Even after more than six decades of success, Corrado's passion never waned; he remained active and continued to share his knowledge, leadership, and insight with others.

Corrado's impact extended far beyond his professional accomplishments. He will be remembered for his warmth, humour, generosity of spirit, and the genuine joy he brought to all who had the privilege of knowing him.

He is lovingly remembered by his wife of 65 years, Lucia Scivoletto; his children, Tony, Jack, Connie, and Carmelo; and by his many in-laws, grandchildren, great grandchildren, nieces, and nephews. He is also fondly remembered by his friends and the countless individuals whose lives he touched through his kindness, mentorship, and example.
