### Background and Scope

#### Background

This resource inventory of City-wide services that support people experiencing homelessness was developed in response to:

*1. Directed the City Manager to work with the Deputy City Manager, Community and Emergency Services and the Deputy City Manager, Community Development and Social Services and to report back by the October 28, 2025 meeting of the Economic and Community Committee with an inventory of initiatives, programs, and services offered by City divisions, agencies, and partners to support unhoused residents; and on governance options to enable a cross-divisional, city-wide response.*

#### Scope

This resource inventory captures information on services/programs/initiatives that support unhoused residents and are either City-delivered (e.g., directly operated by staff employed at the City) or City-funded (e.g., non-profit funded services/programs/initiatives).

2. Type – Service, OR program, OR initiative.
3. Name of the service/program/initiative.
4. Affiliation with the City – City of Toronto funded or serviced, or administered by a city agency or partner.
5. If the service/program/initiative is through a City-funded partner, the name of the funded agency/partner is included.
6. Short description of the service/program/initiative.
7. Population served by this service/program/initiative.
8. The number of clients the service/program/initiative is funded to serve.
9. The region of Toronto the service/program/initiative serves.

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### Data Definitions

Field	Definition
<b>Service</b>	Refers to the provision of direct assistance through services that have a specific mandate to support people experiencing homelessness. For example, case management services can assist clients with setting personal goals pertaining to their mental health.
<b>Program</b>	A program refers to a set of services designed to achieve a broader goal related to homelessness. For example, a homelessness response program may entail the provision of multiple services such as: training and skill development assistance, food security supports, and/or temporary financial assistance.
<b>Initiative</b>	An initiative refers to a planned and targeted effort designed to address specific community needs or priorities. For example, the City of Toronto's Confronting Anti-Black Racism Action Plan is a City-wide initiative that aims to confront and remove barriers caused by anti-Black racism. Initiatives may or may not be funded for a specific number of clients.

### Service Categories

Field	Definition
<b>Indigenous-specific</b>	Services that reflect and support the unique cultural identities and needs of Indigenous communities.
<b>Drop-In Services</b>	Drop-in services are low-barrier locations that offer access to food, showers, laundry, health services, information and referrals, and social and recreational activities in a welcoming, safe, and non-stigmatizing environment. Operate year-round.
<b>Emergency Shelters and Respite</b>	<p>City-operated or City-funded homelessness overnight services that provide temporary, low-barrier indoor space and essential supports.</p> <p><b>Emergency Shelters:</b> Shelters offer temporary overnight accommodation with housing-focused supports. Operate year-round.</p> <p><b>Respite Services:</b> Respite are 24/7 low-barrier sites prioritizing ease of access. Winter respites operate seasonally. Services provided include resting spaces, meals, and service referrals. An allied shelter service that operates on a 24/7 basis.</p> <p><b>Note: Warming Centres</b> are not included in this Inventory, as facilities, operators, and services vary. Warming centres provide immediate safe indoor space for people during extreme cold weather alerts. Facilities vary but often</p>

	include City of Toronto buildings or community recreation centres. Services vary, depending on the facility, and may include at a minimum resting spaces, snacks, and referrals to emergency shelter. An allied shelter service that operates on a 24/7 basis for the duration of an extreme cold weather alert.
<b>Employment and Training</b>	Services that specialize in increasing access to employment opportunities and/or, to other training and development opportunities.
<b>Housing and Post-Housing Support Services</b>	Services that help people transition out of homelessness into permanent housing, such as tenant rights and responsibilities, neighbourhood orientation, money management, and referrals to health supports.
<b>Outreach Services</b>	Direct, proactive engagement with people sleeping outdoors or otherwise street-involved to build trust, meet immediate health and safety needs, and connect them to shelter, housing and wrap-around supports. Operate year-round throughout the city.
<b>Support Services</b>	Refers to the range of community-based, client-centred supports and services provided to people experiencing homelessness, including health, harm reduction, mental health, case management, income and identification, legal and settlement supports, and other services.

