Study Purpose


Comprehensive local area study around Glencairn Subway Station to:

- Ensure growth positively contributes to a transit-supportive complete community in accordance with City policies and guidelines
- **Identify required investments** in infrastructure and facilities to support growth, healthy living and complete communities
- Meet provincial policy and legislation, including minimum density requirements near subway stations
- Include solutions that reduce the impacts of extreme weather and work towards the City's goal of net zero carbon emissions by 2040

Fall 2024 to Winter 2025

Gather and review existing information on the Study Area, assess current conditions, and develop an emerging vision and guiding principles

Spring to Fall 2025

Develop and assess options and identify a preferred option for guiding growth

Winter to Spring 2026

Finalize the preferred option and identify a path to implement potential policy changes and initiatives

Guiding Principles



Principle #1

A vibrant community with access to daily needs featuring pedestrian-oriented streets that support activity and public life, with a thriving Marlee Avenue as the commercial and community heart



Principle #2

A welcoming and connected public realm (e.g. parks, open spaces, trails, streets, plazas) that supports residents' health and well-being for all ages and abilities



Principle #3

A safe, accessible and well-connected mobility network that builds on existing infrastructure (e.g. transit stations, pedestrian and cycling networks) and offers a range of viable travel options to enhance connectivity within Marlee-Glencairn and to the broader city and region




Guiding Principles



Principle #4

A full range of housing types and forms that continue to provide choice and variety to meet the needs of current and future residents in Marlee-Glencairn, including an aging demographic in Marlee-Glencairn, with growth supported by adequate and timely infrastructure



Principle #5

A range of community-focused services and facilities (e.g. child care centres, schools, human service agencies, community recreation centres, libraries) and placemaking opportunities that fulfill the community needs and cultivate health and well-being as the neighbourhood grows



Principle #6

A green and climate-resilient neighbourhood that incorporates best practices to contribute to long-term health and well-being of residents and facilitates adaptability and equity in the face of climate change



Next Steps

Phase 2

- Identify 3 options to guide growth, including an Emerging Preferred Option
- Ongoing community, stakeholder and Indigenous engagement
- Ongoing alignment with City initiatives (e.g. Avenues)

Phase 3

- Finalize the Preferred Option, including land use changes, area-based policies, and public realm and infrastructure improvements
- Phase 3 engagement
- Report back by Q2 2026 with final planning framework
