Re:

Delegated Authority to Approve Grants for 2017 Neighbourhood Micro Grants Program

Please find below the request for delegated approval for the Phase 1 of the 2017 Neighbourhood Micro Grants Program:

- Approval of 51 resident-led groups recommended by the Resident Advisory Panel, Neighbourhood Micro Grant Program (Appendix A);
- \$51,000 to Social Planning Toronto to disburse \$1,000 each to the 51 recommended resident-led groups;
- \$55,000 to Social Planning Toronto to be the Capacity Builder/Administrative Partner and trustee to the 51 Neighbourhood Micro Grant recipient groups, and to provide capacity building training to grant recipients.

The Neighbourhood Micro Grant is first of three new Community Investment Funding programs approved by Council on March 28, 2017 with a goal to encourage resident engagement and leadership development. The new grant programs are a result of a comprehensive review conducted in 2016.

The total 2017 approved budget for the Neighbourhood Micro Grant Program is \$250,000. The balance of the funds will be allocated to recommended grant recipient groups selected from the Phase 2 intake in September, 2017 and to be forwarded for delegated approval in December, 2017.

Delegated Authority Approval by Council

On March 28, 2017¹ City Council approved delegated authority to the Executive Director, Social Development, Finance and Administration to approve, issue and enter into agreements for neighbourhood micro-grants to selected proponents and report back to the Community Development and Recreation Committee on awards made to the selected grant recipients.

Neighbourhood Micro Grant Program & Process

In 2014, the City of Toronto approved the <u>Toronto Strong Neighbourhoods Strategy 2020</u> (TSNS 2020). TSNS 2020is the City of Toronto's action plan for making sure that each of our 140 social planning neighbourhoods can succeed and thrive. Residents and agencies from 31 Neighbourhood Improvement Areas (NIAs) and 8 Emerging Neighbourhoods have come up with a list of changes they want to see – called the TSNS Actions. As a response, the Neighborhood Micro Grants of \$1,000 are for use by resident-led groups to support those TSNS Actions in local communities.

In the first round of grants, up to two (2) groups from each of the 39 neighbourhoods are eligible to be funded for events that advance TSNS 2020. Funded events are to be held between August and December 31, 2017. Over the course of the year, each NIA and Emerging Neighbourhood can be funded up to \$5,000 (five projects).

A call for applications from resident-led groups was launched on April 19, 2017. Approximately 25 information sessions were held at Neighbourhood Tables across the four districts. A total of 77 applications were received by the deadline date of June 21, 2017.

The following is the distribution of the 77 applications received:

- No applications received from 15% or 6 out of the total 39 neighbourhoods
- 23% or 9 neighbourhoods received 1 application each
- 33% or 13 NIAs/EN received 2 applications each
- 14% or 6 NIAs/EN received at least four applications (for a maximum allocation of 2 per NIA)

A Neighbourhood Micro Grant Resident Selection Panel of seven members recruited from TSNS 2020 Resident Advisory Committee (six members) and the Poverty Reductions Lived Experience Advisory Group (one member) reviewed the 77 eligible applications for program fit, feasibility and TSNS alignment. The Selection Panel are recommending 51 applications totalling \$51,000. Their recommendations were secondarily reviewed by City staff at a District Table meeting. No changes to the Resident Selection Panel's recommendations were made.

The following are the distribution of the 51 projects recommended for delegated approval:

- Nearly half of the NIAs (49% or 19) have two grant recipients (there can be a maximum of 2 per NIA in the first round)
- 31% or 12 NIAs have one grant recipient
- 21% or 8 NIAs does not have any grantee

Recommended project ideas include:

- Youth-led event to share seven ethnic breads that reflect the cultures in Scarborough Village
- Food handling certifications for youth volunteers
- Back to school events for families
- A community bike ride to discover bike trails and a bike 'rodeo'
- Sport demos and instructions (e.g. 'karate in the park')
- A community garden event to plant mixed, edible, native shrubs and perennials with a First Nations blessing ceremony in Malvern.

Neighbourhood Micro Grant Resident Selection Panel

The selection process was enhanced by the recruitment of residents from two City program advisory groups who participated in the recommendations of grants. Members of the TSNS 2020 Resident Advisory Committee and the Poverty Reductions Lived Experience Advisory Group volunteered over 10 hours each ensure the grants selected were of the best quality and would make an impact to the identified neighbourhoods.

Phased Approach

For Round 1 (current phase): Funding will be available for events that take place in the 31 Neighbourhood Improvement Areas (NIA) and the 8 Emerging Neighbourhoods. In the first round of grants, up to two (2) groups from each of the 39 neighbourhoods will be funded for events that advance TSNS 2020.

Round 2: Call for proposals will be launched on September 11, 2017 for activities held February 1, 2018 – July 1, 2018. Up to 3 groups in each NIA and emerging neighbourhood can be supported. A total of \$144,000 is available for funding in this phase.

Neighbourhood Micro Grant Capacity Builder/Administrative Partner

A call for proposals seeking applications from Community Services Partnership (CSP) funded organizations was released on May 18, 2017. The purpose was to provide funding to an organization to conduct capacity building training workshops to support grant recipients, provide trusteeship services, inform the evaluation of the grant program, provide reporting and administer grant funds. After a review and interview process, Staff are recommending Social Planning Toronto as the grant recipient for a grant of \$55,000.

Grant Recommendations for Approval:

- 1. The Resident Advisory Selection Panel recommends 51 resident-led groups for your delegated approval for grants of \$1,000 each for a total of \$51,000. The list of recommended groups are provided in Appendix A.
- 2. Resident Advisory Selection Panel recommends a grant of \$51,000 to the Social Planning Toronto to disburse to the 51 approved Neighbourhood Micro Grant recipients.
- 3. Staff recommends a grant of \$55,000 to the Social Planning Toronto for the Neighbourhood Micro Grant Capacity Builder/Administrative Partner program for the following deliverables from August, 2017 February, 2018:
 - Disbursing \$1,000 Neighbourhood Micro Grants to up to 195 approved resident-led groups (Grant Recipients) from across the City over two phases (51 grants in August/September, 2017 and up to 145 grants in January/February 2018).
 - Developing and implementing capacity building workshops to resident-led groups approved for Neighbourhood Micro Grants over the term of the grant. Training workshops include guidance on topics such as applications, budgeting, reporting requirements, project and volunteer management, etc.
 - Plan and implement one celebration event for up to 195 grant recipients in Spring, 2018.
 - Assist in gathering information to support a process evaluation.

It is anticipated that these Micro Grants will help resident-led groups inspire their neighbourhoods with events to be held between August and December, 2017.
