	A Winter City Park for All Season Use	In the summer the waterfront is extraordinarily busy, it is a destination that attracts visitors by the thousands. In the winter the waterfront is cold, windy and offers little respite from the elements. By designing this park to accommodate winter use we can encourage more balanced park use year-round.
	Create Opportunities for Curiosity and Experimentation	It's important to provide diverse and flexible opportunities for relaxation and recreation; exploration and learning for people of all ages and abilities.
	Connected and Relevant – a Systems Thinking Design Approach	We must ensure that the relationship to the surrounding Waterfront neighbourhood transportation corridors, including pedestrian, cycling trails, public transit, and amenities are enhanced and improved. 318 Queens Quay has the potential to become a gateway to Toronto's Waterfront helping to connect the network of waterfront parks.
	Innovation and Sustainability	Stormwater management infrastructure will be an underground feature of this site. The new park design will need to consider innovative design solutions to celebrate stormwater, educate the public, and integrate new infrastructure into a flexible, high quality and dynamic park design.
	Complement Rather than Compete with Existing Context	We want a space that can provide an economically viable venue for community programming including opportunities for markets, cultural festivals, events and park animation that complement activities and programs taking place across Toronto's Waterfront.
	Encourage Community Stewardship and Collaborative Partnerships	So that the new park can be maintained in perpetuity, it must be a safe, accessible, and equitable space that is welcoming for all users. That way all will be able to share in the pride that comes from a sense of belonging and can foster positive working relationships between local community agencies, City Parks Staff, and other park users.
