Comments: Please ensure my comments are publicly visible as I am utterly disgusted with Chris Moise.

Torontonians should not be forced to pay for the personal misconduct of elected officials.

Following the findings of the City's Integrity Commissioner, it is clear that Councillor Chris Moise violated the Code of Conduct. Accountability in public office is not optional it is a fundamental responsibility. When that standard is breached, the consequences should be borne by the individual, not footed onto taxpayers.

The request to have the public cover over \$28,000 in legal fees sets a troubling precedent. It sends the message that elected officials can act improperly and rely on residents to absorb the cost. That undermines trust in local government and destroys confidence in the systems meant to uphold integrity.

At a time when residents are already dealing with rising costs and increased financial pressure including significant property tax hikes under Mayor Olivia Chow this kind of request is not only inappropriate, it is unacceptable.

Public funds must be used responsibly and transparently. They should support essential services and community needs not shield individuals from

the consequences of their own actions.
