VIOLATIONS

1. Expenses and campaigning occurred before registration

Third-party advertisements

88.4 (1) No individual, corporation or trade union shall incur expenses for a third-party advertisement that appears during the restricted period for third-party advertisements unless the individual, corporation or trade union is a registered third-party under section 88.6 when the expenses are incurred and when the advertisement appears. 2016, c. 15, s. 48.

Restricted period for third-party advertisements

(2) The restricted period for third-party advertisements in relation to an election in a municipality <u>begins on the earliest day that an individual, corporation or trade union is</u> permitted to file a notice of registration as a registered third-party in relation to the <u>election and ends at the close of voting on voting day</u>. 2016, c. 15, s. 48.

Progress Toronto (PT) registered on **October 8, 2024,** as evidenced in the attached copy of the registration. (Exhibit 1)

Campaigning, including flyers and PT staff and volunteers, started in September. Expenses incurred for flyers, door to door costs, salaries for PT staff were all a violation of the Municipal Elections Act (MEA). (Exhibit 2a,b,c)

2. Contributions in kind received before registration

Contributions to registered third parties

88.12 (1) A contribution shall not be made to or accepted by an individual, corporation or trade union in relation to third-party advertisements that appear during an election in a municipality, or made to or accepted by an individual acting under his, her or its direction, unless the individual, corporation or trade union is a registered third-party in relation to the election in the municipality. 2016, c. 15, s. 52.

Only during campaign period

(2) A contribution shall not be made to a registered third-party, or to an individual acting under his, her or its direction, if the contribution is made outside the campaign period described in section 88.28 for the registered third-party in relation to an election in the municipality. 2016, c. 15, s. 52.

Staff and volunteers campaigned with flyers before registration. Both staff hours spent campaigning and training and seeking volunteers starting in early September. All of these services are donations in kind.

Printing flyers, even printing in-house incurs an expense which is a donation in kind from Progress Toronto. Flyers were printed in September as seen in photos and as stated on the website. **This is not permitted outside of the campaign period** which in this case started October 8, 2024, which is the date of the certified registration. (Exhibit 2a,2b,2c)

This triggered a violation of accepting a donation in-kind prior to registration. Contributions whether donations or in-kind contributions cannot be accepted prior to registration.

3. A bank account must be opened exclusively for the campaign. All expenses must be paid from the account and all donations deposited to the account.

a. Duties of registered third parties

88.26 (1) A registered third-party shall ensure that,

(a) no contributions of money are accepted or expenses are incurred in relation to third-party advertisements that appear during an election in a municipality unless one or more campaign accounts are first opened at a financial institution **exclusively for the purposes of the election campaign**;

(b) all contributions of money are deposited into the campaign accounts;

(c) all funds in the campaign accounts are used exclusively for the purposes of the election campaign;

(d) all payments for expenses are made from the campaign accounts;

(e) contributions of goods or services are valued;

(f) receipts are issued for every contribution and obtained for every expense;

(g) records are kept of,

(i) the receipts issued for every contribution,

(ii) the value of every contribution,

(iii) whether a contribution is in the form of money, goods or services, and

(iv) the contributor's name and address;

(h) records are kept of every expense including the receipts obtained for each expense;

(i) records are kept of any claim for payment of an expense that the registered third-party disputes or refuses to pay;

(j) records are kept of the gross income from a fund-raising function and the gross amount of money received at a fund-raising function by donations of \$25 or less or by the sale of goods or services for \$25 or less;

(k) records are kept of any loan and its terms under section 88.17;

(I) the records described in clauses (g), (h), (i), (j) and (k) are retained by the registered third-party for the term of office of the members of the council or local board and until their successors are elected and the newly elected council or local board is organized;

(m) financial filings are made in accordance with sections 88.29 and 88.32; and (n) proper direction is given to the persons who are authorized to incur expenses and accept or solicit contributions under the direction of the registered third-party.

Exhibit 2a,2b,2c, 4a, 4b,4c,5. All demonstrate staff canvassing before Progress Toronto registered. These are at a minimum, donations in kind and also any expense incurred were not reported or paid from the campaign expense account.