#### **City Affiliation**

<b>Field</b>	<b>Definition</b>
<b>Divisional – Service</b>	Programs or services delivered directly by a City of Toronto division (e.g., Toronto Shelter & Support Services, Housing Secretariat, Parks & Recreation, etc.)
<b>Divisional – Funded</b>	Services and Programs funded by the City, delivered by community-based agencies, as part of its homelessness response system.
<b>City Agency</b>	The City's agencies provide a broad range of City services. Each agency has a different mandate and responsibility but generally fall into categories: service agencies, community-based service agencies and partnered agencies. These agencies were created by the City to deliver specific services (e.g., Toronto Transit Commission, Toronto Public Library). They operate at arm's length, but are accountable to City Council.

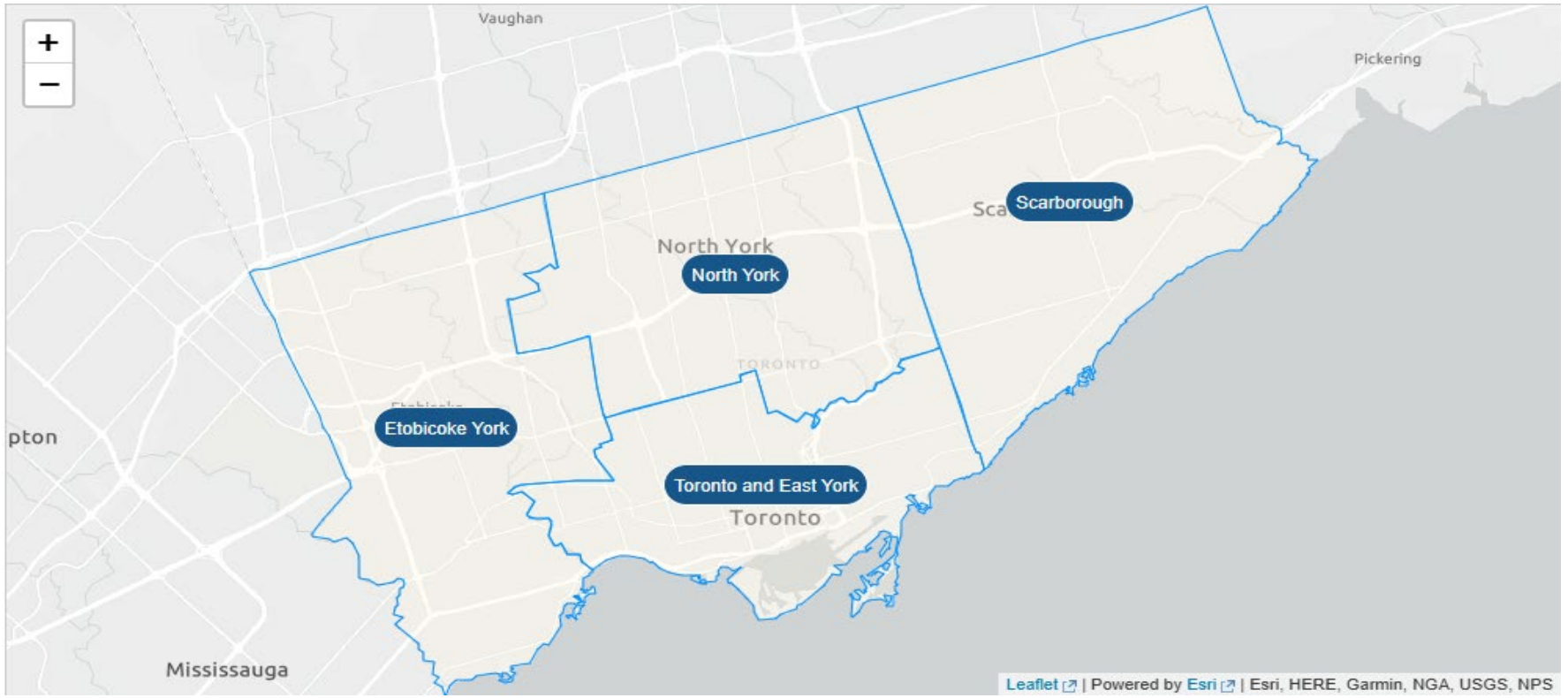


Figure 1: Map of City of Toronto Community Council Areas
