



What We Heard

Community Resource Group Meeting #1, September 18

- 1. Acknowledge the diversity of people who use these parks.
- 2. Keep the parks **flexible** and design in a way that is **inclusive** to all communities and for all types of activities.
- 3. Place a **priority on safety** when creating spaces for programming and in the physical aspects of design.
- **4.** Include elements that **reflect the history** of the parks and neighbourhood.



What We Heard

Indigenous Placemaking Consultation, October 21

- 1. Work with natural forces of the site to emphasize a message of renewal (ex. sloping land, direction of sun exposure)
- 2. Design and Decolonization: consider interventions that are not human-centred, but consider other aspects of life or movement including animals, rain, stormwater, and plant life.
- 3. Reflect on local Indigenous history and culture.

The **Yonge Street Linear Parks Improvements** project builds upon the 2017 Master Plan and aims to reconfirm the vision and refresh the priorities for how the park will be improved to meet the current and future needs of your community.



Design Guidelines & Objectives

Promote placemaking by incorporating the design language and materials which have been established by the master plan and the construction of James Canning Gardens.

Create a continuous accessible pathway through George Hislop and Norman Jewison Parks that connects to James Canning Gardens, complete with lighting, site furnishings, and plantings (trees, lawns & horticulture).

Consider potential outdoor performance / gathering areas for programmed and flexible events.


Integrate sustainable features and robust, resilient design that considers safety and accessibility for all park users.

Explore pedestrian connectivity and programming opportunities to increase foot traffic through the parks and engage with the neighbouring buildings such as Buddies In Bad Times Theatre, Sanctuary, and the Andorre House.




Pre-European Settlement








What We Heard

Queer Art Sub-Group Meeting, September 28


- 1. A universal queer theme is Positive Visibility. This area is where we could finally be seen by the rest of the city.
- 2. Abstract and conceptual representations may lead to broader and more open interpretations.
- **3.** Historically, park spaces have provided space that enables non-normative ways of being for LGBTQ2S+ communities. Consider spaces to allow for people to come together and use park space on their own terms.
- **4.** Elements of light, brightness or reflectivity can draw people into the park and would be welcomed.
- **5.** Explore reflections on the idea of Queer Space as the act of creating a space in a way that wasn't originally designed for LGBTQ2S+ communities, individuals, and identities.