Exhibit 2c specifically states "we will give you support and training,.." for the canvassing on Oct 1. That was before Oct 8 registration. The canvassing was under the direction of Progress Toronto staff.

It was not inadvertent as the exhibit 2a,2b, 2c demonstrates and staff donations have not been included in expenses nor reported as donations.

4. Advertising after voting day

Progress Toronto continued to advertise after voting day which is expressly prohibited.

88.4 (1) No individual, corporation or trade union shall incur expenses for a thirdparty advertisement that appears during the restricted period for third-party advertisements unless the individual, corporation or trade union is a registered third-party under section 88.6 when the expenses are incurred and when the advertisement appears. 2016, c. 15, s. 48.

Restricted period for third-party advertisements

(2) The restricted period for third-party advertisements in relation to an election in a municipality <u>begins on the earliest day that an individual, corporation or</u> <u>trade union is permitted to file a notice of registration as a registered third-party</u> <u>in relation to the election and ends at the close of voting on voting day</u>. 2016, c. 15, s. 48.

The advertisements continued by way of notices and ads that ran promoted Progress Toronto as meeting their goal of defeating Anthony Furey and getting their candidate, **Rachel Chernos-Lin**, elected. These were after election day and are violations. This advertising of their message violates s.88.4 (2) as the advertising was after voting day. (Exhibit 3)

- 5. Bank account must be opened before donations are received and expenses can only be paid from the bank account.
 - The first donation was received on OctOber 10, 2024, according to the disclosed donation list.
 - Expenses were incurred and paid outside of the bank account. Exhibit 2a,2b,2c, 4a, 4b,4c,5.

6. No loan reported

- Expenses exceeded the amount in the bank account as the first donation was received October 10, 2024.
- Expenses incurred before that were illegally paid; an undisclosed loan is a violation.

7. Donations not reported

The Act is specific that donations over \$25 must be reported with contributor's name and account.

a. Contributions exceeding \$25

(8) A contribution of money that exceeds \$25 shall not be contributed in the form of cash and shall be contributed in a manner that associates the **contributor's name and account with the payment or by a money order signed by the contributor**. 2016, c. 15, s. 52.

- It is puzzling why the City of Toronto form requires donations over \$100 be listed when the MEA states all donations over \$25 must be recorded and receipts issued.
- In any event, donations over \$25 are not reported and must be disclosed.

8. Fundraiser expenses not reported properly

Contributions

(3) Without restricting the generality of subsections (1) and (2), the following amounts are contributions:

1. An amount charged for admission to a fund-raising function.

2. If goods and services are sold for more than their market value at a fund-raising function, the difference between the amount paid and the market value. However, if the amount received for the goods or services is \$25 or less, the amount is not a contribution.

3. If goods and services used in the person's election campaign or in relation to thirdparty advertisements are purchased for less than their market value, the difference between the market value and the amount paid.

4. Any unpaid but guaranteed balance in respect of a loan under section **88.17**. 2016, c. 15, s. 53 (3).

- Expenses for the fundraiser and donations raised are reported as lump sums only. The Act is specific that donations at a fundraiser must be detailed to provide the donation less the cost of the fundraiser.
- The expenses for the fundraiser were not reported.
- There is a bank fee of \$437.93 reported for the funds submitted electronically however no expense reported for the fundraiser itself. This is an unreported expense which is a violation and there is an assumed second violation with the expenses for the fundraiser not being allocated to individual donations.
- A lump sum donation of \$8228 less the cost of bank charges of \$437.93. <u>This</u> <u>lump sum is reported is reported without any details of the actual donations,</u> <u>less the cost of the fundraiser.</u>
- The fundraiser was reported to raise \$7,078. This amount does not reconcile with the reported funds donated of \$8228 less \$437.93 bank fees.
- Fundraiser expenses must be allocated to each donor and the amount of the donation disclosed as a NET of the donation less the cost for all donations exceeding \$25.
- That has not been done and that indicates **two** violations have occurred.

9. Illegal donations: Unions cannot donate to a third-party unless the <u>UNION is a Registered</u> <u>Third-party</u>

Contributions to registered third parties

88.12 (1) A contribution shall not be made to or accepted by an individual, corporation or trade union in relation to third-party advertisements that appear during an election in a municipality, or made to or accepted by an individual acting under his, her or its direction,

unless the individual, corporation or <u>trade union is a registered third-party in relation to</u> the election in the municipality. 2016, c. 15, s. 52.

