

How residents can manage European Gypsy Moth

Making a Burlap Barrier Band Trap

Once European Gypsy Moth caterpillars grow to about an inch (2.5 cm) in length by mid-June, they will move down the trunk to seek shelter from predators and heat. You can take advantage of this behavior by making a burlap barrier band trap to reduce the number of larvae on the trees in your yard.

- 1. Wrap and secure a piece of burlap cloth around the stem(s) of your tree.
- 2. Tie twine/rope around the center or slightly below the center of the burlap.
- 3. Drape the burlap cloth over the twine/rope so there is an overhang where the caterpillars can crawl underneath to seek shelter during the day.
- 4. Check the trap by lifting the overhanging burlap cloth every afternoon and collect any hiding caterpillars and destroy them.
