## City of Toronto Act, 2006 Public Notice

## Amendment to the Sign By-law to Regulate Bike Share Signs outside of the Public Right-of-Way

Toronto City Council will be considering recommendations to amend Municipal Code Chapter 694, Signs, General (the "Sign By-law"), to include new regulations to permit signs associated with Bike Share docking stations ("Bike Share Stations") located outside the public right-of-way.

It is proposed that the amendments be adopted at the City Council meeting to be held on February 5, 2025. If adopted by City Council, the proposed amendments will:

- 1. Define "Bike-Share Signs" and to add new definitions, to establish new regulations concerning Bike-Share Signs, and to add Schedule D, Description of Bike-Share Signs to the Sign By-law.
- 2. Establish specific regulations for the size, orientation, content, and illumination of Bike-Share Signs.
- 3. Permit signage on Bike Share Stations outside of the public right of way, and within parks, without a permit, with specific conditions for display described in the proposed Schedule D.

The Chief Building Official and Executive Director, Toronto Building, is recommending that the Council of the City of Toronto approve the amendments to the Sign By-law described above.

The Planning and Housing Committee may recommend that the Council of the City of Toronto amend the Sign By-law to approve the amendments to the Sign By-law described above.
