Our communities, health and social systems are facing a significant challenge in responding to the growing needs of seniors

Ontarians 80+ will increase at rate nearly 4 times the rest of the population through 2043

By 2040, the number of Ontarians over 80 will nearly double what they are today.

Seniors entering long-term care today have a much higher level of need



88% need support with activities of daily living, like getting dressed and eating meals.



75% of residents have 3 or more different medical conditions.



76% have cognitive support needs.

Up to 40% have access to subsidized, geared to income housing.



1 in 5 seniors over the age of 80 have complex needs that require long-term care.

Socioeconomic Value of Long-Term Care Homes

Seniors

1 in 5 seniors over 80 have complex care needs that can only be met by long-term care homes offering 24/7 skilled, interdisciplinary care. 45,000+ seniors are waiting to access LTC homes experiencing reduced quality of life and increases health risks are their health needs are not being fully met.

Jobs and Economy

In 2024, LTC homes contributed \$12+ billion in GDP and almost 175,000 jobs for local communities. Delivering on the commitment to build and renew 58,000 LTC spaces will create a further \$37+ billion in GDP and 59,000 new jobs

Caregivers

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LTC home

Give back up to 822,600 hours per week to informal caregiving, which created an income potential of up to \$23.86 million per week.

In addition, up to 58% of caregivers will have reduce uninsured out-of-pocket costs.

Health and Social Services Systems

For every 100 ALC patients able to access LTC home care will create **\$100,000** in savings for the health system per day and, more importantly, will improve the quality of life for the seniors.

Over 18,000 new or redeveloped spaces (111 homes) are completed or underway

Despite this historic progress, we are still in a race against time. **40,000 spaces still need a path to build and renew.**

The Ontario government and municipalities are critical partners in moving these projects forward.
