# Kidstown Water Park Online Survey 2

Summary Report

# December 31, 2020

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# **Project Background**

L'Amoreaux Kidstown Water Park is the City's only owned and operated water park. It is the most popular outdoor aquatic facility in the City, enjoyed by kids and families from all across Toronto. It has come time to replace this iconic destination and revitalize its surroundings to ensure the water park is in good working order for many summers to come. The redesigned water park will be a dynamic, accessible, safe, and exciting space that will better serve existing and new park users.

The water park redesign will be developed through consultation with the community.

# **Survey Objectives**

The City conducted an online survey to obtain feedback from community members to inform the Kidstown redesign. This is the second online survey conducted for this project. Survey participants were given the opportunity to review different design options for the water park, parking lot, and change rooms and share their preferences and suggestions.

The survey was available to complete online from to December 31, 2020. The survey received a total of 292 responses with **530** people contributing to these responses.

The survey was also available in Traditional and Simplified Chinese. In total, 14 responses were collected in Traditional Chinese and 9 in Simplified Chinese. These survey results were translated and included in the response analysis presented in this report (including raw but translated text responses in the appendices).

The feedback from the survey will inform the development of a preferred design options for the water park redesign. These preferred design will be presented to the community during the next and final phase of engagement.

# **Notification**

The online survey was promoted through the following channels:

- Email updates to people who had signed up for project notifications
- Facebook and Instagram advertisements targeting area residents
  - In addition to English ads, this included ads in both Traditional and Simplified Chinese to promote both translated surveys

# **Key Feedback Highlights**

The following provides a high level summary of survey feedback. See Appendix B for proposed designs, concepts, and features presented in the survey.

- For Concept A Beach Theme:
  - The top 3 splash pad features preferred by respondents are (1) water play structures (2) water tunnels and (3) splash pad toys.
  - The top 3 pool and hill features preferred by respondents are (1) an accessible slide (2) stepped seating into a pool and (3) a pool with swimming lanes.
  - The top 3 seating types respondents would like more of include (1) picnic tables (2) lawn picnic areas and (3) tables and chairs.
  - About a third of respondents would not like any seating types removed.
- For Concept B River Theme:
  - The top 3 splash pad and hill features preferred by respondents are (1) splash play toys (2) a water room and (3) tiered pools and falling water (tied).
  - The top 3 water park features preferred by respondents are (1) pool with beach entry and spray toys (2) a canal with bubblers and edge seating and (3) grate and mist features.
  - The top 3 seating types respondents would like more of include (1) picnic tables (2) canal edge seating and (3) lawn picnic areas.
  - About a third of respondents would not like any seating types removed.
- For Concept C Lake Theme:
  - The top 3 pool and hill features preferred by respondents are (1) the pool
    (2) the waterfall and (3) the rope bridge and stepping stones (tied).
  - The top 3 splash pad features preferred by respondents are (1) boulders and jets (2) a suspension bridge and (3) stream features.
  - The top 3 seating types respondents would like more of include (1) picnic tables (2) tables and chairs and (3) lawn picnic areas.
  - The 3 seating types respondents would like less of include (1) (2) and (3)
  - About half of respondents would not like any seating types removed.
- When asked to rank their preferred park design, respondents ranked Option A Beach theme highest (43% average ranking); Option B – River theme second (37% average ranking) and Option C – Lake theme last (20% average ranking).
  - The preferred pool design was Option A Beach theme (37% average ranking)
  - The preferred splash pad design was Option A Beach theme (42% average ranking)
- Overall, the top 3 seating types preferred for the new park include (1) Hill-side seating with backrest (2) accessible picnic tables and (3) stream-side seating walls.
- The preferred shade structure idea was a colourful, see-through, but solid roof.
- 82% of respondents like the natural play ideas (see Appendix B) presented a lot or a little.

- 89% of respondents like the cognitive and inclusive play ideas (see Appendix B) a lot or a little.
- Locker, change room and shower preferences were close, with the Grid formation being the most preferred (40% average ranking) and the Meander formation being the second preference (37% average ranking).
- Drop off zone location preferences were also close, with Option B being the most preferred (38% average ranking) and Option A being the second preference (36% average ranking).

# **Detailed Feedback**

The following provides a detailed overview of the text responses received through the online survey. The number in brackets identifies the quantity of comments that contained each sentiment or suggestion.

- Increase lot size and provide more parking spaces (6)
- Prioritize safety at the entrance and drop off area (5)
  - Suggestions for improving safety include preventing overcrowding or traffic congestion, for example by separating the park entrance from the drop off zone
- Separate the park entrance, line, and other pedestrian areas from the parking lot (5)

  - Creating a separate entrance and exit for vehicles using the drop off zone

# **Appendix B: Design Concepts and Additional Elements**

#### **Design Concepts**

There are 3 different concepts for the Kidstown redesign.

