The City is developing a plan for the area - **Midtown in Focus** - that ensures the ingredients of a livable community are in place including parks and public spaces, great old and new buildings, community services and facilities, transportation and servicing infrastructure, and more.

Midtown in Focus will provide an updated planning framework to manage future growth. It will also identify the infrastructure investments that are needed to support quality of life in Midtown in the immediate term and beyond.

We need your input to shape Midtown's future and ensure that it continues to be one of Toronto's most dynamic, attractive and livable neighbourhoods.

Midtown in Focus

Built Form

Midtown Toronto is a collection of diverse places with their own rich histories, complementary functions and distinct building typologies and streetscapes.

The team has identified 23 distinct character areas in Midtown in consultation with the community. Built form principles have been developed to guide the scale, shape and location of future development in these areas.

Cultural Heritage



The Cultural Heritage Resource Assessment, nearing completion, includes documentation of Midtown's historical themes, events, and people as well as the identification of cultural heritage resources including individual properties, heritage conservation districts, and cultural heritage landscapes.

The Assessment identified more than 150 heritage potential properties. City Planning will further evaluate these properties in phases and will bring forward staff reports for their inclusion on the City's Heritage Register.

Transportation

With over 60,000 residents, a large employment base, regional destinations, and (soon) five transit stations, Midtown lies at the centre of a complex transportation network.

The Midtown in Focus study is evaluating the capacity of the local transportation network given anticipated growth and demographic, behavioural, and technological changes. Recommendations will build on recent plans for Eglinton Avenue and the regional transit network and focus on opportunities for active and sustainable transportation.

Today we're asking you to identify what's working well with the transportation system and what needs improvement to support the movement of people in Midtown.



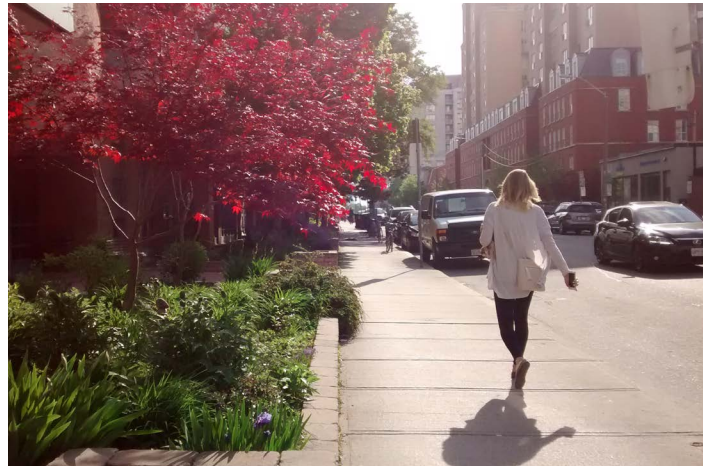
Building a Livable Yonge-Eglinton

Parks and Public Realm

The first phase of Midtown in Focus resulted in a Parks, Open Space and Streetscape Plan for the Yonge-Eglinton area. Approved in 2014, this plan reinforces Midtown's green, open character through a series of public realm improvements and planning policies.

This study will extend this vision to include a public realm strategy for the Davisville area and a parks plan that outlines the preferred types and locations of new and expanded parkland.

We want to hear your ideas for opportunities to improve and expand parkland and the public realm in Midtown.



Community Infrastructure



Quality of life in Midtown is supported by well-used and well-programmed community facilities (libraries, community centres, social service agencies, schools). Providing the next generation of community services and facilities, will require creative solutions in terms of design, location, financing and partnerships.

An assessment of existing community infrastructure capacity and gaps resulted in a set of Council endorsed priorities and recommendations in 2016. These will inform a Community Services and Facilities Strategy for Midtown to guide the delivery of new and expanded community infrastructure in the context of growth and demographic change.

Municipal Servicing

The City initiated the Midtown in Focus study in part to ensure that the planning and implementation of physical and community infrastructure keeps pace with population and employment growth.

The ongoing assessment of the water, stormwater and sanitary networks will identify the capital upgrades required to support growth and livability in the near and long term.

Your feedback will be used to shape these policies and strategies and inform the plan for Midtown that will be presented to Council in late 2017.

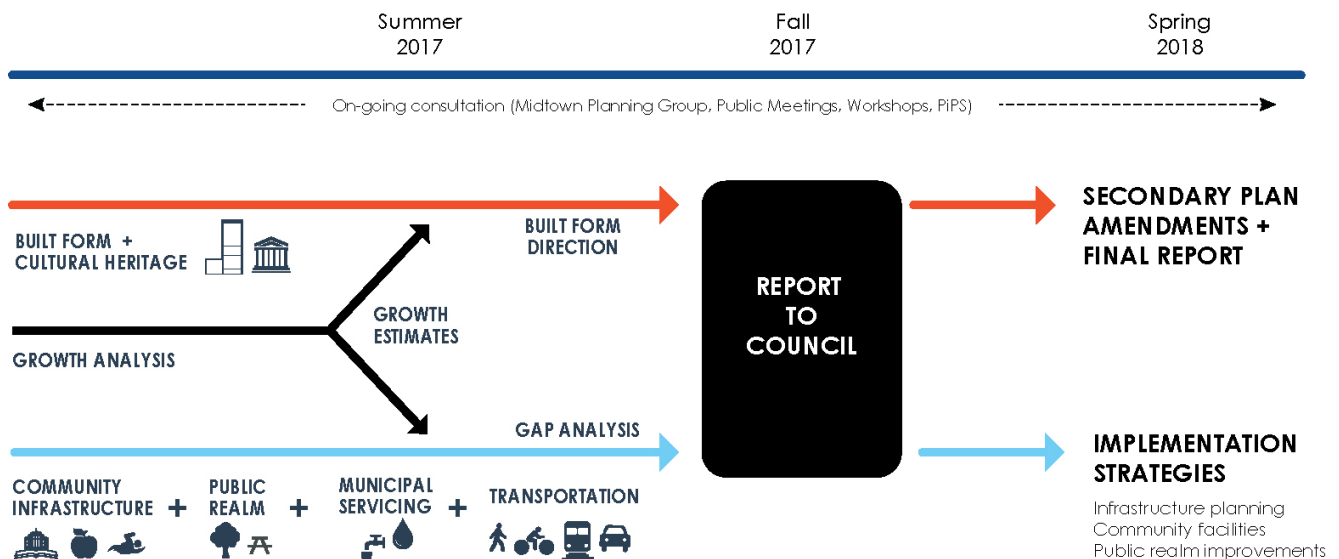
