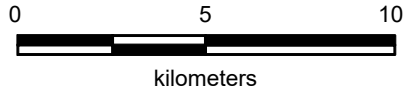
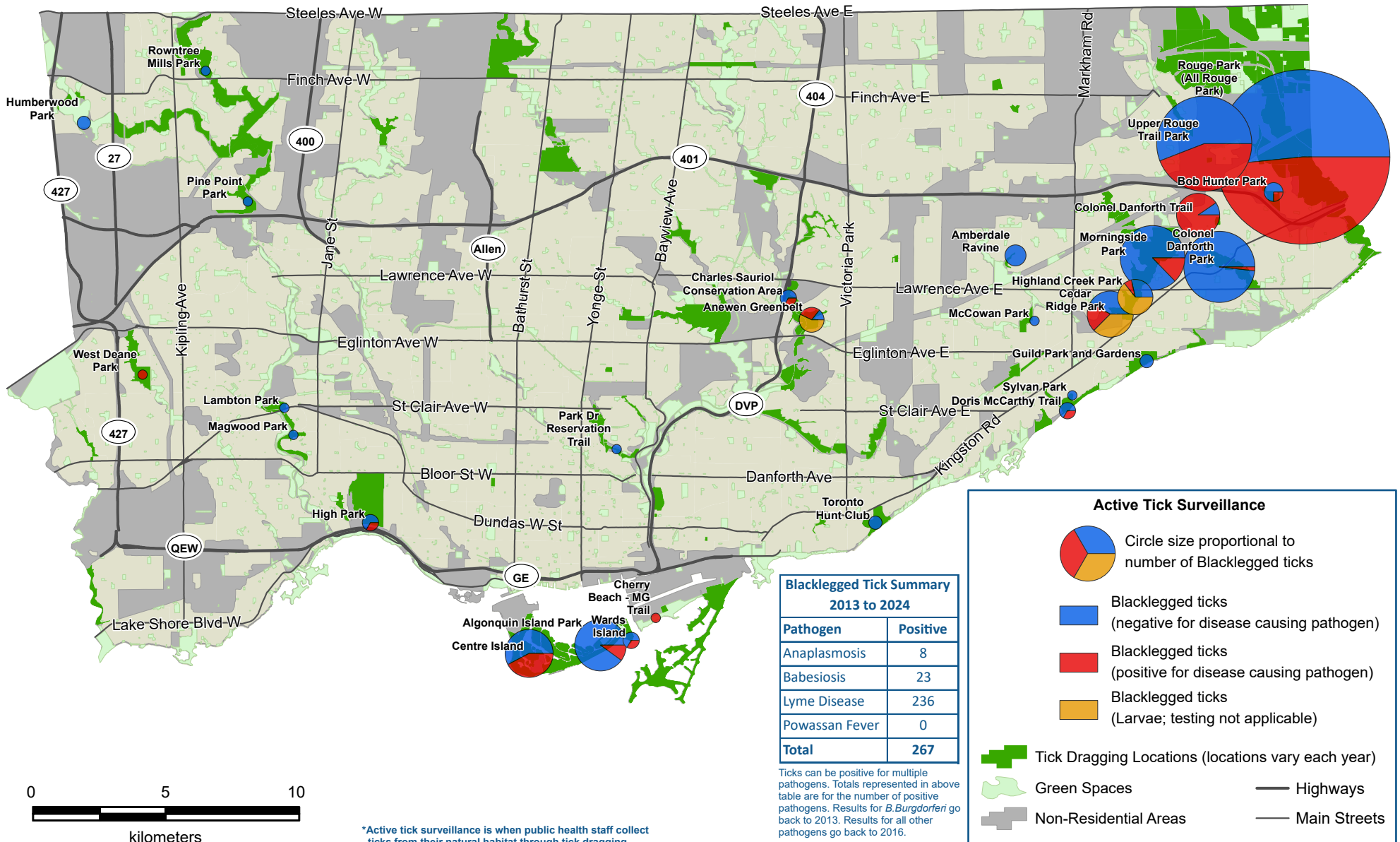


Results of active blacklegged tick surveillance*. Toronto, 2013 to 2024 data, combined.
