Re: Traffic Calming – Denison Avenue, between Queen Street West and Wolseley Street (Ward 10, Spadina-Fort York)

Transportation Services has been requested by the Ward 10 Councillor to provide recommended wording for recommendations they plan to present to the July 8 and 9, 2026, Toronto and East York Community Council. Staff request that this memorandum accompany the Councillor's letter.

This memorandum is about a matter that Community Council has delegated authority from City Council to make a final decision.

Draft Recommendations

1. *Toronto and East York Community Council authorize the installation of traffic calming (one speed hump) on Denison Avenue, between Queen Street West and Wolseley Street, generally as shown on the attached Drawing No. TC-738, dated June 2026, from the Director, Enforcement and Street Management, Transportation Services.*

At the request of the Ward Councillor, staff were asked to consider the feasibility of implementing traffic calming (speed humps) on Denison Avenue, between Queen Street West and Wolseley Street. The surrounding area experiences a high volume of pedestrian and cyclist traffic associated with St. Stanislaus Kostka Church, TPA Municipal Carpark Lot #106, Friends of Randy Padmore Park, businesses on Queen Street West, and residential neighborhoods. It is reported that motorists are speeding on the subject street as they enter the neighbourhood from Queen Street West.

As the Councillor has indicated they would like to forgo the study process, motorist speed and volume data were not collected, and staff have not evaluated the installation of traffic calming measures (speed humps) on the roadway. Staff conducted a site visit in June 2026 to map the proposed speed hump location.

Financial Impact

Staff have not been able to develop engineering estimates for this work but based on previous experience and similar work in the past, we expect the costs associated with approving the draft recommendation above will be approximately \$4,000.00. As this work was not anticipated, it has not been specifically included in any approved budgets. Completion of the work would be subject to availability and competing priorities within future Transportation Services Capital Budgets, unless a specific funding source is identified by the Councillor and approved by Toronto and East York Community Council.
