.

I have lived near this ravine since my son was 2 years old. It is such a huge part of our lives. I have also volunteered since 2014 with the Friends of Glen Stewart Ravine, introducing countless people to information about native and invasive plants and how to protect the ravine. I was involved in the Ravine Strategy hearings. I attended the initial public meeting on this proposal. I've been a Lead Steward with the Toronto Nature Stewards since the first pilot project 5 years ago. My dedication to my community and this ravine is well known. I have met every councillor and every park supervisor and forestry staff involved with the ravine.

Council needs to know that there is a wondrous amount of wildlife that uses this space, birds that I don't even know their names, but I am happy they are there and are thriving. I was able to see a screech owl only a week or two ago. Small children who are part of a nature school routinely go there. They teach their parents about nature. They love being in nature. I don't know what other city in the world has these little oases or gems right in the heart of their bustling urban spaces. We need these natural spaces more than ever. This proposal is too close to the edge. There is no space for this building. It will irreversibly harm a large oak tree of over 70cm DBH, in spite of the developer's claim that it won't die. You just have to look at how close it is to the proposed building and realize its roots will be severed. Its branches will be cut back, and eventually it will die. This particular developer has a terrible reputation in our neighbourhood. Please don't make a poor decision based on what you think is necessary housing. This is luxury housing on a bad site.

And shame on you if you allow this. I am attending a ravine symposium on Friday, November 7 at the Toronto Botanical Gardens. I will definitely be talking to everyone there about this.

It is critical now that the city upholds environmental policies adopted into City OP along OPA 262 in 2015. It seems lately that the essential component of making a decision on any proposal adjacent to the ESA/ANSIs - Natura Heritage Impact Study (NHIS) - are not in conformity with the criteria set in PPS 2024 and as supported by the official guideline Natural Heritage Reference Manual, 2010.

OPA 262 - https://secure.toronto.ca/council/agenda-item.do?item=2015.PG7.2 - was approved by the Province in May 2016. The OPA is in full force and effect. Natural Heritage Impacts Study is a essential part for any proposal adjacent (roughly 120m) to natural heritage (the ESA, the ANSI, the PSW) documentation prior to be given a complete status by the city staff. NHIS must deal with the full extent of potential impacts: direct, indirect (outside of contruction, e.g. increase use, introduction of pets and impacts on wildlife, trampoline, a loss of connectivity, etc.) If avoidance of negative impacts not possible, the proponent must suggest mitigation. Proposal cannot be approved unless it is proven by the proponent that there will be no negative impacts on natural heritage features and designated ecological function. In case of Glen Stewart Ravine, the proponent seeking attractive location, wants to build a monster buildings right at the edge of protected ESA. This will impact the ecological function of this ESA as increased human activities and potentially non compatible use (pets, informal trails, noise, gatherings, introduction of invasive species, trampling, etc.) How the proponent intends to mitigate indirect/cumulative impacts taking place outside of construction site? No proposal should be approved by the city until all impacts (direct/indirect/cumalative) are fully evaluated and mitigation measures determined.

Please stop destroying our green spaces. Please stop cutting off green spaces from everyone. Everyone, regardless of economical situation had a right to enjoy green spaces and everyone deserved preservation of healthier communities, cleaner air. Affordable housing is needed. There are enough buildings, many not fully occupied available for the more privileged.

I stand in opposition of any developer with a plan to remove even an inch of ravine land - nevermind feet and nevermind trees. It's time to protect nature now more than ever. With increasing floods and wildfires, we must pay attention. Hands off the Glen Stewart and all of Toronto's ravines, parks and green spaces. There are more than several other non-ravine locations where developers can build.

Please do not hand this beautiful, tranquil Public Green space over to a private sector developer. This complex environmental situation demands full access to all of the designs and soils reports pertaining to this vital Project. I have seen too many complex projects get white washed by developers & City planners through committees of adjustment and TLAB over my 30 years as an environmental engineering participant to simply allow this sort of whitewashing to go unchallenged.

This project demands a full review and hearing with the general public's access to all of the data. This is just another Greenbelt schlock by some developer.

Unfortunately we have too many decision makers in the city and province who are too young to have witnessed major soils collapses along the DVP and elsewhere to understand the soils and groundwater interactions along ravine embankments. I have over 45 years of engineering practice across this province. At 84 years of age, I actually witnessed Hurricane Hazel in 1954 and the July 8th, 2013 flood on Mimico Creek. Toronto's Council & planners aren't even coping with historical events, forget about Global Warming. Up until last year, since the 1939 NRC Model Zoning By-law residential lot coverages were capped at 33%. This meant that major storm water management project designs such as the three (3) \$Billion Coxwell storm relief infrastructure were designed assuming storm runoff reductions due to 67% soft landscaping on residential lots.

