Re: Traffic Calming – Pelham Avenue, between Osler Street and Uxbridge Avenue (Ward 9, Davenport)

Transportation Services has been requested by the Ward 9 Councillor to provide recommended wording for recommendations they plan to present to the July 8 and 9, 2026, Toronto and East York Community Council. Staff request that this memorandum accompany the Councillor's letter.

This memorandum is about a matter that Community Council has delegated authority from City Council to make a final decision.

Draft Recommendations

1. *Toronto and East York Community Council authorize the installation of traffic calming (three speed humps) on Pelham Avenue, between Osler Street and Uxbridge Avenue, generally as shown on the attached Drawing No. TC-701, dated May 2026 from the Director, Enforcement and Street Management, Transportation Services.*

At the request of the Ward Councillor, staff were asked to consider the feasibility of implementing traffic calming (speed humps) on Pelham Avenue, between Osler Street and Uxbridge Avenue. The surrounding area experiences a high volume of foot traffic associated with nearby pedestrian generators, which include Charles Sauriol Elementary School, Pelham Avenue Playground, businesses on Pelham Avenue, and residential neighborhoods. It is reported that motorists are speeding on the subject street west of the school, and it is used as a cut through between Symington Avenue, Dupont Street, and Davenport Road. Speed humps are installed on the section of Pelham Avenue to the east, between Uxbridge Avenue and Laughton Avenue. Installing

speed humps on the subject segment will provide traffic calming on the entirety of Pelham Avenue.

As the Councillor has indicated they would like to forgo the study process, motorist speed and volume data were not collected, and staff have not evaluated the installation of traffic calming measures (speed humps) on the roadway. Staff conducted a site visit in April 2026 to map the proposed speed hump locations.

Financial Impact

Staff have not been able to develop engineering estimates for this work but based on previous experience and similar work in the past, staff expect the costs associated with approving the draft recommendations above will be approximately \$12,000.00. As this work was not anticipated, it has not been specifically included in any approved budgets. Completion of the work would be subject to availability and competing priorities within future Transportation Services Capital Budgets, unless a specific funding source is identified by the Councillor and approved by Toronto and East York Community Council.