Who cannot contribute

(4) For greater certainty, and without limiting the generality of subsection (3), the following persons and entities shall not make a contribution:

1. A federal political party registered under the *Canada Elections Act* (Canada) or any federal constituency association or registered candidate at a federal election endorsed by that party.

2. A provincial political party, constituency association, registered candidate or leadership contestant registered under the *Election Finances Act*.

3. A corporation that carries on business in Ontario.

4. A trade union that holds bargaining rights for employees in Ontario.

5. The Crown in right of Canada or Ontario, a municipality or a local board. 2016, c. 15, s. 51

- Progress Toronto was a registered third-party. However, Union UA Local 46 was NOT registered as a third-party in the by-election.
- The donation of \$1,000 from Union UA Local 46(a trade union that holds bargaining rights for employees in Ontario) is an illegal donation and must be returned and penalties for accepting an illegal donation applied. The Clerk should identify this according to the procedures for election finances on the City's website as "on the surface" it is an illegal violation.

10. The donations listed as being received and date received doesn't meet the date the expenses were incurred

- The list of expenses paid far exceeds the donations received by the date the expenses were incurred.
- Donations were received from five (5) individuals in the amount of \$1,150 starting October 10, 2024 and ending October 21, 2024.
- There was one union donation in the amount of \$1,000 received November 19, 2024, which must be returned given it was not a permitted donation.

- The fundraiser was held on December 19, 2024, and reportedly raised \$7078. Expenses are only permitted to incur during the campaign period, except for the exempt items.
- The majority of the donations came on December 19, 2024, when the fundraiser was held.
- Expenses were incurred during the campaign such as flyers, salaries, advertising, digital advertising, volunteer training, door-to-door campaigning and expenses, office expenses, internet, and phone. These were incurred with donations of only \$1,150. No expense can be paid outside of the bank account unless it is a *loan* and there are no loans reported.
- There is a clear indication that Progress Toronto was paying expenses from general revenues, which is certainly the case for expenses incurred prior to registration and would account for the expenses incurred during the campaign and paid for outside of the campaign.
- It certainly is the case for office expenses and salaries and photocopying and use of premises and use of facilities for training for volunteers, printing flyers, meetings, and staff from Progress Toronto actively campaigning before the registration date. Exhibit 2a,2b,2c, 4a, 4b,4c,5.
- Sources of revenue for Progress Toronto must be disclosed for all expenses incurred outside of the campaign period and outside of donations that were legitimately received and accepted outside of the bank account
- **Progress Toronto cannot use revenue from other sources** and every campaign is stand alone. No money can used from previous campaigns or general revenues.
- One separate bank account must be used and only used. For all donations and expenses
- Donations must be accounted for, and all expenses must be paid for through a separate bank account.
- As Progress Toronto is a corporation, and can run a third-party campaign, all services have to be valued and included. No expenses were reported such as use of facilities, photocopying machine, rent, staff, parking, phones, website, and board rooms, meetings and training

These are all violations.

11. Salaries not reported

The three paid staff of Progress Toronto's salaries have not been disclosed or included in the expenses nor were they reported as gifts in kinds.

They actively campaigned for three (3) months, starting when the first request for volunteers was posted in September 2024, prior to registering October 10, 2024, and continued to work on the campaign up to and including the fundraiser on December 19, 2024. Their contributions, whether gifts in kind or unreported salaries, were both outside the campaign period for the third-party and an undisclosed expense. (Exhibit 2a,2b,2c, 4a, 4b,4c,5.)

The Executive Director of PT has been a candidate and therefore has direct knowledge of the MEA. (Exhibit 6). These violations are not inadvertent

At minimum wage, for the time period the three staff worked on the third-party campaign, the unreported salaries are a minimum of \$8200.

This amount is unreported, which is a violation. (Exhibit 2a,2b,2c, 4a, 4b,4c,5.)

12. Unaudited return

Auditor

(5) An auditor's report shall be prepared by an auditor licensed under the *Public Accounting Act, 2004.* 2016, c. 15, s. 61.