These storm water management facilities were to upgrade the Donmouth/Port Lands for Film Studios and a whole new community of affordable housing on the Port Lands. To this end Justin Waterhole & Friends gathered on the Port Lands for a Photo "Opp" celebration of the \$1.25 Billion they were to be investing.

As a follow-up to his dabbling in storm water management affairs, Mr. Waterhole used a heavy hand to wipe away any traces of the 1939 Model NRC Zoning by-law including the 33% cap on hard surfacing of residential lots across the province as carried out locally by EHON.

Unfortunately. the major TRCA flood control dams, Clareville, G. Ross Lord and Milne Dams as well as Stoffville Dam to a lesser degree, are well up the corresponding watersheds which makes the subject tributary drainages and aquifers most susceptible to losses in the 33% soft landscaping in the recent municipal by-law requirements.

This fragile ecosystem in east Toronto is threatened by potential development.

There's no question Toronto needs housing. But developer Gabriele Homes had proposed zoning changes for an oversized luxury building that completely ignores the Official Plan, the city's Ravine Strategy. and the height limitations in the neighborhood.

Now, a new proposal is going to council this week, that the community has not been permitted to see.

Council must ensure no there are no compromises and no zoning changes for development on this property at the top of the ravine at Kingston Rd and Beech Ave.

Any building must:

- -- meet the full 10-metre setback and buffer from the fragile ravine edge that is required by the Official Plan
- -- be a maximum of six stories as outlined in the most recent 2024 Mid-Rise Study and the City's Ravine Strategy.
- -- ensure no trees are destroyed. The mature trees on these properties, and in the ravine, are critical because they protect the fragile slope.

The Glen Stewart Ravine is a is a designated Environmentally Sensitive Area (ESA). It's unique because of its narrow shelf and steep slope which lead to a spring-fed creek. And it's one of the last remnants of the Carolinian forest in Toronto. It's also home to more than 800 species of plants, insects and animals, some of which are endangered and rare in the city. And it's a critical resting spot for migratory birds.

Any zoning and building height changes would seriously threaten this precious ravine and set a dangerous precedent for development on other ravines in the city.

Please protect this unique habitat before it's too late.

Glen Stewart Ravine MUST BE PROTECTED!!

The extraordinary heat waves of the last summer showed one of the values of Torontos ravine systems in climate management. There are more, but this one has new data and merits study. It's not like next year will be cooler, climate management is key to a livable city. This alone is worth the investment of you attention, and is related to the ask here.

I understand ample and affordable housing is also key to a livable city. Encroachment on the precious natural resources we have that enrich city living, cool our climate, and clean our air is not a people focused path. And we have all seen developers use fines as fees, break promises, destroy habitat in recent years. Their approach is often feckless in it's speed and lack of fore thought. While environmental studies can be seen as slowing the buildings we need - not if the developers come to the table prepared, with absolute transparency. Glen Stewart Ravine is in an area of high citizen awareness, and the way city council deals with Gabriele Homes ask to build by this known environmentally sensitive area will be observed, remembered and if necessary contested. There is an opportunity to do right by current and future citizens, build trust in the community. I urge you to consider the full scope of what is being asked, and rely on the findings of science, of which the TRCA is well versed.

Lastly - we don't get back what we lose. Even the surface level of community impacts (coyotes from a leveled Ont Place habitat being driven into surrounding residential area), the cascade failure of ecosystems (polluted streams = polluted lakes, fewer hawks = more pigeons) are known. Yes we need homes, desperately. We need them built by accountable, transparent builders and city professionals with ethical vision. Please, city professionals, have ethical vision.

It is absolutely essential that the city protects the Glen Stewart Ravine from top to bottom! Building a condo on Queen Street too close to the ravine on a steep hill is absurd. Please prevent this construction from happening!

I lived in the Beach for 25 years on Silver Birch Ave and now I'm not far away. The Glen Stewart Ravine should be protected. It's a very special place in the heart of the Beach that is loved by many.

The ravine is too precious and precarious to risk this development and rezoning. We cannot undo this choice please recognize that this green space needs protecting for the next generation to keep the wildlife and ensure a livable city for people too.

