

Attachment 9 – Brimorton Drive Road Safety Improvement Project (Wards 21 and 24)

The Brimorton Drive Roadway Improvements project supports the Vision Zero Road Safety Plan by addressing a history of collisions and prioritizing safety in school zones, pedestrian crossings, and high-activity areas along the corridor.




Figure 1: Map of Recommended Improvements for Brimorton Drive

Figure 1 below is a map of the project area with the proposed changes.

Consultation

Phase 1 of public and interest group consultation for Brimorton Drive Roadway Improvements took place from January 20 to February 17, 2025, to gather location-based feedback on top priorities and issues. Among the biggest concerns expressed during Phase 1 were excessive speeding of motor vehicles, particularly in school zones; parking congestion during school pick-up and drop-off hours; and the poor state of

repair of the road. Participants also expressed concern about how potential upgrades of existing bike lanes to cycle tracks could impact motor vehicle and maintenance operations. Input gathered through Phase 1 consultation was used to develop proposed changes.

Phase 2 of public and interest group consultation took place from November 10 to December 7, 2025. Communications to inform the public about the consultation included a project web page, 58 targeted emails to local interest groups, 5,725 notices distributed throughout the project area via private delivery company, and e-notification to 36 project email subscribers. Feedback from local schools along Brimorton Drive indicated that school pick up and drop off times are congested around school zones, and there is concern about motor vehicles speeding along the corridor. The proposed intersection safety improvements were positively received. Participants who supported improvements to pedestrian safety along the corridor referenced new housing developments at Markham Road and Ellesmere Avenue. Supporters noted that, with more residents moving in, there is a need to provide more safe pathways to get to schools and the Meadoway. Some residents requested further improvements to the existing cycling infrastructure.
