

***Expression of Condolence for Patricia Moore

The Mayor and Members of Toronto City Council are deeply saddened to learn of the passing of Patricia (Pat) Moore on August 26, 2025.

Pat Moore lived in Thorncliffe Park and Flemingdon Park for more than 45 years. Throughout her life, she was a tireless advocate for her community, dedicating herself to improving the lives of those around her.

When Pat saw hardship, she resolved to take action and did so with a deep understanding of the needs of her neighbours. She was a leading voice on issues of housing, as well as youth, tenant, and women's rights. Pat's efforts played a formative role in the co-operative housing movement and in the development of tenants' associations – achievements that continue to shape her community today.

Pat was a highly respected role model, especially among youth, and a champion for youth programs and violence prevention initiatives. For her many accomplishments, Pat was officially recognized in Parliament and earned the Agnes Macphail award in 2009. In 2018, a street in Thorncliffe Park was named in her honour and she was presented with a Key to the City by former Mayor John Tory "for her bold commitment to grassroots change and her nobility of character."

There is no question that Pat will be deeply missed in her local community and across the City. Her legacy lives on through her family, friends, neighbours, and the many lives she touched through her decades of service and advocacy.