Walk this ravine path often with my husband and dogs. It is ecologically important and a sanctuary of nature within the City.

Please protect our beloved ravine. The animals and trees are depending on you!

Please find another location to build the condo the people that already do and would love living in the beach area will appreciate the glen stewart ravine. There are other locations to build homes you must look. Build community gardens build more pathways, build places to live but in another location. Keep the zoning intact.

I do not agree with the proposed development at the Glenn Stewart Ravine.

This message comes from both heart and head, with the best interests of myself but also the entire community and the city in mind.

Firstly, East side housing development in GENERAL needs to be slowed down while infrastructure catches up--both public transit and roadways are failing to the point of record-breaking congestion. In fact, multiple Beaches commuters are finalists in CBC's upcoming series "Canada's Worst Commute" so this issue will soon be nationally recognized. Two newly completed massive condo developments around Queen/Eastern between Woodbine and Coxwell that are soon to be populated, and the growing numbers of people moving east, stand to make this already untenable situation worse in the future. Keeping development slow and sustainable is in the interest of all east side citizens!

Secondly, in regards to the ravine--this specific ravine is stunningly beautiful, a community hub, and it means the world to me. But it also is a beautiful example of what Toronto means to the world. Toronto has the world's largest urban ravine network. These ravines make this city beautiful and they make it livable and they also make the city WHAT IT IS--they are a defining feature of the city as much as Toronto's diversity, even profiled in the New York Times. If Toronto doesn't respect and maintain the things that define it, what will be left? A city where people struggle to afford to live there, stuck in the world's worst traffic and filled with half empty unliveabley small expensive condos owned by foreign money? We must protect our ravines with the same tenacity and passion with which we love our city.

All we are asking is that development is respectful of the environment, the community and the LAW as it was INTENDED (regardless of what loopholes have been torn in these laws by a premier who does not live in or care about our city, not the environment). We should not be having to write letters and petitions to have already established guidelines respected, but here we are. This in everyone's best interest, including the prospective buyers of these units! Fewer stories, fewer units, appropriate setback, comfortably sized units with enough amenities.

From the bottom of my heart, I love this ravine and want it to be protected and respected. Walking in Glen Stewart Ravine is a respite from the difficulties of modern life that restores my energy and spirit and reconnects me with what it means to be human--including my connectedness to my environment and my community, and the responsibility that comes with that.

There are not enough green spaces in this city. We do not need to ruin the natural habitat for another condo.

We used to have a wonderful area in the quarry around the corner from where wildlife, fauna and Monarchs rested during their migration. ow look at the mess created! Please do not repeat!

No condos in ravines please. Our green spaces are under threat from development.

This is a BAD idea.

We used to live along Smalls Creek ravine and I saw the ravages of building anything too close to the ravine. I saw a house which was close to sliding in and I saw many, many homes with decks at the top of the ravine or jutting out over it. Each deck shaded the ravine and so, of course, nothing grew underneath and the soil washed away. These homes not only lost decks but they lost backyard.

Ground cover is key to the ravine's survival. It keeps the soil moist and in place. People walking dogs along the path at the bottom of the ravine let their dogs loose and many of the dogs liked to run up and down the walls of the ravine, trampling the ground cover. The exposed soil became dry and dusty and it washed away. This process exposed the roots of the trees and the giant trees started falling. Certainly, there is a cycle of mature trees dying but with the roots exposed it seems reasonable to assume that more trees fell than is healthy.

Ensure that no market value is added to the property whether the developer intends to sell it or try to claim a higher value in case of expropriation. This is my neighbourhood, but the Ravine is also vital to all who reside or work in Toronto.

It's not a good idea to allow development next to ravines.

The city needs ravines, forests and trees. It is a benefit to society and it is home to so much wildlife. Help save this ravine. There are other places that can be built on - destroying what little natural spaces are left in Torontos is absurd. Ravines are critical spaces - please fight to save the Glen Stewart ravine!

I am very concerned about the proposed development near the Glen Stewart Ravine and want to protect this important green space

Our ravines are our treasures in Toronto. It is unfathomable to me that the City would permit the construction of a condominium on the edge of Glen Stewart Ravine. So many citizens work within the Stewardship program to sustain our ravines. Development of this nature runs counter to preservation.

A development in such close proximity to the ravine increases light pollution, degradation of the ravine slope and increases the odds of window strikes for birds. Our ravines should be off-limits for development.