Exception re auditor's report

(6) No auditor's report is required if the total contributions received and total expenses incurred in the registered third-party's campaign in relation to third-party advertisements during an election in the municipality up to the end of the relevant period are **each equal to or less than \$10,000**. 2016, c. 15, s. 61.

Any campaign that has expenses that exceed \$10,000 must file an audited return.

- Donations of \$9228 are reported and no donations in-kind have been reported.
- The **donations in-kind**, which include the staff salaries, use of facilities, photocopying charges above the hard costs, training, and so forth, exceed \$778, thereby triggering a required audited financial return.
- Also, there are substantial **unreported expenses**, and these exceed the difference between the reported expenses of \$9228.71 and the \$10,000 requirement for an audit,

is \$771.29. The unreported expenses such as fair market value for the office, photocopying charges, staff, website, and so forth exceed \$771.29 and this also indicates an audited financial return should have filed instead of an unaudited return.

- Unreported expenses are a serious violation of the Municipal Elections Act.
- Saman Tabasinejad signed the third-party application and on the application itself it outlines mot reporting expenses is a violation. (Exhibit 1)
- Saman Tabasinejad signed the financial submission and as such is the responsible authority. (Exhibit 6)
- Saman Tabasinejad was previously a candidate in a Municipal Election in Toronto. She has knowledge of the Municipal Elections Act and as such, these violations cannot be considered to be inadvertent. (Exhibit 6)

An audit return was required and was due on January 20, which is a violation.

13. Endorsing one candidate

- PT endorsed one candidate, and that candidate was Rachel Chernos-Lin. (Exhibit 7a, 7b)
- A third-party cannot be a candidate or contribute to a candidate's campaign.
- Progress Toronto contributed to the campaign of Chernos-Lin by delivering flyers that supported her and by delivering flyers and posting on their website attacks against the candidate who was her main competitor.
- Progress Toronto endorsed candidate Chernos-Lin, advertised her name, and promoted voting for her.
- They produced, delivered and promoted a flyer endorsing her, produced digital advertising, put the endorsement on their website.
- All of these promotions are advertising and therefore both contributions and expenses.
- Third parties CANNOT make contributions to candidate campaigns and all expenses for a candidate MUST be declared by the candidate.
- This both a prohibited Act that disqualifies Progress Toronto as a third-party and all expenses incurred must be declared and included by the candidate as expenses.

- There are thousands of dollars in expenses that must be included by Chernos-Lin on her financial statement.
- Chernos-Lin spent a total of \$61,000.02 (Exhibit 8)

14. Eligibility for Registration

88.6 Eligibility for registration

- (4) Only the following persons and entities are eligible to file a notice of registration:
- 1. An individual who is normally resident in Ontario.

2. A corporation that carries on business in Ontario.

3. A trade union that holds bargaining rights for employees in Ontario. 2016, c. 15, s. 49.

Restriction

(5) The following persons and entities are **not eligible to file a notice of registration**:

1. A candidate whose nomination has been filed under section 33.

2. A federal political party registered under the *Canada Elections Act* (Canada) or any federal constituency association or registered candidate at a federal election endorsed by that party.

3. A provincial political party, constituency association, registered candidate or leadership contestant registered under the *Election Finances Act*.

4. The Crown in right of Canada or Ontario, a municipality or local board. 2016, c. 15, s. 49.

15. Contributions to candidates

88.8 (1) A contribution shall not be made to or accepted by a person or an individual acting under the person's direction unless the person is a candidate. 2016, c. 15, s. 51.

Who may contribute

(3) Only the following persons may make contributions:

1. An individual who is normally resident in Ontario.

2. Subject to subsection (5), the candidate and his or her spouse. 2016, c. 15, s. 51.

Who cannot contribute

(4) For greater certainty, and without limiting the generality of subsection (3), the following persons and entities shall not make a contribution:

1. A federal political party registered under the *Canada Elections Act* (Canada) or any federal constituency association or registered candidate at a federal election endorsed by that party.

2. A provincial political party, constituency association, registered candidate or leadership contestant registered under the *Election Finances Act*.

