Q: Partnerships and seamless days aren't in place yet in many cases. A program may see the need to expand but there are barriers with rooms, teachers, and principals. We are seen as extra in the schools, not partners. Can we work on these relationships before a new partner is brought in?
	A: we have heard the concerns and continue to work on them. We still have a lot of work to do. Please continue to pass on concerns through Liz and Louise.
	Q : where can I read the policies approved by the TDSB?

5. Toronto Public Health-	
Owen Chong, Manager, Healthy Environments provided an update. The Province has released new protocols and guidelines; expecting lots of change to the day nursery guidance document in 2019.	Q: Clarification needed on what needs to be posted?
	A: The IPAC inspection will need to be posted – this could be a notice that it was completed. Check the website for further details.
New: disclosure of inspection – expected to post results online. Currently in early stages of exploring this new requirement.	Q: Do we require 3 visits because we have an onsite cooking program (i.e. deemed a high risk)?
Would like to send out email updates – need an updated listserv as many returned as undeliverable. Working on a group email list. Suggestion made that CS and TPH work together on listservs.	We were told separate visits are needed for preschool and KG/SA – is this required?
	A: We addressing these situations. In some cases we are considering it one inspection, but others treat it as two different inspections. There are inspectors doing things differently and we are clarifying that even if there are two programs, it

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should be one inspection, based on address. Risk assessment is done on the food each year, 3x a year if food prepared onsite, 2x a year if catered. Includes preparing food with children.	
Q: Does food preparation/cooking with children as a program activity raise the risk level for TPH? ACTION: Owen will take this issue back to his team at TPH and seek consultation with the Ministry as well.	
Q: Any changes to the flu shot requirement?	
A: Last year we took the position that it was strongly suggested but not required. It will be reviewed yearly.	
Q: How will programs be assessed for quality?	
A: A workgroup is being developed to ensure consistency and quality. Assessment tool will need to be flexible to address various needs/services of	
programs.	
Q: Are child and family centres licensed? Are there quality assessments? Is TPH involved? Is funding consistent across the board?	
A: CFC's are not licensed. There is lots of work to be done. Transition of the system to the City of Toronto is complete. We can now look at what exists and points of alignment and create something that addresses the uniqueness. This will be part of the strategic planning day – we will look at program standards, managing expectations, how to provide capacity building and quality. All is still up for discussion.	
Q: Are there opportunities for partnerships with child care programs? In the past, child care programs have been able to access resources for teachers, (e.g. toy lending library) at CFC programs.	
A: This will be discussed at the strategic planning day being held later this month.	

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	 Q: What about children with special needs? If there a group of families who need a place to go to receive support, to play and meet other parents, that group is being left behind and facing long waiting lists. A: We are looking at expanding inclusion and access. The Every Child Belongs program partners with numerous programs and is looking at expanding. Q: Did programs move from <i>EDU</i> to the City of
	Toronto? A: Some of the programs were under EDU and the rest were MCYS. They now are funded by the Ministry of Education and managed by municipalities.

7.1 2018 City Capital and Operating Budget	
City budget was approved, with increase in fee subsidies, general operating funding (already announced), home child care and special needs resourcing. New funding to administer the EarlyON Child and Family Centres and the Journey Together program to develop indigenous child care programs. Also funding to expand licensed child care spaces.

Funding City budget approved \$1 million. Will be a continuous application cycle, with funding approved quarterly. Final applications for 2018 must be received by Dec 5. Extension-contact required for those approved for funding in 2017, or if the approved project is more than 12 months old, and the project has not started. Contact District Consultant for extension contracts. See website: toronto.ca/children/operators.	
 7.6 Placement Directive Placing all ages, all wards. Please update vacancies to support families in securing placements. The Province has a working group reviewing thresholds. The Growth Strategy is also helping to stabilize fees for families. Families can also contact their MPP and MP regarding their concerns. 	 Q: Will the City be looking at the income level eligibility for families applying for fee subsidy? A: These income thresholds are mandated by the Province, the City does not create the thresholds. The Province has a working group that is reviewing thresholds.
7.7 New Central Office New office opened on November 20 at 700 Lawrence Ave West. Caseloads were realigned and affected operators were notified as to who their Caseworker is. Clients can still receive service at any office.

7.9 Growth Strategy Update Currently implementing phase one (2017-2019) of a 10 year plan. Implementation plans help centres plan and document how the increased base funding would reduce fees and/or increase wages. Evening info sessions held on Jan 11 and Jan 16 for operators, bookkeepers and board members.	 Q: We want the City to tell our Boards of Directors that they should be starting ECE staff at \$26 with benefits. We want to know the City will support staff salary rates. A: This is a 10 year process. Consultants are working closely with centres to develop salary scales. We understand that when salaries increase, fees must increase to offset the increased expense. We need continued commitment of all levels of government to invest in base funding so salaries can be set at liveable levels.
	Q : We are concerned about the impact of the new TDSB plan to open extended day programs. These jobs will be full time, no split shifts, no AQI, no licensing requirement, and high salaries. We won't be able to compete and once again, our RECE's will be leaving child care in droves to work in these programs. As it is, we are constantly hiring, it's a full time job. We can't expand because we can't get staff. Now TDSB will march in with more funding and less regulation and take all our good staff. A: TDSB has just approved the plan and there is lots of work to do – many details are not yet determined. The Early Years Advisory Committee is a public meeting – pass along your concerns through your area reps.

8. Open Question Period	Q: Concern raised about growing gap between public fee and per diems.
	A: The impact of increased base funding is that costs are offset and fees can stabilize or decrease. Base funding is like the foundation; as base funding grows, the amount to be funded though fees and per diems will be less. Therefore yes, per diems will go down as base funding increases-they are intricately linked.
	Q: Centres need to understand the analysis of their budgets line by line and the impact it has on resulting per diems.
	A: Numerous reports are available to operators during and after the budget analysis is complete. Communication can always be improved. We will take your comments forward and improve the budget app and our methods of communication. Consultants are always available to operators for help with the budget and explaining changes and outcomes.