I'm deeply concerned about the plane for the Glen Stewart Ravine - we need to protect the local environment and be good stewards of the ravine in the face of climate change and mounting pressure/ overstep on the part of developers.

Toronto's natural areas need to be protected from irresponsible development. A competent government should be able to build adequate housing without degrading Toronto's dwindling natural environments.

Appendix 3a: Summary of Community Voices

As of 10 Nov 2025, Toronto City Councillors have received 1100 unique submissions supporting this position. The following is a selection of representative community quotes reflecting strong local opposition to the proposed development and deep concern for the preservation of Glen Stewart Ravine.

"Glen Stewart Ravine was given ESA status for a reason—the status must be protected... we need a strong City of Toronto voice at the Ontario Land Tribunal to ensure the ravine's protection."

"As a medical physician, I can attest that access to green spaces has been clinically proven to enhance physical, mental, and emotional well-being... Proceeding would be irresponsible, shortsighted, and ethically unjustifiable."

"As a Steward of Glen Stewart Ravine I've seen how beautiful—and how vulnerable—it is. Habitat loss, erosion risk, bird flight paths, coyotes, foxes... This condo is just too big and too close to such a gem in our city."

"This is not a 'now' problem; it will haunt us for decades if the wrong decision is made. Please protect the ravine."

"Toronto's ravine network is sacred. Encroaching on it is short-sighted and will never be reversed. Zoning rules must stand around environmentally sensitive zones."

"The city voted to protect and expand the tree canopy. This development does the opposite. Do the thing you were elected to do and deny this rezoning."

"Ignoring the setback requirements will result in loss of biodiversity, destroyed habitats, and a dangerous precedent. These regulations exist for a reason."

"The traffic along Kingston & Beech is already heavily congested with three high schools. An 11-storey build would create extremely dangerous conditions... Let's not repeat tragedies like Rachel Turner's."

"It's not enough to be against 11 storeys. The community expects you to be pro-protection of this ravine and other green spaces—and pro-housing."

"Let's make decisions for the next seven generations. Take green space away and we will never get it back."

I read with much dismay in the Beach Metro about the proposed condominium overlooking the Glen Stewart Ravine. I live nearby and walk through the ravine regularly. I especially love hearing the call of the Eastern Wood-Pewee at this time of year. As the biodiversity report on your website indicates, the ravine is a long-established nesting site for the Eastern Wood-Pewee, a species that has seen worrying declines over recent decades and that is listed as "Of Special Concern in Canada" by COSEWIC (Committee on the Status of Endangered Wildlife in Canada). Of course, the ravine is also important habitat for many other bird species.

I am writing to you in particular because, as a longtime volunteer with FLAP Canada, an organization that studies and advocates for the mitigation of bird-window collisions, I am acutely aware of the ongoing danger that a building like this would pose to birds in the area. Presumably a major selling point for the apartments in this building would be the view of the ravine. Inevitably this will mean large windows facing onto the green space. The reflection of trees in the windows would lure birds into flying towards the glass, which would result in many unnecessary deaths. As you may know, scientists estimate that over a billion birds are killed in window collisions each year in North America. The toll in Toronto was recently captured in a prize-winning photograph of more than 4,000 dead birds (https://www.birdpoty.com/2024-winners), a typical number found each year by FLAP volunteers. Since 2000, there have been 54 Eastern Wood-Pewee collisions recorded in the GTA on the Global Bird Collision Mapper (birdmapper.org); it would be tragic if the new condominium added to this total. Especially as the birds nest in the ravine rather than merely stopping over on their migration, the death here of an adult bird might also mean the deaths of any nestlings they were supporting.

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"I can't say enough about the little piece of paradise we call the ravine. It's so much more than a green space. It's really a source of calm, joy, and deep connection to the natural world. I walk through it often with my dog, taking in the quiet beauty. But what makes it truly special is the way I've been able to share it with my Adam Beck kindergarten students for over 23 years.

Each month, we venture into the ravine as part of our learning. The children call it their "happy place"—a space where they can run freely, climb fallen logs, collect sticks and leaves, observe insects, and feel the wind on their faces. We build forts, balance on stones, listen to birdsong and the rustling of leaves, and sometimes just sit and notice. We watch the seasons change: buds in spring, fallen leaves in autumn, and animal tracks in winter. We make bird feeders to hang on the trees and bring our snacks for a quick rest.

It's where imaginations bloom and curiosity is sparked. The children learn to be gentle observers, to ask questions, to notice patterns in the bark of a tree or the ripple of water in the stream. In the ravine, they develop a respect for living things and a sense of wonder that can't be taught from a book.