3. A corporation that carries on business in Ontario.

4. A trade union that holds bargaining rights for employees in Ontario.

5. The Crown in right of Canada or Ontario, a municipality or a local board. 2016, c. 15, s. 51.

88.5 For third-party advertisements

(2) For the purposes of this Act, money, goods and services given to and accepted by an individual, corporation or trade union in relation to third-party advertisements, or given to and accepted by another person who is acting under the direction of the individual, corporation or trade union, are contributions. 2016, c. 15, s. 53 (2).

Value of goods and services

(5) The value of goods and services provided as a contribution is,

(a) if the contributor is in the business of supplying these goods and services, the lowest amount the contributor charges the general public in the same market area for similar goods and services provided at or about the same time;

(b) if the contributor is not in the business of supplying these goods and services, the lowest amount a business providing similar goods or services charges the general public for them in the same market area at or about the same time. 2016, c.

- There was no indication that Progress Toronto considered any other candidates. There were no requests for candidates to respond to questions or criteria for all candidates to respond to.
- Endorsing one candidate and actively advertising for the candidate is both prohibited and means the expenses have to be reported by and included in the candidate's expenses.
- The expenses incurred by Progress Toronto must be included in the candidate's expenses. This means that the candidate overspent and removal from office is the penalty. (Exhibit 8)
- The compliance audit against Ms Lin is included in this application, as if the expenses of Progress Toronto are deemed to be resulting from directly advertising for Ms Lin, the expenses must be included in Ms Lin's expenses.

16. Expenses not declared

The limit for third part spending was outlined by the city clerk in the response to the registration. (Exhibit 1) That amount is $\frac{58,702.60}{2}$.

When the unreported amounts are included, Progress Toronto overspent by thousands of dollars, a substantial amount.

Overspending is a serious violation.

17. Office expenses not disclosed or included

- Office expenses are under-valued. Rent for the use of PT's office must be included on a market value level.
- The expenses declared are \$1,214.22 which values the office at \$404.74 per month which is significantly below market value. The full market value must be included from September when the campaigning and canvassing started until December 19 when the campaign ended. (as stated in the financial form submitted)

18. PT disclosed that their flyers were photocopied.

• There are no photocopy expenses. There were tens of thousands of flyers, laser printed in-house at a cost of \$.05 per flyer (https://www.tonerbuzz.com/blog/printing-costs) (paper plus photocopying charges plus unreported "in kind" goods and services).

• The approximate unreported costs exceed \$1,000. These costs must be quantified and included as unreported expenses.

19. Digital advertising under valued

- Expenses for digital advertising to an audience of 109,000 people was not declared at market value.
- The advertising cost reported was \$4,853.78 and may not be reported at market value.
- Disclosure is required.

20. Website not declared as an expense

- The website for PT was used to seek volunteers, promote door to door campaigning, promote meeting, promote training sessions
- The cost of the Website and maintaining the website must be included. It is noted that many of the entries have been deleted since the end of the campaign. A posting on X by staff indicated they "always remove" campaign picture, when a campaign is completed.
- The posting and deletion of posts was done with purpose and admittedly staff knew they were deleting and posting for what they claim is a "separate campaign" yet, finances were not separate, and Progress Toronto resources were not separated.
- The cost of communication with staff, and volunteers was not declared. Were cell phones used and are these phones reimbursed by Progress Toronto on a regular basis? If so, the cost of phones was not declared.

21. The cost of door-to-door canvassing was not declared

• The expenses for door- to-door canvassing were not reported for the campaign. None of the materials used to canvass were reported as expenses. This included canvass bags, flyers, buttons, clip boards, refreshments, training, meetings and all services and materials used to canvass.

22. Over-contributions

- Progress Toronto is a corporation and did not declare value of services provided. The services are greater than \$1200 and represent an over contributed to the campaign.
- Under reported expenses are services not valued and included.

