## Storm Sewer Outlet Replacement – East Don River Ravine near Silverdale Crescent

**Expected Start Date: October 2018**

**Expected End Date: December 2018**

*\*Timeline is subject to change. Future notice to be provided.*

The City of Toronto is planning to replace a failed storm sewer outlet located in a ravine that is tributary to the East Don River near Silverdale Crescent. The work area is located behind properties on Silverdale Crescent, Laurentide Drive and Bushbury Drive (see map).

The storm sewer outlet is part of the City's stormwater infrastructure designed to collect stormwater and melting snow and release it into nearby creeks or rivers.

This project is part of the Council-approved 2018 Capital Works Program that will improve the water quality discharging to the Don River and Lake Ontario.

### WORK DETAILS

The City's contractor will:

- Access the work area from Silverdale Crescent via a constructed access route using easements as depicted in the map above.
- Work within the ravine to replace the existing storm sewer outlet which has collapsed due to erosion.
- Use the Silverdale Crescent central boulevard, opposite the construction access, as a staging area for the storage of construction materials.

## WHAT TO EXPECT BEFORE CONSTRUCTION

- Work crews may mark underground utilities, such as gas, water and cable to ensure they are not affected by the proposed work.
- Affected properties will receive a Construction Notice approximately two weeks before work begins with more information about the work.

	<p><b>Access to Your Home:</b> The City-hired contractor may need access to your home to complete a pre-construction survey. Affected properties will receive a pre-construction survey request to schedule a time to complete the survey.</p>
	<p><b>Private property trees:</b> due to the nature of this project, the City will have to remove trees from private property in the ravine. Property owners with affected trees will receive a separate notice. Private property tree removal permits have been obtained in coordination with the City's Parks, Recreation &amp; Forestry Division.</p>