To develop around this space would be a tragedy. There are so few places like this within walking distance; Places where children can be wild in the best way. Let's protect the ravine, not just for today's children, but for the many generations that deserve to know the magic of learning outdoors."

"Glenn Stewart Ravine is a lovely ravine and an encroachment that a zoning cage would permit will drastically affect the quality of its beauty and serenity that one experiences walking thru Glen Stewart Ravine. At the very least, setbacks should be maintained."

"I am not opposed to building more housing however I am opposed to encroachment on our green spaces. There are so many old, abandoned, run down buildings along Kingston Rd. already. Can we not use them for redevelopment? What about the giant hole left by another developer at around 550 Kingston Rd.? Sitting there ugly and abandoned."

"I treasure the ravine for its peace, tranquility and opportunity to experience a wooded natural space in our neighbourhood. It was invaluable when my children were young, and one in particular, benefited greatly from our walks during a year of home education."

"Our family uses the ravine every weekend for walks and "adventures""

"As a long term ravine property owner I am very concerned about the proposed 11 story development and its negative impact on the neighbourhood and the natural habitat."

"How can we keep letting this happen - we never get land back, we only seem to lose it to condos. Do the right thing please!"

"Please don't"

"This would ruin our beautiful neighborhood"

"Thankyou for all that you do!"

"Our family has enjoyed the ravine through 5 generations since 1922. It has always been a special, relaxing and a place to commune with nature."

"Let's ensure we develop housing sensibly and use the same common sense to preserve sensitive green space. It is our responsibility to make decisions that benefit the common good not simply for today, but also for the next seven generations. Rethink existing developed land (in partnership with churches that need income and serve communities) that could be extended to house more people. Take green space away and we will never get it back. What would our city look like in 7 generations if we kept taking more and more and more green space. How would you that legacy to your children and grandchildren and their children?"

"The city of Toronto council voted in favor of protecting and expanding the tree canopy in the city. This development does the opposite. Please do the right thing, the thing you were elected to do and design this rezoning application."

"Please ensure that developers respect Toronto's Ravine Strategy. There are plenty of other places to erect eleven-storey buildings other than right on the edge of sensitive ravines that serve their communities in ways another condominium never could."

"Please help us preserve this precious space"

"Stop allowing builders to build on ravines and environmentally significant areas. You're selling out land to maintain your job"

"As long-time residents of the Upper Beaches, my family and I use the Glen Stewart Ravine year-round and enjoy the natural beauty it provides. It is where we go to connect with nature and we are concerned that this development will negatively impact the significant ecological features of the ravine and public enjoyment of this natural area."

"We're fortunate to live in a city that has so much green space. We need to continue to protect it so that the wildlife can continue to thrive and that we have a space to step into nature. Please do not let this beautiful space & ESA be at risk by overdevelopment."

"I appreciate you have spoken against this development that would encroach the Glen Stewart ravine. I trust you will continue to voice your concerns."

"Many in the community use this beautiful, well taken care of, natural space. Having these spaces in the city is not only important for us as Toronto residents, but also our eco-system and environment. Please, leave what green spaces we have left, alone. We don't have enough as it is, and the grey clement buildings and construction within this city will do nothing for the declining mental health of the people in this community. If you change or negatively effect Glen Steward Ravine, I can safely say there will be plenty of Toronto and Toronto Beaches residents that will be very upset. Please, reconsider any changes to the area that will impact this lovely area. Thank you for your time and reading this, Hayley. Community member, dog walker and nature lover."

"My children, 8 and 5, have grown up in the ravine and it part of their extended backyard. Though young, they understand that negative environmental impacts that could come from this proposed development. My eldest cited the erosion impacts, water quality issues, and the removal of habitat for the many birds and animals that call the ravine its home. Glen Stewart Ravine was given ESA status for a reason - the status must be protected. I

understand that you are opposed to this development, but we need a strong City of Toronto voice at the Ontario Land Tribunal, and beyond, to ensure the ravine's protection."

"We oppose this condo development as also for many parts of the east end and southwest Scarborough that are close to or sit on environmentally sensitive lands."

I visit the ravine daily for my mental health and it was truly the only place that brought me peace during ibis and still does. This development will destroy the eco system. Abd this communities access to forest. Please do not approve this"

"This ravine is magnificent, providing shade, anxiety reduction and a break from the horrendous traffic of Kingston Road. We need it as an antidote to the global & local horrors that are confronting us and our natural world."