23. False and misleading information

• 89 (h) furnishes false or misleading information to a person whom this Act authorizes to obtain information;

The attached document is full of falsehoods and defamatory content. (Exhibit 9a,9b,9c)

24. Penalties and violation sunder the Act

Exhibit 10is an outline of potential penalties stated in the Act that could apply to the violations







Effect of default by registered third party

88.27 (1) Subject to subsection (6) and in addition to any other penalty that may be imposed under this Act, an individual, corporation or trade union that is registered as a registered third party in relation to an election in a municipality is not entitled to register in relation to a subsequent election in the municipality until after the next regular election has taken place,

(a) if the registered third party fails to file a document as required under section 88.29 or 88.32 by the relevant date;

(b) if a document filed under section 88.29 shows on its face a surplus, as described in section 88.31, and the registered third party fails to pay the amount required by subsection 88.31 (4) to the clerk by the relevant date;

(c) if a document filed under section 88.29 shows on its face that the registered third party has incurred expenses exceeding what is permitted under section 88.21; or

(d) if a document filed under section 88.32 shows on its face a surplus and the registered third party fails to pay the amount required by that section by the relevant date. 2016, c. 15, s. 61.

Notice of default

(2) In the case of a default described in subsection (1), the clerk shall notify the registered third party in writing that the default has occurred and shall make available to the public the name of the registered third party and a description of the nature of the default. 2016, c. 15, s. 61.

Offences

89 A person is guilty of an offence if he or she,

(h) furnishes false or misleading information to a person whom this Act authorizes to obtain information;

- Flyers were printed and widely distributed to voters that contained false and misleading information.
- The provisioning of these false materials constitutes an offence under section 89 of the MEA

Offences re campaign finances

92. Offences by registered third party

(4) A registered third party is guilty of an offence and, on conviction, in addition to any other penalty that may be imposed under this Act, is subject to the penalty described in subsection 88.27 (1),

(a) if the registered third party incurs expenses that exceed the amount determined under section 88.21; or

(b) if the registered third party files a document under section 88.29 or 88.32 that is incorrect or otherwise does not comply with that section. 2016, c. 15, s. 68 (2).

- Progress Toronto did not include any services in kind and the value of those services far exceeds the limit on spending.
- Some services not included: Use of facilities, rent for the four months of the campaign, photocopying, staff salaries, use of phones, internet and website, parking, training courses, costs for canvassing (canvas bags, flyers, buttons etc)
- All of these goods and services must be valued and included as expenses. When they are included, Progress Toronto substantially overspent
- None of the canvassing expenses were declared or if declared were significantly understated and that's a violation

General penalty, individual

94.1 (1) An individual who is convicted of an offence under this Act is liable to the following penalties in addition to any other penalty provided for in this Act:

1. For any offence, a fine of not more than \$25,000.

2. For any offence other than a corrupt practice, the penalties described in subsection 88.23 (2) and 88.27 (1).

3. For an offence under section 90, imprisonment for a term of not more than six months.

4. For any offence that the presiding judge finds that the individual committed knowingly, imprisonment for a term of not more than six months. 2009, c. 33, Sched. 21, s. 8 (68); 2016, c. 15, s. 70.

• Penalties apply to Progress Toronto and to the individual who registered the third party and hold responsibility for the violations

Same, corporation or trade union

(2) A corporation or trade union that is convicted of an offence under this Act is liable to a fine of not more than \$50,000 in addition to any other penalty provided for in this Act. 2009, c. 33, Sched. 21, s. 8 (68).

Effect of default by candidate

88.23 (1) A candidate is subject to the penalties listed in subsection (2), in addition to any other penalty that may be imposed under this Act,

(a) if the candidate fails to file a document as required under section 88.25 or 88.32 by the relevant date;

(b) if a document filed under section 88.25 shows on its face a surplus, as described in section 88.31, and the candidate fails to pay the amount required by subsection 88.31 (4) to the clerk by the relevant date;

(c) if a document filed under section 88.25 shows on its face that the candidate has incurred expenses exceeding what is permitted under section 88.20; or

(d) if a document filed under section 88.32 shows on its face a surplus and the candidate fails to pay the amount required by that section by the relevant date. 2016, c. 15, s. 60.

Penalties

(2) Subject to subsection (7), in the case of a default described in subsection (1),

(a) the candidate forfeits any office to which he or she was elected and the office is deemed to be vacant; and

(b) until the next regular election has taken place, the candidate is ineligible to be elected or appointed to any office to which this Act applies. 2016, c. 15, s. 60.
