

## **Service Agreements Awarded and Executed by the Medical Officer of Health for 2026**

### **SUMMARY**

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Toronto Public Health currently has service contracts with partner agencies that support service delivery in the community for the Healthy Babies Healthy Children program, Food Security initiatives, Sexual Health services and clinics, the Dental Care to Youth Experiencing Homelessness and Low-Income Adults program, and the Ontario Seniors Dental Care program.

Purchasing services from community agencies is an effective and efficient way to provide essential public health services. This approach builds on existing service infrastructure in the community, facilitates community partnerships, supports continuity of service to clients, and can increase service efficiencies.

The purpose of this report is to provide information on the \$7.250 million in purchase of service contracts awarded and executed by the Medical Officer of Health for 2026, according to the delegation of authority by City Council.

### **RECOMMENDATIONS**

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The Medical Officer of Health recommends that:

1. City Council receive this report for information.

### **FINANCIAL IMPACT**

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This report has no financial impact beyond what has already been approved by City Council in the 2026 Operating Budget for Toronto Public Health. Attachment 1 outlines \$7.250 million in service contracts awarded and executed by program to support delivery for 2026.

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Toronto Public Health (TPH) currently has service contracts with partner agencies that support service delivery in the community for the Healthy Babies Healthy Children program, Food Security initiatives, Sexual Health services and clinics, the Dental Care to Youth Experiencing Homelessness and Low-Income Adults program, and the Ontario Seniors Dental Care program.

Purchasing services from community agencies is an effective and efficient way to provide essential public health services. 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**Healthy Babies Healthy Children Program**

Healthy Babies Healthy Children is a 100 per cent Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services (MCCSS) funded program that provides home visiting services to at-risk families. In an effort to support local community capacity and avoid service duplication, the family home visiting service contracts were awarded to and executed with four local agencies engaged in providing peer home visiting services.

In order to align with the provincial fiscal year, the contracts are awarded for the period April 1, 2026 to March 31, 2027.

**Sexual Health Programs**

The Sexual Health Clinics Program is cost-shared between the Ministry of Health and the City of Toronto, with purchase of service arrangements in place with three Toronto clinics: Hassle Free Clinic, Birth Control and Sexual Health Centre, and IWHC Toronto (formerly Immigrant Women’s Health Centre). These clinics deliver services addressing the needs of specific priority client populations and can identify and respond quickly to gaps in service or emerging sexual health needs.

Toronto Public Health also has purchase of service agreements with four community agencies to deliver sexual health services. These agencies deliver sexual health promotion services reaching specific high risk and underserved populations.

The contracts are awarded for the period January 1, 2026 to December 31, 2026.

AIDS Committee of Toronto (ACT) wound down its operations as of March 31, 2026. ACT was previously funded through a purchase of service agreement to provide community-based education, health promotion resources, and outreach services to primarily gay, bisexual and other men who have sex with men (gbMSM) and men who use substances, to prevent and reduce risks of HIV. TPH is working to secure alternative organizations that can fill emerging gaps in service for communities most impacted by the winddown of ACT for the remainder of 2026.

**Dental Care to Youth Experiencing Homelessness and Low-Income Adults Program**

Funded 100 per cent by the City, contracts are in place with three agencies to provide dental services to youth experiencing homelessness or housing instability and adults aged 18-64 years living with no or low income, who are unable to pay for private sector dental care. These services meet the needs of clients that may fall through the gaps of other government sponsored dental programs, such as the Canada Dental Care Program, due to significant structural barriers that can make them ineligible or unable to apply (i.e. the requirements to have filed a tax return, maintain a fixed address for administrative purposes, etc.). These agencies are Parkdale Queen West Community

Health Centre, Evergreen Centre for Street Youth Yonge Street Mission, and The Canadian Centre for Refugee and Immigrant Health Care.

The agencies use the funds to purchase dental supplies, repair dental equipment, subsidize dental assistant salaries and provide honorariums for dental professionals such as dentists and dental hygienists. These funds assist with clinic operations and volunteer recruitment. Agencies that provide free dental care to these residents also receive funds through charitable donations.

The contracts are awarded for the period of January 1, 2026 to December 31, 2026.

### **Ontario Seniors Dental Care Program**

On November 20, 2019 the Government of Ontario launched the Ontario Seniors Dental Care Program (OSDCP), a 100 per cent Ministry of Health funded program for low income Ontario seniors. Dental treatment for OSDCP eligible seniors is available through clinics located within Public Health Units (PHUs), Community Health Centres (CHCs) and Aboriginal Health Access Centres (AHACs).

Under the Ministry of Health's Public Health Funding and Accountability Agreement, TPH may enter into contractual partnerships with organizations to provide eligible OSDCP seniors with specialty dental services that are part of the OSDCP service schedule, but unavailable through PHUs, CHCs and AHACs.

In order to align with the provincial fiscal year, the contracts are awarded for the period contracts are awarded for the period April 1, 2026 to March 31, 2027.

### **Food Security Initiatives**

The Food Security initiatives are cost-shared between the Ministry of Health and the City of Toronto, with purchase of service arrangements in place with three community agencies: FoodShare Toronto; Working Women Community Centre; and North York Harvest Food Bank. The initiatives, through partners deliver low cost, fresh fruit and vegetables to equity-deserving communities, and promote skills development through food literacy education and food handler training.

The contracts are awarded for the period of January 1, 2026 to December 31, 2026.