"On a personal note, Glen Stewart Ravine holds deep significance for me and for so many others in this community. It's not just a beautiful green space—it's a refuge. I walk there regularly, and every time I do, I'm reminded of how rare and precious this connection to nature is in a city as large and fast-growing as Toronto. The ravine is where our children learn to value the natural world, where neighbours connect, and where biodiversity thrives amidst the urban landscape. It plays an essential ecological role in flood mitigation, air quality, and cooling the city during increasingly hot summers. "Please protect Glen Stewart Ravine. Save the remaining wildlife and biodiversity! Build somewhere else in Toronto — Scarborough! There are lots of other space options for building condominiums without harming nature."
"I use the ravine frequently — it is a beautiful place of peace and nature within our metropolis. To climb the stairs and listen to the natural world, free from cars and pavement, is really refreshing. The ravine is non-negotiable. No apartment building is worth the destruction and shrinkage of our local ravine system."

"This section of Kingston Road does not need any more dense housing. The parties that strategically purchased these properties for a condo development — low or high rise —

should never have been given a green light. The City must listen to its constituents — especially the youth who have advocated — that Glen Stewart Ravine's ecosystem must not be compromised. I live close to Small's Creek, where the Ontario Line development has had a tremendously negative impact on the ravine habitat, particularly for the birds of prey. Again, there is no need nor demand for a condo development at this particular location along Kingston Road. There are hundreds of empty units in all of the new buildings just a little further east."

"I am not in favour of the proposal to build a condo on the Glen Manor Ravine. This will involve the destruction of the tree canopy and set a precedent for housing on City of Toronto ravines. Please do not vote in favour of this proposal."

"I grew up on Gerrard Street near Main and the house is still in our family. Although I'm a few minutes away now, the Beaches area and Glen Stewart Ravine are still very much part of my world and my life. PLEASE fight to protect it. Nature MUST be protected. Thank you."

We need your support at Council to protect the fragile Glen Stewart Ravine in Ward 19, East Toronto, from severe ecological damage. And the situation is urgent: a developer is seeking zoning changes at Kingston Rd. and Beech Ave to build a condo perched on the ravine's edge.

This is urgent because a confidential settlement agreement on this proposal may be headed to Council soon.

We are appealing to all members of Council to help save this precious and vital ecosystem before it's too late. The city needs housing, and Kingston Road is a candidate under the 2024 Mid Rise Avenues study, but this site is not suitable. This specific proposal completely ignores the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority's (TRCA) rules, it conflicts with the City's own Ravine Strategy, and it is not consistent with the City's latest Official Plan for growth. This decision could also set a precedent that would threaten all of Toronto's ravines. This site is unique because the ravine's shelf is narrow and the slope is steep, leading to a spring-fed creek. It is one of the last remnants of the Carolinian forest in Toronto and is home to more than 800 species of plants, insects and animals, some of which are endangered and rare in the city. It is also a critical resting spot for migratory birds. Building on this site and removing mature trees will threaten the integrity of this ravine and its slope.

We are asking Council to uphold the Official Plan policies that already exist, as any deviation would be offering this developer preferential treatment while weakening environmental and climate protections.

We ask that you vote NO to any settlement for this site unless it:

We need your support at Council to protect the fragile Glen Stewart Ravine in Ward 19, East Toronto, from severe ecological damage. And the situation is urgent: a developer is seeking zoning changes at Kingston Rd. and Beech Ave to build a condo perched on the ravine's edge.

This is urgent because a confidential settlement agreement on this proposal may be headed to Council soon.

We are appealing to all members of Council to help save this precious and vital ecosystem before it's too late. The city needs housing, and Kingston Road is a candidate under the 2024 Mid Rise Avenues study, but this site is not suitable. This specific proposal completely ignores the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority's (TRCA) rules, it conflicts with the City's own Ravine Strategy, and it is not consistent with the City's latest Official Plan for growth. This decision could also set a precedent that would threaten all of Toronto's ravines. This site is unique because the ravine's shelf is narrow and the slope is steep, leading to a spring-fed creek. It is also a critical resting spot for migratory birds. Building on this site and removing mature trees will threaten the integrity of this ravine and its slope.

We are asking Council to uphold the Official Plan policies that already exist, as any deviation would be offering this developer preferential treatment while weakening environmental and climate protections.

We ask that you vote NO to any settlement for this site unless it:
