Cloud Computing Framework	Stewart McKendry	 Fiscal pressure, need for modernization, projects in the pipeline looking at Cloud are some of the reasons the City is looking at putting in place a Cloud framework. This framework is to provide a repeatable approach for using Cloud storage in the City. I&T, PMMD, Legal and the City Clerk's Office developed the framework. The Cloud framework focuses on addressing four fundamental questions: What is Cloud? Is my need a suitable option for the Cloud? How do I get ready to go to the Cloud? How can the City enable the Cloud?
		Going Cloud does not:
		eliminate the need to weigh your risks against the benefits
		 change our responsibility for proper records & information management
		To go Cloud, projects still have to perform due diligence (tools provided in framework) on what is to be done as Cloud is the how and not the what.

	Cloud does not work in isolation of projects and it involves a huge culture shift and change in mindset. For this reason, a communication plan has been developed to ensure stakeholders receive relevant information about the Cloud framework at the appropriate level of details.		
	The Cloud framework is to be presented to the City Clerk and CIO for approval.		
	The City environment does change, so the framework will be updated regularly.
