Project Background

Lucy Tot Lot is a small playground located at 2 Sneath Ave., near Victoria Park and Danforth Avenue in Scarborough. The current playground includes a climbing structure with a small slide, a separate structure with monkey bars and a park bench. The playground will be enhanced to modernize the existing equipment.

The playground redesign will be developed through consultation with the community and will include:

- New playground equipment
- New accessibility ramps
- New play surfacing
- Upgraded seating

Survey Objectives

In January 2021, the City conducted an online survey to obtain feedback from community members to inform the improvements to the Lucy Tot Lot playground. Survey participants were given the opportunity to share their vision for the new playground and provide general feedback about the project.

The survey was available to complete online from January 5 to January 31, 2021. The survey received a total of **38 survey** responses, which included input from **94** individuals.

The feedback from the survey will inform the selection and refinement of the playground improvements.

Feedback Summary

- Survey respondents visit Lucy Tot Lot at a range of intervals, with some visiting daily (14%), multiple times a week (13%), multiple times a month (30%), less than once a month (14%), and less than once a year (8%).
 - Some respondents had never visited Lucy Toto Lot (22%).
- Most survey respondents visit Lucy Tot Lot with their family (55%), while others visit with friends (8%), Pet(s) (5%), and alone (8%).
 - Some respondents have not been to Lucy Toto Lot, or only walk by (24%).

- Most survey respondents stay at Lucy Toto lot for under 1 hour (70%)
- Respondents noted that their most popular activities at Lucy Tot Lot are:

 - Equipment for kids above 18 months old (3%)

- Additional suggestions for improving Lucy Tot Lot, not included above:

 Post directional signage to the park from Danforth, as some community members were not aware of its existence (2)

- Add other park features:
 - Add waste bins off to the side, as they are currently too central to the Lot
 (2)
 - Add a dog park (2)
 - Add a skating rink (1)
 - Improve lighting (1)
 - Celebrate diversity and inclusion by incorporating public art, history, and local culture into the Lot (1)
 - Include something (e.g. an art piece) that recognizes the Indigenous history of the land. There are local Indigenous organisations that could be brought into this process (1)
- Improve seating:
 - Place new seating under trees so they are shaded (1)
 - Do not use benches with hand rests in the centre as these prevent people who are experiencing homelessness from sleeping on them (1)
- Improve the overall park design:
 - Make the park accessible (3)
 - Make the park attractive for people of all ages, not just kids (2)
 - Make the space brighter (1)
- Improve the playground design:
 - Make the playground larger (1)
 - Include accessible swings (1), smooth playground surfacing (1), and ramps (1)
 - Do not use sand as playground surfacing (1), and do not include a sandbox (1) as animals will use it like a litter box
 - Include play equipment for younger children (1)
 - Add a tire swing (1)
- Create a green oasis (2)
 - Keep existing trees and garden in place (1)
 - Add food-bearing plants and trees (1)
- Additional comment include:
 - Lucy Tot Lot is often a gathering place for people who do not live in the community (2) and this noise is disturbing for those who live near the Lot (1)
 - The park has a lot of litter (1)















- More trees and plants. Make it more green
- Add signage for the park on danforth
- More playground space for the kids. Add a few more benches for parents to sit on. Brighten up the space to make it more welcoming.
- Swings
- It would be nice if the garbage cans weren't front and centre like they are now, as if they're the main attraction. Would like more shrubs and native flowers (the echinacea that grow there now add a lot of appeal). Please keep the seating under the trees as they protect against the hot sun in summer months.

- Dog park/dog area
- Better lighting
- Accessible swings for children with disabilities
- Not sand, currently used as cat little.
- Please don't put in the anti-homeless type benches with the railing in the middle, I really don't like those. I would also be interested in some acknowledgement we are on Indigenous lands, perhaps an art piece. (Maybe in partnership with local Indigneous organizations - there is one just around the corner).
- accessible playground equipment, play equipment for little kids, seating around the playground
- Ramps of course. And a surface that is smooth for wheelchairs

Do you have any other comments or ideas for the Lucy Tot Lot improvements?

- It's very bare space. Make it more of an escape from the city with more trees, plants and upgraded playground.
- Tire swing
- The Lucy Tot Lot is often a gathering place for people who do not live in the community. This can make a lot of noise for what is a very quiet street. That noise is disturbing for those who live near the Tot Lot. Furthermore, there is a lot of litter from food packaging, beverage containers and cigarettes. On the other hand, I believe that public space should be used and enjoyed by the community. Incorporating public art, history and local culture is a way for the City to celebrate diversity and inclusion.
- Please leave the existing trees in place. Also I love the garden. No sandbox please too many stray cats in the neighbourhood.
- Dog area
- Additional landscaping so the park has value to those without small children
- I would love to see a small part of the park dedicated to shared local food, such as some fruit trees and/or a herb garden. In an ideal world I would love a skating rink, but not sure it would fit. I like the idea of playground improvements for the children in our area, but to be honest there are very few on this block (I see 5 who use the playground regularly). So I think in addition to the playground it's worth thinking about the adults in the area and how they could enjoy this space.
- I think it's a great idea to improve the playgrounds in the GTA
- More plantings, to create a natural oasis, where one might like to go and read a book.
 Upgrading the equipment so there is more to do for adults as well as children. Upgraded
 garbage and recycling unit that is better integrated into the overall design. Be careful
 with the seating, as we tend to get a certain demographic using the park, as it is behind
 a liquor store.
