

Context of Homelessness in Toronto


- Each night there are an estimated 8,715 people in Toronto who are homeless – 533 sleeping outdoors (2018 Street Needs Assessment).
- Use of the City-funded shelter system is on the rise with more demand and people staying in shelters longer (roughly 48% of total considered chronically homeless (i.e.) homeless for 6 months or more in past 1 year.
- Compounded by opioid crisis with the highest recorded deaths in the month of July and pressures on the shelter system exacerbated due to COVID-19.





Shelter System by Ward






Criteria for Selecting a Shelter Location







For relocation sites, such as this one, Fred Victor searched for a building that:



- Meets City by-laws (locations that allow shelters as an as-ofright use)
- Supports Toronto's Housing Charter Opportunity for All (2017)





- Is accessible and will provide adequate space
- Is in close proximity to community services (such as libraries, public parks, pharmacies, and health care services) and public transit

Fred Victor

- Fred Victor is committed to ending homelessness in Toronto. We support over 2,000 people every.
- Our Mission is to improve the health, income and housing stability of people experiencing poverty and homelessness.
- Established in 1894, we have extensive experience providing and managing affordable housing, transitional housing, and emergency shelters as well as support services for people experiencing homelessness.





Fatima House

A Real Property in the last of the last of

- Fatima House is a shelter providing housing and support services to women experiencing homelessness in Toronto.
- Fatima House will open in December 2020 and will be operated by Fred Victor.
- Fred Victor will provide housing support, meals, counselling, and medical services in a pet-friendly environment.
- Residents will come from the existing Women's Hostel program operated by Fred Victor at 86 Lombard Street.





Our Residents

- In Toronto, a growing number of women are homeless, using shelters, and precariously housed.
- Fatima House will provide basic needs such as shelter, healthy meals, clothing, laundry facilities and hygiene supplies – as well as counselling, physical and mental health support and connection to permanent housing.
- In a year we can help 50+ women move on to permanent, affordable housing.





Our Residents


- Family and financial pressures left Huong homeless. She showed up at Fred Victor's Women's Hostel with several bags containing all of her belongings.
- Especially vulnerable due to health issues, Huong had no access to income supports of any kind.
- Staff found Huong permanent home in a shared house and helped to connect her to a doctor. She is now an active member of her community.
- There are many women Like Huong who just need a hand up.





Rights and Responsibilities

- Shelter residents are equal citizens of the city and have the same rights, freedoms and responsibilities as other residents of the city.
- They have the right to a safe place to shelter and a welcoming program.
- There are conduct expectations and rules for all residents that must be followed when staying in shelter programs.
- Regular meetings are held to remind residents of rules, policies and guidelines.





Site Operations

- Fred Victor staff will work with residents to develop housing plans with the goal of securing permanent, affordable housing
- Staff also provide follow up support to housed clients who are at risk of losing their housing
- Crisis counselling and one-on-one support is also offered

Case Management



- Social and recreational programming (yoga, bingo, meditation, embroidery, etc.)
- Access to laundry, food, clothing, personal hygiene supplies, harm reduction kits including Naloxone
- Ongoing workshops and cultural celebrations
- Referrals to ID clinics, settlement and employment programs, and dental care

Services and Programming



- Mental health & addictions counselling provided onsite
- Mental Health Nursing services, CAMH and Fred Victor staff ensure clients are connected to health care services
- All staff are trained in First Aid, CPR, and Naloxone administration

Health Partnerships





Committee of Adjustment



The new building requires a minor variance from the zoning by-law to allow for a higher floor space index (FSI). FSI measures the size of the building relative to the size of the lot. Until this variance is granted, we cannot use the third floor.

When the shelter opens, we will use the basement, first and second floors. If the application for a minor variance is approved, then the existing third floor can be used for office and client space.

The site is already zoned to permit a shelter. The application does not consider whether or not the site can be used as a shelter, as this is already permitted under the zoning by-law.