#### Concept A: Beach



The key features of Concept A are:

- Splash Pad: A flat area with a large play structure, colourful spray toys, jets, boulders and plantings in corners.
- Pool: An angular pool with a shallow "beach" entrance, swimming lanes, a seating steps entrance and an island with misting poles and spray toy.
- Water Slide: Spiral slide with an accessible path connection.
- Activated hillside: Hillside redesigned with native plantings and boulders to climb on.
- Accessible path: Gently rising path connecting to the slide and a lookout on top of the hill.
- Bioswale: An area where water collects and water-loving plants thrive.

The splash pad has many water features, and a large water play structure. It is surrounded by picnic areas, a lawn, plantings, and turf. There will be trees throughout the lawn area.

#### Concept A - Pool and Hill



There is a pool you can enter using an accessible ramp, the beach area, or large steps. The pool is deep enough to swim in, and includes swimming lanes and an accessible slide. Around the pool is a deck with seating and some shade umbrellas. Towards this edge of the park there is a more natural area with natural play features like boulders and hills to climb on.

- Expanded hillside: Hillside redesigned with boulders, planting and small streams for natural play.
- Accessible path: Gently rising path connecting to tiered pools and a lookout at top of the hill.
- Bioswale: A depressed area, similar to a rain garden, where water collects and waterloving plants thrive.

Concept C: Lake



The key features of Concept C are:

- Splash pad: gently sloping area surrounded by boulders with integrated water jets draining into a stream, few wooden spray toys, and a large sand play area.
- Pool: Organically shaped pool with two "beach" areas, stepping stones, rope bridge and a waterfall you can walk under.
- Expanded hillside: Hillside redesigned with boulders, planting and small streams for natural play.
- Accessible path: Gently rising path connecting to terraced seating areas.
- Terraced seating: Elevated seating areas with shade trees.
- Naturalized hillside: native planting, boulders and a lawn path to explore and play.
- Bioswale: A depressed area, similar to a rain garden, where water collects and waterloving plants thrive.

## **Common Elements: Indigenous Placemaking**



Kidstown is located near the site of a 14th century Huron-Wendat village, known as the Alexandra Site. During an archaeological assessment in the year 2000, evidence of 16 longhouses and several sweat lodges were found. The design team is consulting with the Huron-Wendat Nation to find ways to incorporate the history and culture of this area in the redesign of Kidstown.

We propose that the new Kidstown include elements that reflect and respect the historic and enduring presence of Indigenous Peoples on this land. This may include murals, plantings of Indigenous significance, and various forms of art and story telling throughout the site.

## Common Elements: Naturalization and Play



The design team proposes to include natural play settings throughout the new Kidstown. For example, river bed and stream play areas, sand play, rain gardens (gardens where water-loving plants grow), nature paths, and climbable boulders.

# Common Elements: Cognitive and Inclusive Play



Potential play elements for Kidstown can be accessible for children of different ages and abilities, who more enjoy calm, gentle, and thought-based play.

#### Washrooms, Change Rooms, Showers, and Lockers

The existing washrooms and changerooms are aging and need to be improved. The following image shows what the new washroom, change room, shower, and locker area could look like.



Proposal:

- Update the existing building façade (the outer shell of the building) and install new windows.
- Build a Trellis (a roof structure that is not solid) over the change room, shower, and locker area.
  - Climbing plants will grow on the trellis.
- Indoors:
  - The sink and baby change area are shared by all genders.
  - Private washroom stalls are provided for individuals and for families.
  - Accessible washrooms stalls (e.g. for those with mobility devices) will be provided.
- Outdoors
  - Lockers.
  - Change room stalls with doors are for individuals and families. Each stall is private.
  - Accessible change room stalls will be provided.
  - Showers for rinsing off are shared spaces.

## The Kidstown Parking Lot

People get to Kidstown many different ways. The Kidstown redesign may include a redesign of the parking lot to :

- Provide more parking spots for busses and vehicles, including accessible parking spots
- Provide a safe drop off zone for buses and vehicles
- Create safer and larger pedestrian pathways through the parking lot
- Improve the direct route from the TTC stop to the Kidstown entrance
- Include two driveway entrances/exits onto Birchmount Road

There are three options for where the new drop off zone for busses and vehicles is located. In the image below, the options for drop off zones are within the yellow rectangles.

Option A: The drop off location is west of Kidstown, at the south end of the main parking lot.

Option B: The drop off location is at the north-west corner of Kidstown.

Option C: The drop off location is west of Kidstown, at the north end of the main parking lot.

