




Owner of this rental home, which was home to two families, had workers drill holes in the tree trunk

This healthy young tree was planted by Urban Forestry and then the owner sold the house




The new owner, a land speculator, had the tree cut down one night during a wind storm

This is an aerial view of the 80 trees that will be clear cut to make way for an approved massive condo development at Kingston Road and Ravine Drive. This site is just 50 m north of the Doris McCarthy Trail, a flyway for migratory birds. Trees are not the only casualty; two rental buildings purposely planned by the former City of Scarborough will be demolished. The new amphitheatre consists primarily of tiny studios and one bedrooms.
