Prevention of HIV through sexual transmission

Rose-Ann Bailey is a returning TUHF Review Panel member. Rose-Ann has worked with several AIDS Service Organizations and is currently a Diversity, Equity Inclusion Specialist with the Toronto Police Service, focused on Equity, Inclusion, and Human Rights. Rose-Ann also holds a Master of Education from York University with a focus on Program Planning and Evaluation.

Kisa Hamilton is a Co-founder and a worker member of Transform Practice. a worker's

co-op, where she accompanies grassroots groups and organizations on their transformational journey. She has extensive experience as a community-based researcher rooted in participatory practices focused on equity, diversity, and inclusion through an intersectional lens, and brings a trauma-informed healing-centered approach to her work. She has worked in partnership with Toronto Community Housing, the City of Toronto, community health centers, and other social purpose agencies on community redevelopment projects, health promotion, and safety issues. She recently led a participatory evaluation for the Black Focused Social Prescribing Project, an award-winning pilot project led by the Alliance for Healthier for Communities, across four community health centers in Ontario.

Eric Peters is a returning TUHF Review Panel member and the Manager of Health Promotion at the Gay Men's Sexual Health Alliance within a provincial scope - gay men's sexual health, to include HIV prevention, HIV/STBBIs testing, and treatment, and Mpox (formerly called Monkey pox). Andrzej Celinski is a co-founder of the Reclaim Collective and currently serves as a Board Member for the Workers for Ethical Substance Use Policy (WESUP). He has organized and participated in several harm reduction projects, advisory panels, research initiatives, and working groups. He is a long-time member of the National Safer Supply Community of Practice (NSS-CoP) and has worked at the Dr. Peter Centre in Knowledge Translation. During his time at the Dr. Peter Centre, he also served as an editor for The Drug Hub and was part of a team that developed a Harm Reduction Mentorship Curriculum, in which he actively participated as a mentor. Additionally, he held roles as Executive Administrator, Contract Manager, and Stimulus Connect Liaison with the Canadian Association of People who Use Drugs (CAPUD). He has presented on topics including Safe Supply, Peer Work, and Substance Use in the Trades, among other drug policy and harm reduction-related subjects. He is a strong advocate for ending drug prohibition, increasing access to safer supply, modernizing education about "street" drugs, and advocating for the implementation of decriminalization and legalization models, both domestically and globally. Andrzej holds a Diploma in Law Clerk Studies from Seneca College and a MES with Urban Planning Certification from York University, where his graduate research focused on substance use and the housing crisis.

Paula Tookey is a returning TUHF Review Panel member. Paula was the Manager of the Consumption and Treatment Service (CTS) at South Riverdale Community Health Centre and has been working for over 30 years as a front-line worker and participated on numerous committees and working groups.