- Think about electric vehicles and scooters charging station.
- beach would be nice, but river poses problem if a child all of sudden goes off and falls in with no adult supervision, its not safe unless u have lifeguards all over.
- The water slide is my favourite.
- Natural play areas AND inclusive sensory play areas are ESSENTIAL especially since COVID, kids have been stuck at home and isolated. Only the rich can afford to leave the city to go to their cottages or vacation elsewhere. Therefore city children, especially middle to lower income and new immigrant families need to experience nature AND inclusive sensory play to support all children especially children with special needs (eg Autism). COVID has caused so much anixiety and stress in children which will have an adverse impact on their psychological developmental & social emotional growth and well being. Please add as much nature and inclusive sensory elements as possible, while honouring First Nations universal design is more important than ever since COVID. These specific play structures can help children develop positive social-emotional and other developmental skills that they cannot experience just swimming in a concrete pool. Studies have shown that children exposed to natural & sensory play have enriched learning and are happier. Plus , when give the chance, older children and teens like to play in nature and with sand where the young toddlers play. The examples of the naturalist parks found in cities all around the world have only had positive reviews. One

of them is outside the main rec.center of downtown Port Coquitlam BC - my kids had a blast there.

- Kidstown can get very crowded during peak times and space efficient shade and seating is very important for my son, who has special needs.
- Really do not like the sand aspect in option C. Sand and water can get messy and especially at a splash pad. I really would not enjoy sand being added to KidsTown
- I really like the boulders natural splash/spray area but my favourite overall is the river. It would be nice to put these two concepts in the same design.
- Include a water slide and sand play area in whatever design is ultimately chosen. More shade and permitted areas, more picnic areas.
- I love the natural play idea, but I am also wondering how we can ensure maintenance is provided. Knowing that the park is one that is frequented by many around the area, I worry that the combination of sand and water would make the area very messy very quickly. However, if there's a plan in place for maintenance, I'd love to see the natural elements incorporated into the new design!
- This is wasteful a s frivolous spending. Do not tear down perfectly good facilities. Add in instead. Reconsider this whole thing. Is it really priority?
- I'd be concerned with combining water features with climbing features (boulders) and sand features. Real solid shade is needed!!
- Still have a similar structure with the bucket dump and water sprayers.
- Kidstown is used by young children so I think lot of small features is better than large features.
- Parking can be a major deterrent as the park becomes more attractive. The plan looks like it has covered all aspects of a family friendly environment. Because of the amount of attendees, the beach area may need to larger area taking into consideration that we'll be in a post pandemic era and users may feel more secure in social distanced facilities.

For example in Richmond Hill Lake Wilcox it asks for no water balloons which is great to keep the place clean.

  glad you are redoing the park it's been needing a change.
- Please make sure it is fully accessible for both parents and kids

- I don't like sand. It's coarse and rough and irritating and it gets everywhere. Please, no sand play areas.
- What if it rains? The proposal is only including one type of shade with a solid roof. Parents need a dry space to pack up their belongings if it's raining or somewhere to huddle so please offer more solid roof shade options. Is the playground outside of the current park staying? Please elaborate that on the next version.
- Safety is a concern for some of the designs
- I think having a mixture of theme park style play/swim areas and natural areas may be difficult for parents to navigate with children if each does not have its own distinct area. Also, I believe having natural play will make it difficult for the theme park style areas to maintain their cleanliness and appearance. I love the natural ideas but for a separate place. Kids town has always been an exciting theme park style place that I thoroughly enjoyed as a child and now take my own children there.
- I think it's important to keep in mind that this is a high traffic play structure that has to accommodate a lot of children being able to enjoy to space at the same time
- I love what the design team has come up with! Great work—this will be an amazing update to a Scarborough landmark.
- Love the additions that allow inclusivity, indigenous acknowledgements and nature based play. Although I adore the Concept A which I find is a traditional pool and splash pad area, why not include some of that nature play (e.g. boulders, river streams, waterfall feature) all throughout the park! I'd find that way, more people would be enticed to take a stroll around the area rather than plop themselves specifically around the pool

and splash pad area. It may reduce the cluster of people if there's more to do - other than have a picnic - in the surrounding areas.

- More shading areas for families with small children. More areas that are accessible for strollers etc especially around the smaller play features, splash pad, wading pool etc
- Please try to avoid taking down the existing play structure with the big bucket unless it is
  a greater cost to maintain than to take it down because a lot of kids go to kidstown for
  the big bucket. A lot of parents and kids enjoy the big bucket as a highlight of the park
  and it is the feature that attracts more people to the park in the first place. If the old play
  structure were to be replaced, please try to add the big bucket to the new plans as it
  would increase traction of visitors.
- I don't like the idea of lounge seating.some may leave their belongings on them while they swim or involve in other activities. Other visitors who may need the seating will be just looking at seating filled with people clothes and picnic basket but no people.
- Shade sails and trees for shade would be a huge draw/reason for going to the park. Provide shade not just over seating areas but also the pools edges and splash pad areas. I would like to see a lot more shading. Seating like benches and ledges needs to be next to rivers/pools so caregivers can watch toddlers and big kids close up.
- These ideas look promising and I look forward to bringing my kids post-revitalization. Would be great to have a combination of spaces for toddlers to play in water safely and for older kids to be more active without interfering with the little ones experience.
